MAKE 'EM KEEP CONTRACT

Mr. Morton Introduces Bill to Make Household Servants Live Up to Their Promises.

Representative Morton has introduced a remarkable bill in the house of representatives to apply only to his own county, New Hanover, unless it shall be amended to apply to other counties by such members of may take a fancy to it.

The bill is entitled: "To prevent household servants from breaking their contract." It stipulates that any cook, house girl, maid, butler, coachman, washwoman, or other household servant who shall have contracted either in writing or orally to serve any person or persons in any of the various capacities specified and shall fail to do so or leave the services before the contract period has expired except in cases of illness or other serious and unavoidable calamity shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished at the discretion of the court.

A BIG TOBACCO CROP.

So Thinks Mr. L. C. Johnson.

Mr. L. C. Johnson, of Grifton, today said to a Free Press representative that he thought the farmers of this and adjoining sections are preparing for a big tobacco crop this year.

"I don't know when I've ever seen so many new tobacco barns and such extensive preparations as I've seen this early in the year. It seems that everything is going to be tobacco. I scarcely know what I'll do, yet, though I think I'll put in a good deal of cotton as well as some tobacco so as to be in a position to take advantage of one if the other is a failure."

Going to Snow Hill.

We have it from an authoritative source that the present intention of the Norfolk & Southern Railroad Company is to run a through train from Beaufort to Raleigh via Snow Hill. A large part in fact nearly all the grading has been finished from Wilson to Washington. From appearances it is only a matter of a few months before the track will be laid. A re-survey of the line to Snow Hill was finished only a few days ago.—Snow Hill Standard-Lacone.

THE LEGISLATURE

What the Law Makers Are Doing.

In the Senate Thursday there was animated discussion on the bill of Senator Buxton which is to prevent usury and extortion. It prohibits parties lending money on household and kitchen furniture from charging over six per cent on such loans, the charging of more to be a misdemeanor, and the party to forfeit double the interest.

Senator Odell introduced a bill to limit the poll tax in North Carolina to not exceeding two dollars in cities and towns, and not in excess of two dollars for State and county. This not to affect special school districts or for municipal bonds now in force.

Wood: To prohibit corporations from holding more than 30 acres of land in North Carolina.

Drewry: To regulate the running of automobiles, locomotives and like conveyances without animals as motive power over roads of the State.

Officials of the railroads appeared before the senate committee in regard to bills proposing to reduce rates.

In the house Representative Laughinghouse introduced a bill to create a shell fish commission.

Murphy, by request: To give railway conductors authority of arrest.

Neal: To furnish protection from fire at the Soldiers' Home.

Dillings: To require attendance on public schools for 16 weeks each year of children between the ages of 8 and 14 years.

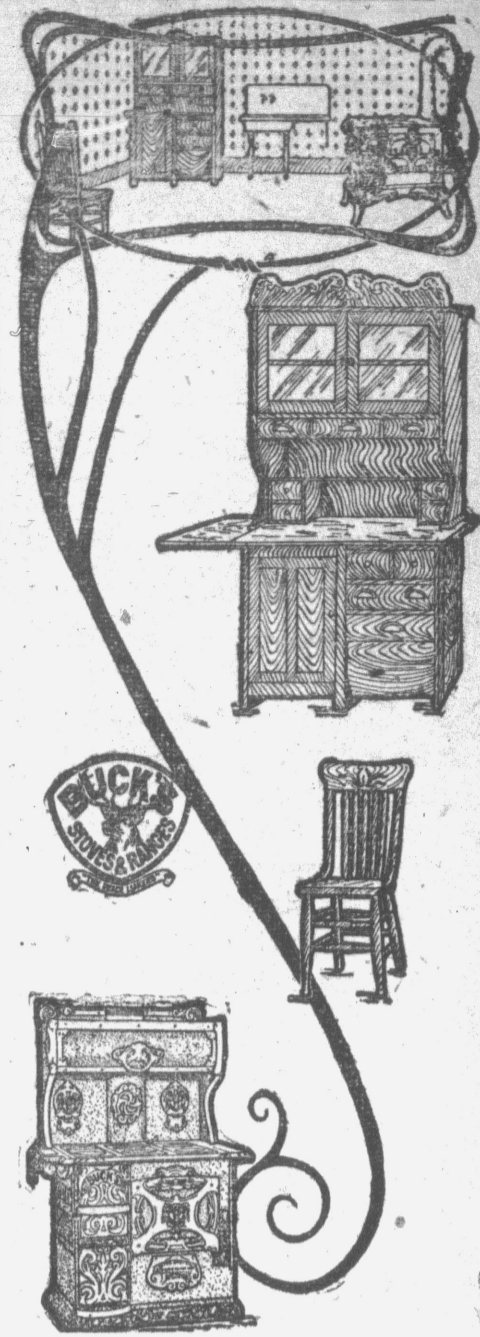
