FIRST N. & S. TRAIN.

Officials Pass Through on Inspection.
The Norfolk & Southern railroad has completed its line of new road between Greenville and Washington, and the first train was run over it Monday. This train brought several officers of the road who were on a tour of inspection. These were F. S. Gannon, president; C. O. Haines, vice president; M. W. McGuire, general superintendent, and R. E. L. Bunch, traffic manager. W. P. Marshall, resident engineer, accompanied the officials on the trip.

The train reached Greenville a little past noon, and after spending a few minutes here went on to Farmville. It returned to Greenville a little before 5 o'clock, and after looking over the depot site here the officials left for Norfolk via Washington.

The editor had the pleasure of meeting the officials while here and talking briefly with them. President Gannon expressed himself as pleased with conditions as he found them along the road and gratified at the prospect of business for the road from the section through which it passes. He said the track laying is now finished 5 miles above Farmville, and the remaining 15 miles to Wilson ought to be completed in twenty days.

When asked as to the probable time it will be before the regular train service can begin over this road, President Gannon said he thought this could be safely counted on by the middle of August.

Work is progressing rapidly on a temporary building on the south side of Ninth street to be used until the handsome depot between Ninth street and Dickinson avenue can be erected. Much of the material for the depot is already on the site.

This Parson Was Honest.

BOILER HOUSE BURNED.

BUILDING AND LUMBER COMPANY SUSTAINS A LOSS.

Greenville's Good System of Water Works Saves the Factory.

About 4 o'clock this morning the boiler house of the Building and Lumber Company was burned, and the entire plant narrowly escaped destruction. The plant is located on the Atlantic Coast Line just north of the Imperial tobacco factory.

The fireman of the lumber plant went to the boiler room to replenish the fires in readiness for the work of the day. He had thrown one load of shavings into the furnace, and while gone out to get another load some of the burning shavings fell out and set fire to things around the boiler. In a few moments the room was enveloped in flames.

At such an early hour the town was in deep slumber, and not many people in other sections of the town were awakened when the factory whistle sounded an alarm. In fact there is so much blowing of whistles here in the early morning hours that people are less liable to observe a whistle alarm at such an hour.

The fire alarm gong at the market house was also rung, but even this did not awaken people far from it. Still enough firemen and citizens heard the alarm to hurry to the scene and do effective work. A line of hose was quickly run from the nearest hydrant and the fire was confined to the boiler house. The main body of the factory caught fire several times but by good work was put out and the valuable plant saved.

The damage to the boiler house is estimated at about \$500, which is covered by insurance.

The effectiveness of Greenville's system of water works was practically demonstrated at this fire. But for the abundant and convenient water supply, only a heap of ruins and ashes would now mark the site of a large factory. In this one instance more than \$10,000 was saved. Greenville was wise in putting in her water works system.

A. & M. College Entrance Examinations.

Examinations for admission to the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts will be held at the county court house on Thursday, July 11th at 10 o'clock a. m., in the office of the superintendent of instruction. To Make Javelle Water.

Dissolve two pounds of washing soda in two quarts of soft water. Boil ten minutes, remove from the fire, add a half pound of chlorine of lime and cool quickly. Bottle and keep tightly corked. This is strong and must be handled with care. All such preparations should be kept on a high shelf out of children's way and carefully labeled.

Cleaning the Hands.

The best cleaning agent for the hands is to take one tablespoonful of cornmeal (yellow) and four tablespoonfuls of vinegar, rub well into the hands for about two minutes, then wash off in clean cold water, dry carefully, and the hands will be soft, clean and velvety. Sour milk can be used in place of vinegar with just as good results.

Wash Clotheslines.

When your clotheslines get black and sooty, as they are sure to do, wind them around the elbow and hand, then tie a common twine around through the loop, shake them out and lay on the washboard in a tub of hot suds. Take the scrubbing brush and scrub it, brushing always downward.

Washing Handkerchiefs.

For washing handkerchiefs that have been used when one has had a bad cold make strong salty water in a basin, place the handkerchiefs in and put them on the stove and gradually heat. Remove them and rinse in clean water, and they can be put in with the rest of the laundry.

Thread and Needles.

To prevent thread snarling thread the needle with the first end of the thread that comes from the spool. To save labor keep two needles threaded always (one with white, other with black thread) to mend at once the just discovered rip or sew on a button.

Cleaning Sponges.

To clean an old and foul sponge first soak it for several hours in a solution of permanganate of potash, then squeeze it and put it into a weak solution of hydrochloric acid, about one part acid to ten parts water.

A Sewing Wrinkle.

When stitching thin silk or other gauzy material on the machine if it shows a tendency to pucker place a sheet of tissue paper between the material and the feed of the machine and it will sew without puckering.

For Blood Stains.

Soak in cold soapsuds to which a little kerosene has been added. For tickling and thick goods cover with a thick paste of starch and water, leave in the sun until dry and then brush off.

In Case of Mildew.

In cleaning house you will find some things mildewed. Don't throw them away. Dip the stained cloth in buttermilk and lay in the sun.

The negro fumbled his wool hat and rolled his eyes.

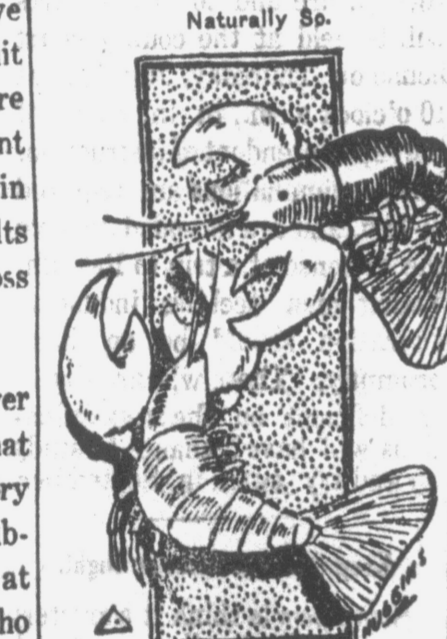
