

**MINISTER GOES WRONG.**

**Forsakes Wife and Child for Mulatto Servant.**

Blackville, S. C. June 24 --- The greatest sensation that has ever stirred this town reached a climax yesterday when the congregation of the Baptist church, at a conference called for that purpose, excluded its pastor, Rev. C. M. Billings, from the church and dismissed him from the pastorate. This extreme action came as the result of a report which had been circulated about Billings' conduct with his chambermaid, a neat colored girl, who had been in his employ for several years. The story was generally reported on the minister recently but the positive proof of the charges was not secured till letters by the preacher, which were read at the church conference yesterday, to the negro girl who had fled to Bamberg, S. C., cleared away the least vestige of doubt and made those who had been the preacher's friends shudder with the horror and debaseness of his conduct, the like of which was never before known in this community. These letters addressed to the negro girl at Bamberg told, in many terms of endearment, of the love the minister bore for her, that he could not live without her presence, and that in order to be with her at all times he would leave his home, his wife and all his friends--and go with her, even to death.

Before coming to Blackville Billings preached at Waynesville, N. C., Timmonsboro and Walterboro, S. C., and other places. Reported trouble of a nature similar to that here was circulated on the man at Waynesville.

Billings married an invalid wife in North Carolina and to them was born a boy, who is still quite small. The physical condition of his wife and the youth of the child greatly increase the enormity of the offense against society and the church.

Billings has wisely left for parts unknown as the community is considerably aroused against him.--Charlotte Observer.

Some years ago Mr. Billings was for a while pastor of the Memorial Baptist church in Greenville. He made some friends here who learn with regret of his disgraceful fall.

**The Spread of English.**

"For centuries," says an authority, "there has been what may be called a 'battle of tongues,' but English is winning all along the line. Today it is the dominant language of the world, being spoken by 120,000,000 people. Second—and a long way behind—comes German, spoken by about 75,000,000. Russian is third, very slightly behind Germany in point of numbers, while French follows with about 51,000,000. Wonderful changes have taken place during the last century. In 1800 French held the first place and bade fair to become the world language. Russian, German and Spanish came next, and English was a bad fifth. But our tongue can convey a meaning in far fewer words than any other, and this quality has brought it to the front. In another century it will probably be spoken by half the peoples of the globe."

**A Swiss Fire Escape.**

A Swiss engineer announces a new fire escape. It consists of a series of folding iron ladders, contained in frames, attached to the window cases, each reaching to the window below. By merely turning a small winch on any floor all these frames are pushed outward from the building, the ladders extended and securely connected with each other, thus forming a continuous communication from the top floor to the ground. The manipulation is simple and takes less than a minute. When not in use the escape is barely visible and does not disfigure the facade of the building in the manner that the ordinary outside iron staircase does. A public test of the new escape has proved successful, and the Vienna fire brigade representatives have expressed their approval of it.

**Steam Pipes Aid Vegetables.**

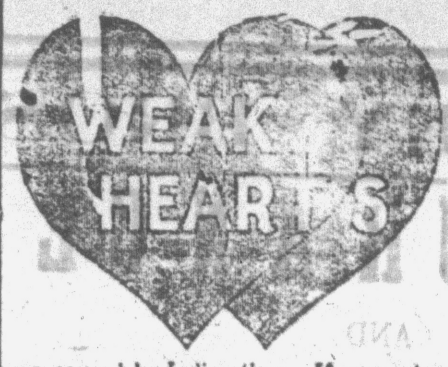
Dr. Mehner, a German, is responsible for the latest agricultural idea which is now the subject of experiment in Germany and France—that of artificially heating the soil for the purpose of pushing the growth of vegetables. It is said to promise remarkable results, especially in the quickening of spring vegetables and their development in size and luxuriance. The method consists in burying at a depth of twenty to forty inches in the field to be treated conduits of earthenware, through which steam pipes an inch in diameter, are laid. Steam at a temperature of about 300 degrees is forced through the pipes. It warms the air in the conduit, and the heat slowly radiates through the clay conduit, warming the earth.—New York Sun.

**Western Ideas in China.**

In every town of any importance, and often in villages, there are schools with foreign fittings for teaching western learning. Large numbers of temples—often every temple—except the city temple and the Confucian temple—are being converted into schools and colleges, while scholars in their semi-foreign dress are counted by thousands.—London Times.
