## TO REMOVE COTTON SEED FUZZ.

### Experts of Department of Agriculture Have Practically Perfected One of Most Important Devices in the Cotton Culture.

Washington, March 2. — One of the most important devices in the history of cotton culture practically has been perfected by experts of the Department of Agriculture. It is a machine for the removal of the fuzz on cotton seed and for the separation of light from heavy seed. The process has been in course of development for about two years and it is the opinion of the cotton experts of the Department that its universal use would effect a saving of about 10 per cent of the entire cotton crop. As the crop of America amounts to about \$750,000,000 a year, it easily can be realized that such a saving would be of vast importance.

By the removal of the fuzz from the cotton seed, the seed may be planted with an ordinary gravity drill. By the case with which the smooth seed can be manipulated, they can be planted in hills, without unnecessary waist, and the plants so located can be tilled in two directions. The machine, it is stated, can be made at very small expense, and as the invention is in the hands of the government, cotton planters who use it will have to pay no royalty for it.

## THE NEW ORGAN.

### Ready for Recital Friday Night.

The new pipe organ now being installed in the Jarvis Memorial church and upon which Mr. Freeman, of Washington, D. C., will give his organ recital Friday night, was built by Mr. M. P. Miller, the eminent pipe organ builder, of Hagerstown, Maryland, who has already built instruments for more than 800 churches throughout the United States. The Miller organ factory is the largest plant in America devoted entirely to the manufacture of pipe organs and has a reputation of producing the best instruments.

The design of the organ is in perfect harmony with the architecture of the church; the casing of finely selected quartered oak wood handsomely finished and the front pipes decorated to harmonize with the church walls.

## NEGRO KILLS TWO OFFICERS.

### The Militia Called to Arms.

Fayetteville, March 2.—Tonight at 7 o'clock, Chief of Police Chason and two policemen, Lockamy and Buckingham, while raiding a blind tiger, were shot down by a negro, Tom Walker, the proprietor of the blind tiger.

Policeman Lockamy was instantly killed. Chief of Police Chason was shot through the head and mortally wounded, and Policeman Byckingham was shot in the shoulder and side. There are little hopes of his recovery.

The negro has so far evaded capture. The murderer is a well-known and desperate character. With him at the time of the shooting was a white man, a stranger in the city, who has been apprehended and is now in the county jail. The wife of Walker has been locked up for safe keeping. He is a ginger-colored mulatto, about 30 years of age; five feet eight inches tall; weighs about 180 pounds, wears a light hat, has a habitually scowling face and would be recognized as a "bad negro" by anyone.—Charlotte Observer.

**HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUE.**

The General Assembly of North Carolina has passed the conference committee report on railroad rate regulation, and the bill fixing passenger fares in this State at two-and-a-quarter cents per mile is now a law. A bill for freight rate regulation quickly followed the passenger rate bill, and before the week is out, even if not before this is read, that bill will also be a law. These two bills will save millions of dollars to the people of North Carolina, and if the legislature had accomplished nothing else during the entire session this alone would have amply repaid the State.

It has been noticeable during the discussion of the railroad rate bills in the legislature that several members wanted their own bills to pass so that it might bear their name.

The Reflector is of the opinion that the largest honor for getting railroad regulation enacted into law at this time belongs to Representative J. J. Laughinghouse, of Pitt county, and if the bill is to be designated by the name of any member it should be called "the Laughinghouse passenger fare bill."

It is remembered that in the legislature of 1905 Representative Laughinghouse introduced a passenger fare bill which passed the house at that session by a vote of 74 to 31 but never got through the senate. This was the entering wedge that brought about a regulation of railroad rates. The fight that Representative Laughinghouse made for his bill and the interest aroused in it throughout the State was the cause of the railroad rate regulation plank being placed in the platform at the last Democratic State convention.

Representative Laughinghouse was also the first member of the present legislature to introduce a passenger fare bill, it being the ninth bill offered at the opening of this session. Of course the freight regulation measure, by which could be checked the unjust discrimination in freight rates against the business interests of North Carolina, was a natural consequence following the general interest awakened by the discussion of the passenger fare reduction, hence the honor of bringing about these laws is largely due Representative Laughinghouse and he is entitled to the credit for it.

On Saturday evening Governor Glenn named Mr. Charles L. Abernethy, of Beaufort, as solicitor of this district to succeed Mr. L. I. Moore, resigned. While we had hoped this appointment would come to Pitt county, the governor has made a good selection.

