The Legislature.

On Thursday Governor Glenn personally read his message before a joint session of the house and senate.

Among the first bills introduced in the house was one by Representative Laughinghouse to reduce passenger rates on railroads to two cents per mile.

In the appointment of committees in the senate, Senator Fleming was named on four-fish and fisheries, claims, revival and corporations.

South Carolina House Turned Down Senate Resolution.

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 10.—By a vote of 79 to 40, the house of representatives today declined to concur in the resolution introduced in the senate by Senator Cole L. Blease, and passed by that body, 21 to 16, yesterday, approving the course of President Roosevelt in summarily dismissing the negro troops implicated in the Brownsville riot. It was agreed that the senate resolution was intended as a rebuke to the senior United States senator from this State and thus an indirect and covert method of indicating to the national representative of the State the wishes and opinions of the house would be both undignified and insulting.

Scared to Death.

Philadelphia, Pa. Jan. 10.—Albert Lindsey was frightened to death and two men were severely burned by an explosion of molten metal in the finishing plant at Baldwin's Locomotive Works today. Frank Sakaalowsky and Patrick Dolan were burned about the face and body by the hot metal which flew over them, and Lindsey, who was standing near was so frightened that he collapsed. He was picked up unconscious and when taken to a hospital with the injured men was dead.

Young Fellow Kills a Married Woman and Winds up his own Existence.

Roanoke, Va., Jan. 10.—Wallace C. Mays, unmarried, aged 25, today shot and killed Mrs. Etta Murray, aged 30, the wife of Frank Murray, and then blew out his own brains falling dead at the feet of the woman he had murdered. Mays and Mrs. Murray were cousins. The tragedy was enacted in the Murray home, while Murray, who works at night, was asleep up stairs.

Spencer Blackburn got the empty honor of being recommended for United States senator by the few Republican in the legislature.

With nearly everybody but Speaker Cannon favoring the establishment of the Appalachian forest reserve, he is about to get in a class all by himself.

Robbers blew open a safe in Kinston and got away with \$12,000. Every occurrence of this kind reminds us that people should put their money in banks where it can be safe from robbers.

Coming home from Raleigh the other day we noticed hundreds of bales of cotton scattered at different points along the railroad. As valuable as cotton is, and as easily as it is damaged by exposure to weather, it does look like those people who hold it would take better care of it.

The governor of South Dakota has come to the conclusion that his State did a dishonest thing in taking that money from North Carolina for those old bonds, and recommends that it be refunded. He sets himself right, but whether his State will concur in the suggestion remains to be seen.

THE TARIFF TAX.

The collection of tariff tax on imports should be a simple matter, but the Republican politicians, acting in the interest of the protected monopolists, have purposely made the schedules intricate and conflicting. There are, at the port of New York alone, hundreds of entries of goods held up every month by protest of importers because the appraisers are continually trying to impose higher duties, by having the goods entered under paragraphs of the tariff act other than those that similar goods have heretofore been entered under. Then there is the constant fight between the importers and the government officials about the declared value of the goods in the country of their origin. The protected trusts and monopolists have, under this administration, as under former Republican administrations, controlled the appointment of the Custom House officials and trust interests have been subserved by so interpreting the law as to increase the duties paid on imports, in the manner mentioned, so as to allow our monopolists to increase the price of their products, with which the foreign imports compete. The higher the tariff tax, the greater the price of trust products.

All this maneuvering and evading of the intention of the tariff act, is therefore in the interests of the trusts and combines that control the manufacture of home-made goods. There would not be so great reason for complaint if the increased cost of importing foreign made goods did not allow our monopolists to add to the price of their home-made prod-

ucts and thus make much more than a reasonable profit. The whole question at issue is, shall the trusts and manufacturers be inordinately protected and thus allowed by law to increase their profits at the expense of the American people? Even the most rabid Republican protectionists do not now claim that we have any longer any infant industries that need protecting for the infants have grown to giants and in league with the magnates of the railroad, banking and other enormous corporations control, in a great measure, the legislative executive and judicial departments of the government, by an alliance with the politicians of the Republican party for mutual advantage and protection.

To revise the tariff law would strike at the root of these evils and although perhaps not entirely curing all of them, it would tend to greatly reduce the exorbitant profits now demanded by the trusts, most of whom would thus reduce the cost of living which is now unnecessarily too high. Unless the tariff is revised, so that the cost of living is reduced, the wages and salaries of all classes must be increased to correspond with our enlarged expenses. It is entirely unfair that the few should monopolize prosperity at the expense of the many.
