Child Labor Law

State Labor Commissioner Varner in his report for 1907 recommends a compulsory school law or the submission to the qualified voters in each county, town or township, of a law requiring;

First: All children between the ages of 6 and 14 years to attend the public schools regularly every year.

Secondly, that no child not able to read and write be permitted to work in any factory unless the widowed mother or totally disabled father is totally dependent upon the labor of such child and has no other support.

That no child under 14 years of age shall be permitted to work in any factory at night.

That not exceeding 10 hours shall be a maximum day's work for all manufacturing establishments, this requirement being, it is claimed, only in simple justice to operatives and will not retard the progress.

That all manufactures and other agencies of whatsoever kind addressed for information by the department in preparation of its annual report be required to answer promptly each question fully and accurately.

That the salary of the assistant commissioner be increased to 1,400.

THE LEGISLATURE

What the Law Makers Are Doing.

Raleigh, N. C. Jan. 25.—The lower house of the general assembly today tabled the Douglass bill designed to prohibit the sale of dope drinks at soda fountains after a lively discussion during which Douglass, introducer of the bill, referred to soda fountains as children's bar-rooms and engaged in sharp tilts with a number of members.

The Senate devoted most of its session to the discussion of the bill to pay solicitors \$2100 each instead of fees, with the final result that so much opposition developed that the vote was deferred and the bill made a special order for Thursday of next week. There seems to be considerable question as to the ultimate fate of the bill.

From three to six o'clock this evening the senator committee on railroads and house committee on public service corporations heard arguments on the pending bills for railroads rate reduction and railroad regulation, whole time being taken up with a masterful speech by A. P. Thom, general counsel for the Southern Railroad Company, Washington, D. C.

In the senate a bill was introduced to increase the salary of the governor. There were a large number of local bills in both the senate and house.

The Republican Party of the State.

Ban on Bucket Shops.

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 24.—By a two to one vote the Senate today passed Senator Carlisle's bill, outlawing the bucket shops in this State.

The bill makes a misdemeanor "the keeping of any room or place where contracts are made for the future delivery of any stocks, bonds, cotton, grain, meat or any other animal, mineral or vegetable product of any kind without the seller being the owner and without any intention on the part of either the seller to deliver or the buyer receiving the same."

THE SOUTH'S LABOR PROBLEM.

Georgia is prompt to take advantage of the example set by South Carolina in going to Europe for white labor to supply the deficiency which is retarding the Southland. The Washington authorities having decided that recent immigration from Belgium and Germany, assisted by the State, does not conflict with the contract labor law, Georgia is going to get help in the same way. Naturally there is objection by labor unions, and there will be a great deal of discussion and protest both in the North and South. One effect of this should be to turn organized labor's attention to a closer scrutiny of Southern industrial conditions. If that be done it is not difficult to foresee that our own white labor, prompted by a spirit of self-preservation, will eventually take a hand in relieving the situation in the South. That is what the South wants and what some of the overcrowded cities of the North may view with equanimity.

At present there is a general scarcity of labor, but this cannot continue forever, and if it is possible to demonstrate that there are opportunities in the South, with its milder climate, its easier ways and its less costly living, organized labor ought to be able to do more than any other agency to check the immigration in which it claims now to see so great a menace. Certainly the manufacturers and producers of

the South would prefer American labor to the people of foreign tongues and methods and would welcome a friendly invasion from the East and North.—Pittsburg Gazette-Times.

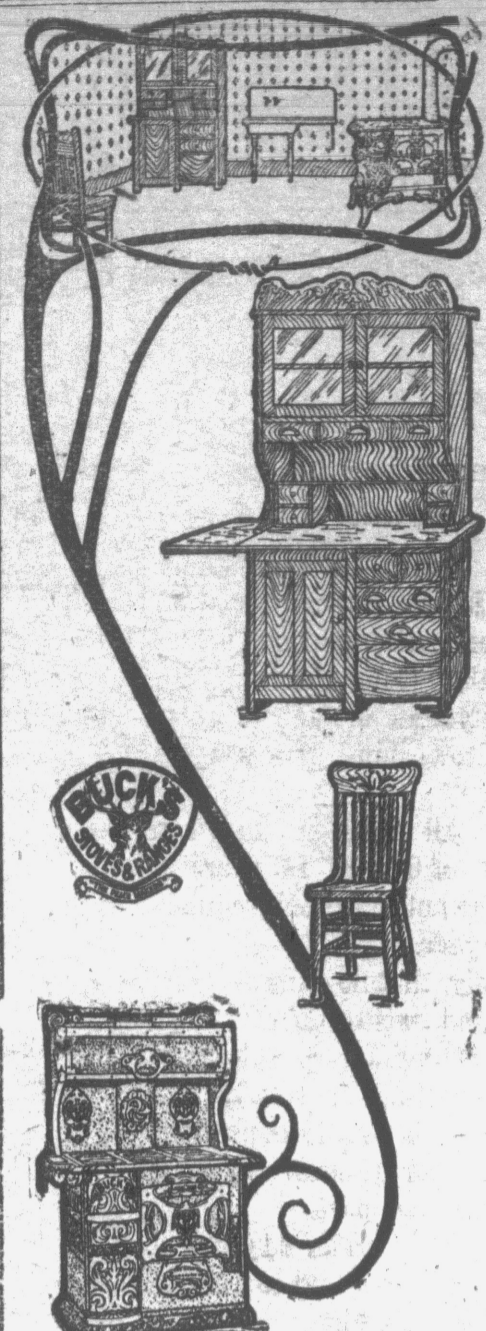