In fact either of the four gentlemen applying for the position would have filled it creditably. Though a young man, only 35 years of age, Mr. Abernethy has reached high distinction as a lawyer and in public life. He was born in the western part of the State and moved to Beaufort in 1893 and for eight years edited a paper in that town. In both 1900 and 1904 he was Democratic presidential elector of his district and made a vigorous canvass in both campaigns. For two years he was attorney of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad, and has also been county and city attorney at his home. He will fill the position of solicitor with credit to himself and to the district.

This being the last week of the present legislature big things are expected of that body.

**ALPINE CLIMBERS.**

## MOUNT PELATTO.

How the Dazzling Peak of Pumice Stone is Mined.

Coming from Stromboli, as we approach Liparia we see a mountain so dazzling white that the eyes cannot rest upon it—Mount Pelatto, the mountain of pumice stone. It stands out against a background of dark volcanic mass under an intense blue sky. Below it lies the beautiful emerald green Eolian sea.

The pumice mines are worked with as little expense as possible. There are no galleries, no stays or pillars. There is no woodwork of any kind. The men who mine the stone are paid in proportion to the quality of the stone mined. Therefore their only care is to produce fine, light stone. When a man finds a vein of fine stone he follows the lead whether it is safe or not. If the roof caves in, so much the worse for him. The work is dangerous, but it pays relatively well. The stone is carried on the backs of the women and children of the miners to the workshops of Canneto. As soon as it reaches the shops it is sorted and put together according to quality. The lighter, finer stone is called "foam." The second choice is known as "first white" and the third choice as "second white," etc.

The pieces are packed just as they come from the mine, excepting one very careful treatment—all the sharp edges are filed down, because they cause breakage, and breakage lowers the mercantile value of the stone. The files used are very large, and the filing is done by women. As soon as a piece is filed it is wrapped separately in paper and then placed in the tun to be shipped. Pieces of inferior quality are not wrapped in paper. They are placed in the tuns in fine shavings. It is claimed that the filing is healthful work, but this is hard to believe. In the room where the women wield the files the air is a dense, powdery white. The fine pumice dust (silicate of alumina) is held in the air, and in such an atmosphere every act of respiration must load the mucous linings of all the air passages. The women who file the stone breathe the air from morning till night. Even a very brief inhalation causes an exceedingly disagreeable sensation of desiccation. So it is presumable that the industry is less harmful to the exploiters of the mines than to the women who pass their lives inhaling silicate of alumina. It has been said that the work brings in "relatively good pay." The expert filer's pay is 15 cents a day, but to earn that much a woman must work very fast. The pay is "relatively good" because labor is scarce in that country—scarce and ill paid.—Exchange.

### Painters' Colic.

The painters and decorators were at work in the dining room, and the good housewife was anxiously sputtering about, giving orders as to how this and that should be done. One of the "artists" was telling about his attack of painters' colic when she said: "I should think you would get sick! Why don't you keep your mouth closed while you work?" "Huh, missis," replied the man, "I'd like to know what kind o' painter you'd make. You'd be dead with colic inside of a year. Your mouth is open all the while." The rest of the job was finished in silence.—New York Press.

### A Puzzle.

'Twas a glorious night, and two lovers sat upon the cliffside, with the eternal ocean flowing at their feet with a calmness and placidity that was almost appalling. They were looking at the stars above, and he turned to his girl and said tenderly:

"My darling, I don't understand what you can see in me to love me so."

## OUR BIG BROWN BEARS.

They Are More Than a Match For the Largest African Lions.

What percentage of people, even of those who feel an interest in wild animal life, really know that the largest flesh-eating animals in the world are found in America? People generally believe, and have believed for ages, that the African lion is the king of beasts. But he is not nearly as large or as powerful an animal as the large brown bear of subarctic America. The bears are not as ferocious or combative as the lions, nor are they nearly as vicious as they are given credit for being. But the largest of them are much larger and more powerful than any of the lions. It is safe to say that the largest of the brown bears of the north would weigh three times as much as the largest specimen of lion and is beyond all question greatly superior in strength.

Comparing these two powerful animals in action if brought together in combat, the bear would at first appear very clumsy. It would not be capable of the quick rush or the catlike spring of the lion. It would not attack, but would remain entirely on the defensive, meeting its adversary with blows of such rapidity and terrible force as at once to illustrate its superiority not only in strength, but in action. I do not believe that there is an animal in the world that can act more quickly or effectively or can aim its blows with greater certainty than the bear.

The large brown bears of the Alaska peninsula, south of Bering sea, are among the largest bears of the world, and it is evident that there is no part of the world out side of America in which such large flesh-eating animals are found. The bears are flesh eaters, or carnivorous, yet there are none of them that depend upon flesh for food, and with most of them flesh comprises but a very small percentage of their food.

The large brown bears of the north and those of the Alaska peninsula usually travel to the sea when first leaving hibernation.—Andrew J. Stone in Scribner's.
