DAMAGED TOBACCO GOOD FERTILIZER.

A little over two weeks ago a new method of turning to profit damaged tobacco was inaugurated with success at Shelbyville, Ky., says an editorial in the Western Tobacco Journal, when a large quantity of frozen, green and badly house-burned tobacco was publicly converted into fertilizer by means of a machine that has been made for that particular purpose.

This will undoubtedly prove a great boon to the tobacco grower in the future and he will be able to realize a cash value of a commodity that hitherto has been absolutely worthless. All the benefits to be derived by converting this undesirable product into fertilizer cannot be seen at a glance. From the view point of the farmer, of course, financial gain is what is most to be considered, for in the shape of fertilizer damaged tobacco will be worth from \$30 to \$40 a ton. It is said to be particularly valuable as a fertilizing agent for small fruit, gardens and lawns.

From the viewpoint of the public the innovation will be enhanced because it will remove from the market much undesirable tobacco and thus prevent the use of a lot of inferior leaf being bought up and used by the manufacturers.

It is perhaps a fact not generally known that about 10 per cent of the tobacco crop each year is so damaged by the various difficulties encountered in raising and curing the plant as to render it practically worthless. If this 10 per cent is permanently taken off the market, it is easy to see that it will have a wonderful tendency to boost the price of the leaf, adding perhaps as much as 1 to 2 cents per pound to the remaining portion of the crop.

We are inclined to believe that damaged tobacco as a fertilizer will prove a far more valuable commodity in every respect and to all concerned than damaged tobacco sold on the market for a mere song
