TOWN MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Aldermen.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night, seven of the members being present.

Chief of fire department reported that he had tested all the fire hoses as directed by the board. The standing committees had no reports to make.

Alderman Carr was appointed as special committee to report on condition of the dispensary.

The officers filed their reports of collections for the past month.

The superintendent of the water and light plants was given permission to ride his bicycle on sidewalks to enable him to get to the work around town quicker.

Chairman Cobb, of the water and light commission appeared before the board for instruction relative to extending the service to the new territory recently taken in to corporate limits of the town. The matter was referred to the water and light committee to work with the commission in regard to extending the service. The finance committee was instructed to have all accounts of the clerk and treasurer checked up ready for the close of the fiscal year.

Accounts for the past month were allowed and orders issued for payment of same.

The board adjourned to meet Tuesday night, 18th.

Americans at London Horse Show.

London, June 6.—The Londoners say they fear nothing at the horse show from the Americans except the heavy harness and saddle classes, although Vanderbilt's four-in hands are regarded as dangerous. An interesting feature will be the jumping competitions, in which Continental cavalry officers in uniform will take part. The Italians expect to take the highest honors in this line of exhibition, and have sent some of their champion jumpers. Vanderbilt has entered horses for no fewer than 93 classes, but Walter Winans, who owns half a million dollars worth of horse flesh at Durrenden Park, Kent, is a powerful rival to Vanderbilt. The Winans stables contain blooded horses from all nations, including one hundred show animals.

AN INTERVIEW WITH GOV. JARVIS

About Location of Eastern Training School

The delegation from Pitt which appeared before the State Board of Education returned home Thursday night and a reporter asked Governor Jarvis to give us his impression of the day's work before the board and the probable outcome of it. In response to this inquiry Governor Jarvis said:

Eight splendid towns represented by splendid delegations appeared before the State Board of Education. It was a beautiful contest between these towns conducted on a high plain. Among the delegation there were preachers, teachers, lawyers, doctors, bankers, judges, business men, farmers, and laborers. It is rare that a more splendid set of men ever met in Raleigh in the interest of any cause. There were more men there capable and in every way fit for any position, however high and important. While the different delegations were earnest in the presentation of the claims of their communities, still the best of feelings prevailed and there was manifest among them all a determination to make the school wherever located a great institution.

To have won out in such a contest as this is a great victory and one which every citizen of the county should be proud of. It is true the State Board of Education has made no decision and will not 'till they visit all the competing towns and inspect the sites offered. Yet, knowing as I do the money offers and the sites offered, I feel absolutely certain that when the board has made its inspection of these sites that Pitt county will get the school by the unanimous voice of the board. I speak of the county because I wish to give proper credit to the county for the great work it has done in this matter. Without the help of the county Greenville would have been overwhelmed by the larger and more populous towns. The work and cooperation of the county brought the school to Pitt and I trust our fellow citizens in every section of the county will rejoice with us in this great victory.

I desire also to mention the fact that it seemed that all the competing towns desired Greenville to have the school if they could not get it. Not only was this true, but it is also true that it seems that every section of this State has a kind feeling for Pitt and that our work is admired and commended everywhere, and that there will be a general approval of the action of the State board in locating the school in Pitt.

101 RANCH SHOW.

Norfolk, Va.—The famous "101 Ranch" direct from Bliss, Oklahoma, with an army of Indians, Mexicans, cow boys, cow girls, ponies, buffalo and all the other paraphernalia which has made that ranch the most celebrated in the world, opened for the season at the Jamestown exposition, May 30th and an audience of five thousand people was delighted in the extreme. Much has been written and said of this wonderful western production transplanted on the shores of Hampton Roads for a few months, but the half has not been told nor could it be told or comprehended, if told. It must be seen to be appreciated.

When the members of the National Editorial Association witnessed the performance in Oklahoma two years ago, they pronounced it the most original and interesting entertainment they had ever seen. Since that time many new features have been added and it now stands without parallel as a typical representation of western life as it was and as it is.

Cause of Stammering

"Stammering is often more the result of habit than from any defect of the vocal organs," says Prof. B. L. Pavyer. "It is generally, if not always, caused by spasm of the larynx resulting in nervous contraction of the organs, thus refusing to permit a proper flow of the air current producing tone. People rarely or never stammer when singing, for then the attention is divided between words and music, the nervousness is momentarily forgotten and the passage of the air current through the larynx is continuous and unobstructed."

