

## PLANS TO REDEEM THE SWAMP LANDS.

### Agriculture Department Engaged in Demonstration.

Through the activity of Congressman Claude Kitchin and Mr. J. O. Wright, supervising drainage engineer of the United States Department of Agriculture, the important matter of draining the extensive areas of swamp lands in Eastern North Carolina is receiving the careful intelligence of the Government department and plans are making for the creation of a sentiment to result in legislation looking to the redemption to agriculture of the large tract of exceedingly fertile lands now covered with water and practically useless and valueless, except for the timber upon them.

At the instance of Mr. Kitchin, Mr. Wright and an engineer of the department, Mr. Kipp, this spring spent considerable time in the Eastern section of the State, examining conditions and making maps and surveys of the lands susceptible to profitable drainage with the view of being prepared at the proper time to make an unanswerable demonstration as to the value of the work proposed. Mr. Wright, among other places, visited Cherry, in Washington county, and made an examination of conditions there, also making an address to the people on the necessity of improving the Scuppernon river and reclaiming the large amount of over-flowed swamp lands surrounding Phelps lake in that county. Mr. Kipp, of the department, remained at Cherry and ran levels and has since prepared maps of the vicinity. Mr. Kipp has, also, since visited New Bern where he spent several weeks in the work of examining the swamps in that neighborhood and running levels. Both Mr. Wright and Mr. Kipp are enthusiastic over the possibilities for drainage in the State and in answer to a letter of Chief Justice Clark. Mr. Wright also directed Mr. Kipp to write and inspect the lands lying along the Roanoke river which are covered with water and susceptible of being drained.

During the season both these gentlemen express their willingness to visit sections of the State that may be interested in the problem of reclaiming large bodies of lands from the water or from swampy conditions explaining the matter to the people and preparing the preliminary maps for the promotion of the work.

During a recent visit to Raleigh, in a trip to include several of the Southern States, Mr. Wright conferred with Governor Glenn, the Board of Agriculture and with the Chief Justice who is much interested in the plan of drainage as applied to the now profitless lands in the East.

In discussing the drainage problem while in Raleigh Mr. Wright said that the department of agriculture was particularly desirous of seeing a sentiment created in North Carolina in favor of reclaiming the very large amount of swamp lands that can be made fit for agriculture and at the same time improve the sanitary condition of the State so as to induce settlers to come in and occupy these lands. Much work of this kind has been done in Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Arkansas, Louisiana and South Carolina with very gratifying results. The work has paid a handsome profit on the money expended and farm values have increased

until much of the land in these States that was formerly worth \$3 to \$5 an acre now sells for \$100 to \$150. The soil, said Mr. Wright, is just as fertile and the climate more desirable in Eastern North Carolina, and there is no reason why much of this land should not be reclaimed and brought into cultivation.

In order to carry out reform of this kind, he said, the first step is to create a sentiment in favor of doing the work. This can best be done by calling attention to what has been done in other places, establishing a few object lessons, and showing the people the increased benefits that must necessarily come from the policy of drainage. The next step is to show the people the character of damage required, how it can be accomplished, and what it will cost. The third step is to then provide the means for doing the work.

With these ends in view, said Mr. Wright, the department has started out to instruct the people in North Carolina as to the best methods of draining and making fit for cultivation some of the swamp lands, and he believes that by the end of the year much could be done toward draining some of these now worthless lands and making them fit for field crops and truck farming. Possibly next season an arrangement might be made whereby the department could co-operate with some of the most interested localities and make a survey of one or more districts and show by an actual example what thoroughly drained land will produce in that locality.

In the meantime, those interested in the movement are considering the advisability of getting the next State legislature to enact a general drainage law similar to the laws of Iowa, Arkansas, or Illinois, so that the work can be carried on without becoming a burden to the people. Without such a law no material progress will be made and only those having ready money will be able to join in the movement.

In talking over the drainage question and its bearing on the future of the State, Chief Justice Clark pointed out that there is now in North Carolina an area of lands capable of drainage amounting to 77,000 square miles—as much land as is comprised in England, Scotland and Wales. The Government, he said, had recently taken a very active interest in the work of reclaiming lands both by irrigation and drainage and had surveyed large areas in the North and West especially. In Indiana and Illinois and in other States large portions of their swamp lands have been successfully drained, the State and county laws having proven very effective and valuable to the entire States interested.

