### STEEL BRIDGES.

#### To Be Built at Greenville and Grifton.

The board of county commissioners let the contract to a bridge building company of Owego, N. Y. for a steel bridge across Tar river at Greenville. As it is thought best not to have the old bridge torn up during the tobacco season, work will not begin on the new bridge until early next spring. This will also give ample time for getting all the material ready and delivered so that when the work starts it can be carried on without delay. It is expected to have the bridge completed by June 1st of next year and the cost will be \$41,000.

The commissioners of Pitt and Lenior counties have also jointly made a contract with the same company for a steel bridge across the river at Grifton. It is expected that this bridge will be completed by March 1st next year and the cost will be \$14,000.

#### First Lady of The Land Puts Ban on Corsets.

Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt has essayed the role of reformer. It is not the railroads, the corporations nor the nature fakirs that have fallen under the ban of the first lady of the land. According to an intimate friend, the president's wife has decided to discard her corsets. All of the feminine instruments of torture in her wardrobe will be thrown into the garbage heap and she will hereafter wage unceasing warfare against them. If Mrs. Roosevelt is successful in her crusade, the corset will be relegated to the limbo of antiquity, along with the hoopskirt and the bustle. As a result the wasplike waist bids fair to go out of fashion, and the Venus form, long admired but seldom emulated, is to have its inning.

Mrs. Roosevelt's action as a sartorial reformer is not without precedent. When Mrs. Cleveland was America's first lady, she placed an eternal taboo on the bustle and put the ban of official displeasure on that hideous instrument of deformity. At that time the bustle had grown to enormous size and caused the American woman to assume a resemblance to the humpbacked ship of the desert. Mrs. Cleveland's example was speedily followed by the nation's femininity and the bustle became a back number.

AND THE SLEEP WE LOST!

The Tarboro Southerner of the 11th says:

"As was expected the Eastern Training school for teachers will be located at Greenville. All along there has been a confidence on the part of the citizens of that town that the school would be located there, that taken into conjunction with the juggling on June 27th, is suspicious."

And the same paper elsewhere in the same issue also says:

"Before the State Board of Education met there were persons in Greenville offering to bet five to one that Greenville would get the State school. Who of the board can explain this confidence?"

What an eye opener this is! Just to think of the terrible anxiety through which Greenville passed, when it all could have been escaped if we had only known what the Southerner seems to have known. Why, just after the State Board of Education announced a postponement of the matter to the 10th of July, the southerner jumped flat footed on the board and said the postponement was to give the town which it was predetermined should have the school an opportunity to increase its bid, the inference being that some other town had bid higher.

This actually made cold chills run down Greenville's back. We knew Greenville had made the highest bid that went in to the board on the 5th of June, that we had bid all we had, and if any such purpose was up the sleeve of the board as the Southerner suggested Greenville was a goner. And our folks went around with long faces losing sleep night after night, when it all might have been spared if the Southerner had just told us it was all fixed for Greenville.

And "persons in Greenville betting five to one that Greenville would get the school?" Great guns! Greenville was too near scared to death to bet anything, even a coca-cola. No sir, Greenville was on thorns and stayed on thorns for fear of losing the school, until the glad news came that it was ours. Then we let go and rejoiced.

Judge Alton B. Parker, Democratic candidate for president in the last election, has been in North Carolina the past week, and delivered an address before the Bar Association in session at Hendersonville.

Keep in mind that the called meeting of the Chamber of Commerce next Tuesday afternoon is an important one, and every business man of the town who can do so should be present. Let no one think there will be enough present to attend the business with out him and stay away.

BLUCHER IN PARIS.

The Spirit of Destruction That Animated the Old Soldier.

Humboldt's successful intervention to save the Jardin des Plantes from the wrath of Blucher serves as a reminder that that tough old soldier needed many humane advisers to keep him from destroying objects dear and important to the French.

Wellington had often interceded with him, and that not invariably with immediate success. He resolved to blow up the bridge of Jena. Wellington protested. "But the French destroyed the pillar at Rosbach, and so on," grumbled Blucher, "and the English burned Washington." Wellington, seeing that words were ineffective, placed English sentries on the bridge, believing that the Prussians would not make any attempt on the structure while these men were in position. But they did.

They mined one of the pillars and put in a charge of gunpowder and fired it. The charge exploded in the wrong way and damaged the Prussians, leaving the bridge and the Englishmen on top in safety. This having failed, Blucher sought permission to demolish the column in the Place Vendome. The king of Prussia arrived only just in time to prevent it.

Wellington managed better when dealing direct with the French. An almost unexampled instance of his chivalry was forthcoming in the movements preceding the battle of Orthez, the only battle in which he received an injury. The French had retreated over the bridge of the Gave lu Pau and were preparing to blow it sky high. The duke realized that if this were done it would cause great injury to the people of Orthez, so he sent an officer to Soult with a message.

A battle would doubtless take place on the following day, he said, and he promised that if Soult would spare the bridge the British army would not cross by it. Soult had been reluctant to consent to the destruction, for the bridge was on French territory, and he willingly took his rival's word and left it intact. Wellington kept his promise. He led his men, under a heavy fire, across the river by way of the fords, and the bridge stands to this day.—London Chronicle.

Specially Fattened.

A poulticer who had received a large order for specially fattened chickens asked what the chef wished them fed on.

"Why, I don't know," said the customer. "I supposed you would know about that."

"I do know," said the poulticer, "but if I go ahead without instructions I may not suit you. You see, there are as many ways to fatten a chicken as there are to kill a cat. ### THE CLOCKS OF PARIS.

The municipality of Paris is about to ask for estimates for the winding up and supervision of its clocks. The task of looking after the municipal clocks of Paris is a somewhat formidable one and costs the city on an average \$12,000-\$4,000 for the clocks in the offices of the Hotel de Ville, its annexes and the communal schools of Paris, and \$8,000 for those which decorate the facades of the public buildings. The contractor for the first lot has to marshal every fortnight a veritable army, who divide into sections the 350 schools, representing 8,000 clocks, and the municipal clocks, which number 3,000. One of the principal watch and clock makers of Paris usually receives the contract to attend to the winding up of the timepieces on the outside of the public buildings. They are mostly of delicate mechanism and are about eighty in all, twenty for the mairies, twelve for the educational establishments, thirty for the barracks, two for the prisons, two for the corn market and the market of La Chapelle, one for the bourse and one for the St. Bernard market.

### The New Order of Things.

### The Leaning Tower of Pisa.

The leaning tower of Pisa is peculiar in that it deviates about fourteen feet from the perpendicular a peculiarity not due to original design. Beginning to keel over at the completion of the third story, the architects deliberately accepted the conditions and, adhering to the inclination, diminished the slope of the upper stories so as to keep the center of gravity well within the walls. The height of the tower is 180 feet. Its cost, reckoned in American money, was \$250,000.