"Stammering very often is the result of imitation, sometimes intentional, sometimes unconscious, and the affliction is much more general than might be supposed. In one comparatively small section of the city there are thirty-five stammerers, and every one of them is able to demonstrate to his own satisfaction not only that he does not stammer very badly but that some other person he knows stammers a great deal worse than himself. Every stammerer is intensely sensitive about his infirmity, rarely forgives and never does forget any allusion to it which in his mind savors of ridicule. --St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

CHINESE BILL OF FARE.

"A good many Americans are often puzzled over a bill of fare printed in French, but for genuine mystery the bill of the average Fifth street Chinese restaurant has. The chef beaten forty ways," declared one who has tried both, says the Philadelphia Record. "If you have a spare dollar in your jeans you can dine on 'chow gai ding,' which in United States means fried chicken, ham, waternuts and bamboo shoots. For 75 cents you may order 'hor gai yenn,' a concoction of chicken and pineapple. Twenty-five cents will pay for 'choong tau chee yok'--i. e., young pork and onions. Flash persons sometimes try 'goi ap pa,' which is steamed whale flavored with the juice of orange peel. This costs \$2.50. Another expensive dish is 'kim yuen chee,' a mixture of ham, chicken, mushrooms and shark's fins, for which \$3 is charged. The ordinary patron of the Chinese restaurant, however, confines himself to chop suey or yakamain, which costs him 25 and 15 cents. No one knows just what chop suey may be, but yakamain is nothing but noodles and chicken flavored with licorice."

DELICIOUS, BUT DEADLY.

Yet Akee Is One of the Favorite West Indian Fruits.

Every person who eats akee runs the risk of sudden and painful death or at least a severe illness, and yet akee is one of the favorite fruits of the West Indians. It is so beautiful to look upon as it is delicious to eat and in certain conditions is perfectly harmless. The majority of tourists to the islands where it abounds are familiar only with the sight of it, as great baskets of red and creamy and brilliant black specimens of the fruit are brought to market. The native black women carry these baskets on their heads, and massed in this way the akee looks like a cluster of brilliant flowers.

When ripe the outer skin, which shades from deep pink to a creamy yellow, bursts open and turns back in three sections, exposing the fruit, which is also creamy in coloring and substance. In the center of each akee are three glossy black seeds, each one about the size of the end of the thumb.

To be quite harmless and wholesome the akee must be picked only under certain conditions. If a part of the branch upon which the fruit hangs is broken or hurt, the fruit is poisoned. Fruit that is picked from the ground is unfit to eat, and fruit that is not ripe is like a death dose.

Because of its poisonous qualities hotels in the tropics rarely offer akee in any form to their patrons. They can never be absolutely sure of its being safe to eat. In private homes, however, where the black cook is to be trusted akee frequently forms the piece de resistance at formal and informal affairs.

Akee is never eaten uncooked. It is usually served with salt, the combination being an excellent one. When boiled, akee looks not unlike scrambled eggs, though there is nothing of an eggy taste to it. On the contrary, it has rather a salty flavor, but is unlike anything else in the food world.—New York Herald.

The Greatest Indian Organizer.

Pontiac exemplified at once the best and the worst traits of the American Indian. He seemed not to have been so great a warrior as Osceola or as able a general in the field as Cornstalk or so unselfish a patriot as Tecumseh, but as an organizer among a people with whom organization is almost impossible and as a master of the treacherous statecraft of his race he probably surpassed them all. As soon as his death was known the French governor at St. Louis sent for his body and buried it with full martial honors near the fort. "For a mausoleum," Parkman finely says, "a great city has arisen above the forest here, and the race whom he hated with such burning rancor trample with unceasing footsteps over his forgotten grave."—New York Globe.

Were Superstitious Too.

A woman who takes her superstitions seriously started to enter a big department store one morning last week when she noticed a porter on a tall stepladder that stretched directly across the doorway. In spite of the fact that there were five women behind her eager to pass into the shop she came to a sudden halt, looked up at the ladder and cried out, "Oh, I'll never walk under that!" saying which she turned and strode away. Before she had gone far her sense of humor rose superior to her fear of ladders, and she looked to see if her remark had had any effect on those who had been within sound of her voice. Walking directly behind her were the five women who had heard her exclamation.—New York Press.

Strange Things Found Among the Animal and Plant Life of Australia.

As most persons are aware, China is on the other side of the world, and the manners and customs of the Chinese are almost exactly the reverse of ours. But the climate and the country are much the same. If we want to find a country where nature has turned things topsy-turvy—that is, according to our notions—we must go to Australia.

