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DR. ISAAC L. CHESTNUT DEAD.

Was a Sufferer From Paralysis and Died White at Charlottesville.

News has been received of the death of the Rev. Isaac Chestnut at Charlottesville, Va. Dr. Chestnut had been a sufferer from paralysis for several years and was at Charlottesville, on account of his health, when the end came.

For several years he has lived in Spottsylvania county with his family. He is survived by his wife and several children. Up to the time of his death Dr. Chestnut was a preacher in the Disciple church at one time he conducted a private school in this city. He was a man of deep consecration, devoted to his life work and a student of ability. His remains were buried at Holliday cemetery in Greene county yesterday—Kinston Free Press, 22nd.

Some years ago Mr. Chestnut served the Mt. Pleasant church, near Greenville, and was well known through this section.

WOOD AND WILSON AT LIBERTY

Penalty Clause Held to be Unconstitutional by Judge Pritchard

Asheville, N. C., July 22.—The Federal court was jammed and crowded with interested spectators today when at a few minutes after twelve o'clock, Judge J. C. Pritchard rendered his decision in the habeas corpus proceedings instituted last week for the release of District Passenger Agent J. H. Wood and Ticket Seller O. C. Wilson, of the Southern Railway Company, convicted and sentenced to the county chain gang for violating the new State rate law. The decision of Judge Pritchard ordering the release of Wood and Wilson and declaring the penalty clause of the new rate law unconstitutional required fully half an hour in the rendering.

The action of the court in declaring unconstitutional the penalty clause of the rate, while not entirely unexpected here, nevertheless excited intense interest. Prior to the rendering of the opinion Judge Pritchard was requested to postpone the decision until Speaker E. J. Justice could arrive in Asheville, it being stated that he was then on his way to this city. It was stated that Governor Glenn had telegraphed the request, but Judge Pritchard declined to grant this request, holding that the State was ably represented.

150 Drowned off California Coast.

San Francisco, Cal., July 22.—In one of the worst marine disasters in the history of the California coast, between one hundred and hundred and fifty lives were lost, as far as has been learned, by a midnight collision between the steamer Columbia and the steam lumber schooner San Pedro, in Shelter Cove, twelve miles southwest of the Medicine-Humboldt county line, between twelve and one o'clock yesterday morning.

ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Care of the Face and Hands in Hot Weather—Home Notes.

Few things are more unpleasant to endure or to have to contemplate than a hot, shiny face, or to have to shake hands with a person afflicted with damp, yet hands. To attempt to remedy a shiny face by the too frequent use of a powder puff results frequently in a blotchy complexion. Even on the hottest days the face may be kept quite cool by bathing it in hot water and then giving it a cold douche. A small piece of alum dissolved in the water in which you wash your hands will render them dry and cool.

A good lotion for summer freckles is made as follows: Take the strained juice of one lemon, half an ounce of pure vinegar, one ounce of alcohol, ten drops of oil of cedar, ten drops of oil of lavender and about five ounces of rosewater. Mix the lemon juice and vinegar together; add the alcohol, in which the oils of cedar and lavender have been dissolved. Pour into an eight ounce bottle and fill up with rosewater. Put this lotion on the face at night before going to bed and wash off in the morning with warm water followed by cold.

Homemade Liniment.

Place in a quart bottle a pint of best kerosene oil, add as much camphor gum as will dissolve in same, putting in a cake at a time and shaking well for three or four days. When the kerosene has absorbed all the camphor gum it will take add a half pint of sweet oil, shake vigorously, and it is ready for use. The odor of kerosene is not noticeable.

For Falling Hair.

A simple hair grower and one that is often very effective is made by combining sixteen ounces of eau de cologne with two ounces of pure castor oil. Part the hair with a comb and rub in the liquid with the finger ends, parting the hair over and over again until the preparation has been distributed over the entire scalp.

Selecting a Broom.

