TOWN ELECTION CALLED.

To Vote on Question of Issuing \$75,000 Bonds.

At the regular meeting of the board of aldermen, Thursday night, the following was adopted:

Whereas, the General Assembly of North Carolina at its session of 1907, passed an act which was ratified on the 2nd. day of March, 1907, entitled an act to allow the town of Greenville to issue bonds, authorizing the board of aldermen of the town of Greenville to submit to the qualified registered voters of said town the question of empowering and authorizing said board of aldermen of the town of Greenville to issue and sell interest bearing coupon bonds in a sum not to exceed seventy-five thousand dollars, due and payable thirty years after date and bearing interest at a rate no greater than six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the proceeds from said sale of said bonds to be used for the purpose of constructing, extending, enlarging and maintaining the sewerage system in course of construction in said town and for the purpose of paying or otherwise improving the streets of said town and aiding in the establishment of a training school in or near the town of Greenville, if one shall be authorized by law, and further providing that the proceeds of the sale of said bonds may be used by said board of aldermen of the town of Greenville for either of the aforesaid purpose and in such proportions as said board may deem proper and for no other purpose.

And whereas, the said act authorizes and empowers the said board of aldermen of the town of Greenville to fix the time and place for holding said election in the various wards of said town at which time and place the qualified registered voters of said several wards of said town may vote for or against said proposition.

And whereas, the said act provides that said board of aldermen shall give twenty days notice in some newspaper published in the town of Greenville of said election.

And whereas, said act provides that the said board of aldermen of said town of Greenville shall order an entirely new registration of the voters of said town and that said board of aldermen of said town may at any time see fit order said election after giving said twenty days notice thereof.

Now therefore, the board of aldermen of the town of Greenville in regular meeting assembled on the first Thursday in April, 1907, it being the 4th day of April, 1907, do in pursuance of the authority conferred upon them by said act, order that an election be held at the various polling places in the several wards of said town as hereinafter fixed and designated, on Tuesday, the 7th day of May, 1907, for the purpose of taking and ascertaining the will of the qualified voters of said town on said proposition, at which time and places those entitled to vote may appear and vote for or against conferring upon the said board of the town of Greenville the authority to issue and sell said bonds. The said act requires those favoring issuing said bonds to vote a written or printed ballot with the word "For Bonds" thereon and those opposed to issuing said bonds to vote a written or printed ballot

AMBERGRIS.

This Valuable Substance Comes From Diseased Sperm Whales.

Ambergris is one of the most valuable products of the sea. The mariner who spies floating on the waves a grayish mass, fatty in appearance, will, if he knows what ambergris is, betray considerable excitement, for the substance brings high prices.

The origin of ambergris was once a mystery, but it is so no longer. It is a morbid secretion due to a disease of the liver of the sperm whale, in the intestines of which animal lumps of it are occasionally, though rarely, discovered. Dr. C. H. Stevenson of the United States fish commission, who made a special study of the subject, said that the whales which yield ambergris are invariably sickly and emaciated.

Anciently the substance was known as amber, a name which was subsequently applied to the fossil gum now commonly so called. But to distinguish the two one was called "amber gris" (gray) and the other "amber jaune" (yellow).

So it appears that ambergris means simply gray amber. Like the fossil gum, pieces of it were found now and then on the seashore, where they had been cast up by the waves; hence doubtless the giving of the same name to both.

Ambergris usually contains the beaks of cuttlefishes, on which the sperm whale feeds. Sometimes it is black, but the finest is gray in color. When dried, to cure it, it is light and inflammable and yields an odor faintly resembling honey. On being melted by heat it evaporates slowly, leaving no trace behind.

The substance has been used for centuries in sacerdotal rites of the church and with fragrant gums was formerly burned in the apartments of royalty. To some extent it was employed as a medicine and to flavor certain dishes. Nowadays it is utilized almost exclusively by perfumers in the preparation of fine scents, being first converted into a tincture by dissolving it in alcohol. -Saturday Evening Post.