Many things are reversed in Australia. It is summer there while it is winter in America. Trees shed their bark instead of their leaves. Fruit has the stone or kernel outside. Swans are black. There is a species of fly that kills and eats the spider, and a fish called the climbing perch walks deliberately out of the water and, with the aid of its fins, climbs the adjacent trees after insects that infest them. When to this we add that most of the birds have no song and the flowers no odors it is easily seen that it is the other side of the world in more senses than one.—Philadelphia Press.

There is an element of surprise in the report of Dr. Henry Gannett of the United States Geological Survey. "If you are old go to Alaska," he means, but if you are young go to Montana. Mr. Gannett gives this reason for his advice: "The scenery of Alaska is much grander than anything else of the kind in the world, and it is not well to dull one's capacity for enjoyment by seeing the finest sights first."

Shoes of Whale's Hide.

Newfoundland whalers, seized with a spirit of enterprising economy, are reported to be attempting to place whale hide on the market for the manufacture of whale leather. It is not surprising that such an attempt should be made. It must vex the manufacturer of well balanced shoes to see, after all the hardship and danger of his calling, an enormous and altogether disproportionate bulk of his quarry cast away. From a large right whale of say forty-five to fifty feet in length about 250 barrels of oil and one and three-quarter tons of baleen, or whalebone, may be obtained. The remainder of the gigantic carcass, which may be as much as fifty tons, has hitherto been considered useless. The average whale hide if laid out on the ground would cover a surface of nearly 1,500 square feet, at which rate one whale, if its hide could be made into boots and shoes, would well stock a west end boot shop. London Express.

Montezuma's Well.

Among the many natural curiosities of Arizona, but one that is not often visited by ordinary tourists, is the singular bowl shaped depression in Yavapai county called "Montezuma's Well." It is nearly circular and between 500 and 600 feet in diameter at the brim. It lies in the midst of a nearly level area. The sides are vertical to a depth of thirty or forty feet. Below that they merge into a sloping talus, which extends down to a circular pool of water, alleged by popular tradition, as are so many other not very deep areas of water, to be bottomless. This remarkable formation has usually been described as a "pit crater" of volcanic origin, but Professor William P. Blake believes it to be the result of the falling of the roof of a cavern formed in the limestone strata by running water. The water of the pool, he says, flows out through a subterranean channel into the valley of Beaver creek.—New Orleans Picayune.

A King's Title.

The full title of the king of Siam is: "Most high, illustrious, invincible and powerful monarch, crowned with 101 golden crowns, each adorned with nine species of precious gems, greatest, purest and most divine master of immortal souls, who sees all things, sovereign-emperor, under the shadow of whose wings lies the rich and incomparable kingdom of Siam, king, to whom is subject the most fruitful of all lands lit by the sun, greatest of lords, whose palace is of fine gold and gems, divine master of the golden thrones and of the white and red elephants, sovereign god of the nine kinds of gods, king who is like unto the sun at its zenith and like the full moon, king whose glance is more dazzling than the orb of the morning, king who is above all emperors, monarchs and potentates of the universe from the rising to the setting sun."—St. James' Gazette.

What Hurt Him.

"How are you getting along?" asked a traveling man of an acquaintance who had gone on the stage.

"Did you get through all right?"

"Yes, except that I happened to stumble and fall into Ophelia's grave."

"That must have been embarrassing."

"It was, but I wouldn't have minded it if the audience hadn't seemed so disappointed when I got out."

Born Free and Equal.

There is a widespread belief that the words "all men are born free and equal" are in the Declaration of Independence, but they are not. They are, however, in the constitution of the state of Massachusetts. The words in the declaration are, "all men are created equal," which may mean something very different. The Massachusetts phrase was written by John Lowell, grandfather of the poet, James Russell Lowell. John Lowell was in 1780 a member of the committee appointed to draft the state constitution, and, being an earnest abolitionist, he inserted that clause for the purpose of abolishing slavery in Massachusetts.—Chicago News.

Blind Skaters.

The Philadelphia Record says that skating is rapidly becoming a favorite pastime of the blind and the more to be encouraged as freedom of movement has been the greatest drawback to the happiness and physical development of the sightless. A lecturer recently said when talking about the advances made along these lines: "Sound as well as light is reflected from objects. Those of us who are used to watching our steps are not conscious of this fact. But put a blind person in a room and the very walls reflect his position to him by sound." This extra development of the sense of hearing is making many forms of exercise possible in the gymnasiums in schools for the blind.
