

The Pilgrim's Society Honor Bryce.

New York, March 23.—Men high in official and diplomatic life in Washington are looking forward with great interest to the coming dinner tonight to be given by the Pilgrims society of New York to the new British Ambassador, Mr. James Bryce, at the Waldorf-Astoria. The secretaries of state, of war and of the navy are among those who are here, as are also most of the prominent foreign diplomats. The Pilgrims expect to make it a notable and memorable event. About five hundred guests will be present, and it is intended that these shall be as representative of the whole of America as possible. The Pilgrims society intended giving this dinner upon the arrival of Mr. Bryce, but Mr. Bryce asked that it be postponed, until he could first come to Washington and make the acquaintance of the president. Among the speakers are Secretary Root and J. H. Choate.

Silk Prices Firm on Fall Production.

The mills have paid hundreds of thousands of dollars on loans taken out during the past few months, the revenue coming from the sales of goods, which have been enormous. With the vast proceeds pouring into the banks they have shown a marked shortage of ready cash, and the rates of interest are very high.

TELEGRAPH IMPROVEMENT.

Facilities of Office Increased.
The Western Union Telegraph Company has increased the facilities for handling business at the Greenville office. An additional wire has been run here giving direct connection with Richmond which makes three wires in the office and provides two through outlets, are to Norfolk and one to Richmond. This will be of considerable advantage in handling messages quickly.
A larger switchboard and new operating table has been put in to accommodate the wires and instruments. The table was ordered from a Greenville factory, the Building & Lumber Co., and is a creditable piece of workmanship. The manager of the office has also changed the counter and metal railing giving more room in both the lobby and operating department. This is to be followed by repainting the interior of the office which will improve the looks also.

The Woman in the Case.

When a man acts the villain's part, transgresses the laws and calls forth the disapproval and contempt of his fellow citizens, you may usually look behind the curtain and find some frail woman suffering the greater part of his crime and disgrace. There have been a number of notorious murder cases before the public of late, and it required only a glance behind the scenes to see the bleeding, crushed heart of the woman in the case, who, after all, was called upon to bear the brunt of her husband's, her son's or her brother's misdoing.
Such is the case in the embezzlement sensation now fresh in the minds of all of our citizens.

When Franc Jones robbed the Charlotte National Bank of \$68,000 of its funds, he committed a crime against the laws of the land; he greatly inconvenienced the bank, but in spite of the theft, the bank will continue to do business as if nothing had happened at all, and the loss will not carry misery to any of those connected.
But, when Franc Jones quit the city he had lived in for years—sneaked out as a thief in the night, and left the delicate, tender, Christian little woman, whom he had sworn to protect, lying prone, helpless, in the hospital suffering, he committed a crime against which the spirit of every person with a heart turns with disgust and contempt; he committed a crime almost impossible for forgiveness.

Franc Jones well merits the contempt of every honest man, but with that, his lot is easy compared to the consuming sorrow and disgrace which the woman in the case must bear. With all our heart we sympathize with her, as we loathe the man who could persecute her so.—Charlotte News.

The Reflector would like to announce the starting of another good enterprise for Greenville. Get a move on you, gentlemen.

Former President Grover Cleveland has finished his fishing and hunting trip in South Carolina and returned home.

President Roosevelt was invited to attend the unveiling of a monument to Worth Bagley in Raleigh, May 23rd, but says other engagements at that time will prevent him being present.

Some talk has started as to who will be chosen aldermen of Greenville at the next election, which will be held under the new division of the wards. Conservative men who are property owners should be selected in each ward.

Some towns in the State have recently adopted curfew laws by which boys and girls under certain age are forbidden to be on the streets after a certain hour at night. It would be a good law in any town, as it helps those parents who cannot control their children to keep them at home.

If reports are true, Assistant Cashier Jones was simply following in the footsteps of his superior officers in making speculations. We have been told that certain high officials of the same bank are among the largest speculators in Charlotte, and the city has a reputation in that particular. The trouble with Jones was that he did not have money of his own to use in speculating, so used the bank's funds and became a defaulter.

A good many people who would prefer to send a special delivery letter do not do so because of inconvenience in securing a special delivery stamp. The bill offered in congress permitting any letter or package to be forwarded by special delivery if they have attached to them ten cents postage in addition to the ordinary postage, was enacted into law, and the law goes into effect on July 1. It will be necessary only to mark the letter or package so stamped, "Special delivery." Stamps of any denomination will answer the purpose. —Charlotte Chronicle.

OFFICIALS REFUSE TO OBEY LAW.

Interesting and Unique Case from Bethel, Pitt County.

Raleigh, N. C. March 21 —The attorney general gives an opinion in an interesting and unique case from Bethel, Pitt county. The legislature gave that place a dispensary and required the town commissioners to appoint two policemen. This they refused to do. The opinion says that under the circumstances the dispensary commissioners should demand that the town appoint policemen and if it fails or refuses to do, then the dispensary commissioners shall themselves make the

appointments. The opinion says that unless this was done the town would be given power to negative a plainly expressed law. If the town refuses to pay the policemen's salaries the dispensary commissioners are to pay these out of dispensary funds.