A heavy broom should always be selected in preference to a light one for thorough sweeping, as the weight aids in the process. In buying a broom test it by pressing the edge against the floor. If the straws bristle out and bend, the broom is a poor one, for they should remain in a firm, solid mass.

To Freshen Black Lace.

Ladies who have rolls of old black lace put by and want to make it fresh again should make some green tea and while it is boiling hot hold the lace over it so that it is completely steamed, pulling it well out with the hand during the process, and at once iron it between paper.

Pitch and Wheel Grease Stains.

To remove pitch, wheel grease or tar stains soften the spots with lard, soak in turpentine, scrape off carefully with a knife all the loose surface dirt and sponge with turpentine. Rub gently until dry and then place in open air for a couple of hours.

Cement For Wood, Metal or China.

Mix litharge with glycerin to the consistency of thick cream or use thin putty. It must have time to harden—always a week—and will stand the action of either hot or cold water, as well as intense heat.

Blue Stockings.

According to an English magazine the appellation "blue stockings" originated in the dress of a Benjamin Stillingfleet, grandson of the bishop, as he used to appear at the parties of Mrs. Montague, in Portman square. He used generally to wear blue worsted stockings, and he was a very amiable and entertaining man. Whenever he was absent from Mrs. Montague's evening parties, as his conversation was very interesting, the company used to say, "We can do nothing without the blue stockings." By degrees the assemblies were called "blue stocking clubs" and learned people "blue stockings."

QUEER OLD CUSTOMS.

Guernsey Island is a Place Where Things Are Different. In Harper's latest Shackleton writes of the many curious rotations, old time customs and unique conditions in Guernsey, one of the Channel Islands:

"I found it in everything Guernsey is the place that is different. Men are of age at twenty; the weekly half holiday is on Thursday; the gallon is 5 per cent smaller than the English; to reduce English pounds of weight to Guernsey pounds one must multiply by twenty-nine and divide by thirty-two, and one is given thirteen Guernsey pennies for every English shilling.

"Is it tax paying day or quarter day? Behold a long line of islanders with wagons and other islanders with panniers, for parts of rents and taxes are payable in wheat and corn, in butter and eggs and chickens and cels, and contracts calling for chickens are likely to specify the minimum length of 'queue.'"

"Does a man wish to sell or devise his real estate? He is not a free agent. The eldest son has the right indefeasible to the house and to part of the land, and the other children have the right to the remainder. If there are no children and the man makes a deed of sale, it must be publicly announced, and any one of kin as near as the seventh degree may stop the transaction and purchase the land himself. One easily understands why land remains in the same families for generations.

"A man dies, leaving personal property. It is divided into as many shares, plus one, as there are children. The eldest son selects two shares, and the other children choose one each in order of age, the original division, to insure fairness, having been made by the youngest, who, perforce, takes the share that is finally left."

Why Tabby For Cat?

A Florentine authority says that when we use the word "tabby" associated with cat we go back to the time when Mohammed named Attab governor of Mecca. Then, later on, there was a quarter in Bagdad called "Atta Biyah," where cloth was made of silk and cotton, which material was famous in the eleventh century. The Spanish Moors made this stuff, which was striped, and so in time "tabby cloth" became common in Europe; hence in low Latin "attabia," in Spanish "tabbi," in French, "tabis" and in German "tabin." Pepys tells of "taby waistcoats with gold lace," and in the eighteenth century there are many references to "tabby silks" worn by great ladies. Today in the south tabby means a striped stuff.

Founder of Modern Geology.

The early history of geology consisted of two schools, the one insisting on the doctrine of catastrophes, the other on the doctrine of uniformity. The former regarded those changes which have manifestly taken place in the history of the planet as having occurred at epochs abruptly, while the other school, reposing on the principle of the invariability of the laws of nature, insisted that affairs have always gone on at the same rate and in the same way as they do now. Of this latter school Sir Charles Lyell (born 1797, died 1875) was the creator.—New York American.
