**THE PAY OF CONGRESSMEN.**

During the two years which constitute a term in the House of Representatives a member draws \$10,000 in salary, \$2,400 for clerk hire \$250 for stationery and whatever amount his mileage may come to. His period of attendance at Washington is about nine months out of the twenty-four. There are few representatives whose devotion to public life interrupts seriously their pursuit of private business—although it is true that when Thomas B. Reed finally quit Congress he said it was because he had to make a living.

Prestige comes with a single election to the House; much more reelection. Service in the national legislature affords an education useful in many occupations, particularly valuable to a lawyer. For a senator the pecuniary attachments to his post extend themselves over six years instead of two. His seat in the chamber calls him twenty-seven or twenty-eight months out of seventy-two, but his attendance record may be weak without subjecting him to fine or removal. As a member of the upper house he acquires a prestige greatly multiplied over that of a representative. There is no clause of the senatorial courtesy code which binds him to spend his time between sessions exclusively in the contemplation of his toga.

**Why be Honest?**

A lady bought half a dozen handkerchiefs at a store in town. When she opened the package at home she found she had seven. The next day, when down town, she called at the store to pay for the extra handkerchief, for she concluded she wanted seven; and when she spoke to the clerk of the mistake and her purpose to pay for the extra handkerchief the clerk looked up amazed. She was startled, but caught her breath enough to say it was very unusual.

Of course it was unusual, because mistakes of this kind are not frequent. People would surely not keep as their own what came into their hands by mistake. For that would be the same as stealing. It is morally just as bad, and legally, too, as if they put their hands into a till and took out money. If that lady had kept that seventh handkerchief, and said nothing about it, she would have been just as guilty as if she had slipped an extra one under her cloak when she left the store.

She might not have been put in jail, for it, but she would be punished for it somehow, sometime. The penalty might not come in a stroke of misfortune or sorrow, but it would in loss of character, of noble purpose, of lofty ideals. We cannot escape retribution. Murder will out. A person cannot even appear honest, square and above board if his conduct is tainted with faults and meanness. One of the worst mistakes we are guilty of is the belief that we can cover up mistakes. One of the noblest faiths we can practice is to be honest for the sake of honesty.—Ohio State Journal.

**QUEER STORY OF A PRESENT.**

In the Revue de Paris M. Raymond Reconly tells the following: After the visit of Nicholas to France the Parisian press deemed it proper to make a present to the czar. They had an aquarelle painted by Detaille and sent the magnificently framed picture to St. Petersburg to be delivered to the emperor. Three months elapsed, and the committee of the Parisian press received no answer. The committee began to wonder. Had the present reached its destination? Frenchmen living in the Russian capital were asked to make inquiries, and finally they learned that the czar had actually received the aquarelle. It even pleased him to such an extent as to cause him to place it in the best part of his study. But why had he not answered? The astonishment of the Paris newspaper men increased. They made further inquiries and at last found out that the picture had been sold to the czar by some official and at a high price. As the czar had to pay for it, he did not think that thanks were due to any one.

The industrious negroes do not make the race problem, but apart from the sociological question, the South has come to the acknowledgment that it can not depend upon negro labor. At best, it is scarce in most sections, and as a class it is unreliable. The worst phase of it is that the higher the wage the more unreliable the labor. The average negro laborer is content with a certain sum of money each week. If he must work six days in a week in order to earn it, he may work six days; if he can earn it in four days he will loaf the rest of the week. It is impossible for the South to carry on its extensive operations with that class of labor, and immigration has become a necessity.—Richmond Times.
