STRANGERS TAKE US IN.

One of the most curious facts of human nature is the fascination a stranger or an outsider has for the average man or woman. Possibly it is the charm of novelty. It is a familiar episode in nearly every community, however, to have a stranger come in and induce people to do things which they would not do for life long acquaintances or their most trusted and intimate friends.

The obsessions, or brain cloud, or disease, or tendency, or whatever it is, goes even further. People will walk by the doors of merchants whom they have known all their lives; perhaps to whom they owe money at the very moment, and buy postoffice orders to pay in distant cities for goods which the home merchants could furnish more conveniently and for the same money, or cheaper. All kinds of peripatetic and itinerant agents and dealers send out circulars and have women flock to their displays at hotels--women who usually are fairly sensible and public spirited at that--and pay higher prices than they would have to pay for exactly the same goods furnished by local merchants and shop-keepers, who do business, pay rents and taxes here and help to keep the town going. We have heard of cases of families which collected heavy rents from merchants and deliberately took the money the merchants paid them and spent it in Philadelphia, New York or elsewhere for the same goods their tenants were trying to sell.

And after it has happened here and elsewhere that fakirs without proper references or credentials have come and sold things which the most trusted citizen of the community could not have sold, have induced cautious and long-headed business men to make investments into which no fellow-citizen could have persuaded them possibly.

This curious trait is worth some study by medical and scientific people. Possibly some operation might be performed to cure it. Some brain specialist may find the exact location of the nerve or brain section which induces people to trust the stranger in preference to some grown humanity and to prefer sending their money abroad rather than to keep it in its own territory. Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night, all but one of the members being present.

The finance committee reported the arrangements had been made to borrow \$15,000 from the three banks of the town to be used in completing the sewerage system.

The different officers made report of collections for the past month. The sum of \$1.15 each was ordered refunded to Sam Flake and Mrs. Mollie Fleming for excess taxes collected through error.

An application for an incandescent light on Seventh street was referred to the water and light committee.

An arc light was ordered to be placed at the corner of Jarvis and Fourth streets in West Greenville.

Accounts allowed to the amount of \$1,625.37 were paid. The board adjourned to meet March 13th.

SUDDEN TURN IN THE THAW TRIAL.

Defense Decides to Rest on its Evidence.

New York, March 7.--There was another quick turn of the cards in the trial of Harry K. Thaw late today when the defense announced that it had concluded to rest its case.

It was nearly six o'clock when Delphin M. Delmas, of the Thaw counsel, called District Attorney Jerome on the telephone and made the announcement. The district attorney was perhaps the most surprised man in New York for it had been understood that when Justice Fitzgerald resumed the bench Friday morning at 10:30, the Thaw attorneys would call one or two alienists.

SENATE VOTED FOR EDUCATION BILLS.

House Determined Not to Adjourn Until the Pledges the Democratic Party Made to the People Shall Have Been Fulfilled by the Legislature.

Yesterday was a strenuous day in the senate, and a multiplicity of bills, of general and some of great importance to the people and the interests of the state, were passed. The compulsory education bill was voted into law, after the adoption of amendments which left the question of voting compulsory attendance upon the school district or township as the unit instead of the county, as the original bill provided.

The High School bill deposes the senate, carrying with it a modest appropriation for the establishment of the Eastern Carolina training school, to be located in the eastern town which offers the best inducements. Under this bill the County Board of Education may appropriate a sum for the maintenance of a high school, and does not make it compulsory, so that only those counties which are ready for the advance movement will take advantage of the act.

The Buxton-Preston immigration bill passed the Senate and carries with it an annual appropriation of \$10,000 for five years, half of this amount to come from the State treasury, the remainder to be taken from the State department of agriculture. The bill creates an immigration bureau, whose efforts to secure immigrants shall be limited to the United States, Caanda and nations of Celtic or Teutonic origin, except in the instance of a few Eastern counties, which will be permitted to secure immigrants from Northern Italy.

The usual excitement which attends the senate debates on vital issues was observed during the discussion of Mr Reid's substitute anti-trust bid, and the lobbies and galleries were not disappointed if they expected to hear something interesting and hot.

A resolution introduced in the House, to adjourn Monday, at noon, was withdrawn by its author after the sentiment of the House had been ascertained. It is the determination of the House to remain in session a month longer if necessary, to secure such legislation as will fulfill the pledges of the Democratic party made to the people in its platform, upon which the present General Assembly was elected.

The Senate passed the bill to establish the school of Technology at Spray, carrying an appropriation of \$5,000 with it, and although after it had passed an effort was made to reconsider and defeat it, Mr Reid ably defended and saved it from legislative slaughter.

The house passed the bill appropriating \$7,500 to the Stone-wall Jackson Training school, and also passed the bill to take Surry out of the Eighth Congressional District and put it in the Fifth. --Raleigh News & Observer.

The first battle for the Eastern training school is over. It is now up to Greenville to see that the school is located here.

The Charlotte Chronicle and Greensboro Record will please take notice that the legislature has passed the bill for an Eastern training school.

The Greensboro Record reports the capture of a real ground hog. May be that will take his mind off the scare about the Eastern training school.

Behold how Greenville is growing! One man remarked that the town is now a mile-and-a-half square. A new census would show about 5,000 people, too.

Republican Extravagance.