The result of intelligent drainage work in North Carolina, he said, would be to open up vast tracts of fertile land to cultivation and would make the entire section wonderfully prosperous. Applied to Eastern North Carolina the drainage system would not only result in very nearly doubling the capacity of the land cultivation, but would also render the entire section much more healthful by eliminating the mosquito and, consequently, the prevalence of malaria which in some sections is so malignant as to render them almost uninhabitable except by those who, through long inoculation with the poison, have become immune.

## IS A COOK A MULE?

## Jack Pittman Drowned.

A phone message from Belhaven brings the sad intelligence that Mr. Jack Pittman, 17-year old son of Mr. Frank Pittman, formerly of this county, was drowned there about 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Young Pittman with several companions was bathing in the river when the accident took place. He was a brother of Miss Inez Pittman and a nephew of Mr. T. R. Moore, of Greenville.

Owing to its magnificent water facilities, its adaptability to cheap railroad construction, its rich soil and the climate that renders trucking a great and profitable industry, Eastern North Carolina, said Judge Clark is destined to become the most thickly populated section of the State. The first step is to make it healthy, and the first step towards its healthfulness is its proper drainage.

In line with the general idea of drainage of lands capable of cultivation, is the contemplated drainage by the Government of the Dismal Swamp, of which a complete survey has already been made. Curiously the level of the swamp, which is now uninhabited and unhealthy, is sixteen feet higher than that of the surrounding country. It can therefore be thoroughly drained and its soil, that has been becoming richer and richer through centuries, can be utilized and its now unavailable timber marketed. With the completion of the inland waterway and the drainage of the Dismal Swamp there will be opened to the world a great and long isolated section of the most fertile and productive lands in the State.—Raleigh News and Observer.

ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

A Little Care Will Prevent Flatirons Becoming Rusty.

Many housekeepers are annoyed by their flatirons becoming rusty from dampness in the cupboard. This may be easily prevented. Before putting the irons away after the ironing is finished rub them with a little warm grease on a piece of soft paper and wrap them in thick brown paper. When they are to be used again dip them into very hot water with a little soda dissolved in it and wipe them dry before putting them over the fire to heat. When taken from the fire for the ironing have some brown paper on the table with a little powdered both brick on it, and rub the iron on this. Have a piece of paraffin tied in a muslin bag, rub this lightly over the iron, then polish it on a soft cloth. It takes longer to tell this than the actual work does, but the process makes the iron delightfully smooth and easy to use, and consequently one may get over the clothes more quickly.

Apple Jelly.

Quarter and core but do not pare the apples; put into porcelain lined kettle, cover with cold water and bring to a boiling point. Turn into a bag and drain overnight. Allow three-quarters of a pound of sugar to a pint of juice. Boil the juice ten minutes. Add the sugar and boil ten minutes more. Skim and pour into jelly glasses and cover the glasses over with a piece of common glass to keep out dust while cooling. Next morning cover the tumblers with tissue paper or tops and keep in a dark closet. If the jelly seems thin cover it with glass and let it stand in the sun for a day or more until it thickens.

Preserving Orange Peel.

When you have peeled oranges for dessert do not throw the peeling away. Instead cut it into about inch long pieces with scissors and then put it on the stove in cold water and let it come to a boil. Then cook a cup of sugar and a half cup of water until it is the consistency of sirup. Throw in the orange peel and let it boil in the sirup until it is soft enough to be pierced with a broom straw. Then dip out piece by piece, roll on a sheet of brown paper, being careful not to let the pieces touch each other.

Cleaning Silk Lace.

Laces that are embroidered with silk and colors, tinsel or gold and silver should be spread out smoothly on a piece of spotlessly white calico and be cleaned carefully with a soft brush dipped in spirits of wine. If silk lace is much discolored it should be soaked in hot milk for three hours before being washed. No starch must be used, and the lace must be kept very carefully covered while it is being ironed.

To Drive Out Flies.

To rid the kitchen of flies take a small stove shovel, heat it red hot and pour over it a few drops of carbolic acid, having closed all doors and windows. In a few minutes open the room and the flies will be found to have entirely disappeared. Only a faint odor of the fumes of carbolic will remain, which will serve to prevent the flies from again congregating.

Mixture For Filling Cracks.

Soak newspapers in a paste of half a pound of flour, half a pound of alum and three quarts of water. Mix together and boil. This mixture, which should be as thick as putty, may be forced into cracks, in floors, wainscoting, etc., with a case knife. It hardens like papier mache, neatly and permanently filling any cracks to which it may be applied.

Fried Savory Eggs.

Shell carefully six hard boiled eggs. Beat up an egg and dip the shelled eggs in it, then roll them in a mixture of fine breadcrumbs, grated ham and minced parsley, seasoned with pepper, and fry in boiling fat to a good brown. Place on a hot dish and serve with hot tomato sauce poured around.

Potato Ribbons.

Wash and peel the potatoes in the ordinary way. Now begin peeling again around and around, just as if you were peeling an apple. Be careful not to break the ribbons. Drop into fat and fry to a delicate brown. Drain on paper spread on a sieve. Keep hot until all are fried.

For the Eyelashes.

Strain strong sage tea, add a teaspoonful of alcohol to a pint of the tea and apply it to the eyelashes with a soft brush once a day to darken them and stimulate their growth.

MEXICO'S SPORT.

A Duel Between Two Game Roosters Is the National Craze.

What a baseball game is to an American, a cricket match to an Englishman or a bullfight to a Spaniard, so is a duel between two game roosters to our neighbor, the Mexican. Just as a red blooded American will rise up and howl when "Casey" or some other local star of balldom gets a clean two bagger, so will a Mexican cheer and clap his hands as he sits in a seat at the cockpit and sees his favorite rooster deliver the death stroke to a feathered opponent.

In Mexico every city has its cockpit. Some are more pretentious than others, but they all bear the same relation to the public—that of a place where a surplus of energy may be worked off and action may be had on one's surplus change.

A cockpit as a rule is not an inviting place. Most of them consist of a roof with circus seats surrounding a two foot circular board fence under it. Inside the fence is the seat of operations—the pit. In the pit the owners of the fighting cocks gather. They bring their roosters with them under their arms and display them to the bettors outside the ring. Each one tells of the virtues of his own particular fowl and explains how impossible it would be for that fowl to lose a fight.

Matches are arranged after the cocks are all assembled, vocal challenges being issued and accepted or declined, as the case may be. If Juan Solorosa chooses to pit his rooster against Hilario Valencia's he tells Valencia so, and Valencia agreeing, a crier announces to the crowd that a match has been arranged. All cocks wear a gaff about three inches long and as sharp as a needle. When the cock is not fighting a scabbard is kept over the gaff to prevent him from committing suicide by falling on his own feet.

After the match has been arranged and all bets are placed the ring is cleared, scabbards are returned from gaffs, the cocks are held in the air by their owners and teased a little to make them angry. Then they are pointed at each other and set free. Sometimes one stroke of the gaff ends the fight, sometimes an hour passes before either cock delivers a fatal thrust, but the fight is always to the death. Neither fowl is taken from the pit until one of them is dead.

When the match is over bets are collected, the porter from the hotel on the hill calls for the dead cock (and he is as stringy as he was gamy), and another fight is arranged. Spectators watch each thrust as carefully and as interestedly as you watch Jimmy Burke when he steps up to the "plate" with his cap pulled down over his eyes, a man on second base and the score a tie in the last half of the ninth inning. And if Jimmy hits for two bases under those conditions no more enthusiasm is displayed than follows a good thrust by a game rooster in a Mexican cockpit. Your true Mexican will miss his Sunday dinner and be late to supper on a busy day at the pit.—Kansas City Star.

Curious Personalities of Inventors.

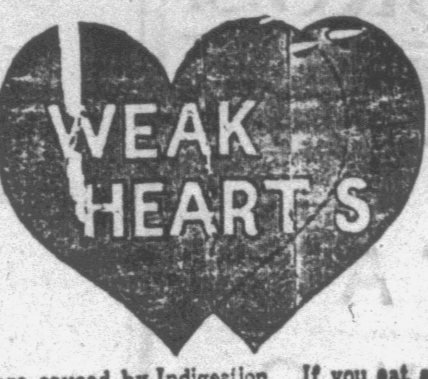

Albrecht of the Wilhelm hospital the other night spoke on the subject before the Vienna Medical society, declaring that he had discovered the specific agent that caused the complaint. There had for some time been a suspicion that a kind of bacillus was at the bottom, but Dr. Albrecht felt himself able to assert that the whooping cough bacillus was identical with that of influenza. The doctor was able also to give a number of interesting details of his experiments and their results, which seem to be on parallel lines with work done by Drs. Bordet and Gengon of the Brussels Pasteur Institute.