As the ranking Democratic member of the appropriation committee of the house, it has been the duty of Representative Livingston, for several years, to point out to the expiring congress just how extravagant it has been, and year after year he has to deal in larger and larger figures.

On Monday he rose in his place, with the damaging figures in his hand, and showed that the fifty-ninth congress, during its second session, had appropriated perilously near a billion dollars, and that the estimated revenue of the government from all sources, would fall at least \$100,000,000 below that amount.

It is not such a far cry to the time when the very name of a billion dollar congress was both novel and astounding. A feeling of horror swept all through this country, accustomed as it is to thinking in stupendous figures, that a single congress should appropriate a billion dollars—which is twelve dollars per capita for every man, woman and child in the republic.

But already we have passed beyond that stage. We no longer have billion dollar congresses, but billion dollar sessions of congress.

What the figures will be when the appropriation of the first and second sessions of the fifty-ninth congress are added together it would be hazardous to say, but that it will be stupendous goes without saying.

It is true that this is a billion dollar country—as some defender of the Republican party has reminded us—and there would be less grounds for criticism if this immense sum of money which is taken from the public treasury by each successive congress were more equitably distributed. But it is a known fact that the South gets but little of the benefit of it. Whether it be for the deepening of our rivers and harbors or the construction of adequate public buildings or any other beneficial result to which this more or less paternal government devotes itself, it is the south which has to play the part of the muzzled ox or treading out the corn.

There can be no sufficient excuse for the extravagance which characterizes Republican rule, but when this heavy impost is laid upon the people it is only fair and just that it should be distributed in an equitable proportion among the various sections of our common country.—Atlanta Journal

CONSUMPTION.

The Proper Way of Treating This Incurable Disease.

One of the earliest signs of consumption is a loss of strength and flesh, and this should always arouse suspicion in the case of a young man or woman when there is no other evident cause for it. In addition to the gradual emaciation, there will usually be found a rapid pulse, shortness of breath, anaemia, as shown by pale lips and extreme whiteness of the eyes, a poor appetite and indigestion. There may be feverishness in the afternoon, together with a hacking cough and sometimes a little spitting of blood, but this is more commonly a sign which appears in the later stages.

The two mainstays of the person threatened with or actually suffering from consumption are fresh air and a generous diet. In no disease should the injunction to "throw physic to the dogs" be so faithfully obeyed.

If possible, the consumptive should sleep actually in the open air, on a balcony sheltered from the north and east winds, but if this cannot be done the windows of the bedroom should be kept wide open at night, and the bed should be so placed that it is bathed in the air entering from without. The patients often fear this will give them colds or increase the cough, but it does just the opposite. Of course the sleeper should be well protected, with a hold in very cold weather and a warm sleeping robe so as not to become chilled if the bedclothes are accidentally displaced.

The daytime should be passed in the open air. The patient, if weakness or a fever keeps him from walking, should sit all day on a porch or by an open window on the sunny side of the house and should practice full, deep breathing for a few minutes at a time frequently.

The diet should be as nutritious as it is possible to make it. Eggs and milk should be the standbys, with a good allowance of meat and also of fat if fat can be digested. Care must be taken not to upset the stomach, for much depends upon good digestion, but a patient living in the open air day and night will be astonished at the quantity of food he can eat and assimilate. Fever at any part of the day is a sign to avoid fatiguing exercise. The bowels must be kept in proper condition.—Youth's Companion.

Holyrood's Chapel Royal.

Those who lament the results of much of the so called restoration in our ancient buildings will not be sorry to know that Holyrood's Chapel Royal is to be left untouched, for with that crumbling pile are bound up many historical memories. In that chapel the beginnings of Anglo-Scottish union were made when at the altar there James IV. was united to Margaret Tudor, the "marriage of the thistle and the rose." There Queen Mary was twice married—to Darnley first and afterward to Bothwell. Holyrood palace, as we know it now, was mostly the handiwork of Charles II.'s craftsmen. James II. turned the Chapel Royal into a Romish building. Indeed, he wished to restore Holyrood entirely to its original monastic purposes. But he reckoned without the dour Scots' temperament, and the vestments and ornaments were ruthlessly torn from the chapel and burned by an Edinburgh mob.—London Chronicle.

The Alligator's Sleep.

A man who passed himself off as an animal keeper at a zoo had one spring an experience with an alligator which cost the concern dear. The alligator had not awakened from his winter nap when the keeper appeared on the scene at the park. He could not understand why the saurian slept and thought it was sick. He punched the alligator and tried in many ways to wake it up. He also noticed that the creature did not eat. Finally, growing desperate for fear that he would have a death on his hands, the keeper bought ten pounds of beef, pried open the saurian's huge jaws and poked the meat down his throat with a fence rail. 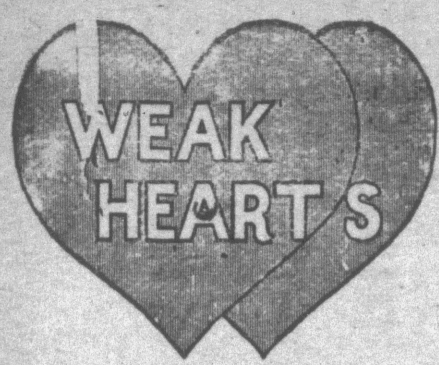
