STOLE COMMUNION WINE.

Somebody Has Dropped Low in the Scale of Morality.

The yearly meeting at Briery Swamp Primitive Baptist church, in Carolina township, closed Sunday. A very large crowd was present, as is usual at that place. At 9 o'clock Sunday morning Elder T. M. Lawrence baptised two persons who were received into the membership of the church.

At the conclusion of his sermon Sunday Elder Lawrence made a statement which he said gave him pain to utter, as he had never known such an occurrence as had been called to his attention that morning. One of the deacons of the church who had charge of the preparation for the communion service, took the bread and wine with him to the church building and left it there while he went on to attend the baptism. Returning from the baptism it was found that somebody had been in the church and stolen a considerable portion of the wine.

Of course this was the act of a depraved person or persons, and if discovered proper punishment should follow such disgraceful conduct.

Secret Societies Denounced by High-School Principals.

The attitude of high-school principals in general may be arrived at from the answers to a set of 185 letters sent out all over the country asking an expression of opinion on the high-school fraternity question. Out of the 185 only three spoke in favor of fraternities, fifty-three expressed no positive opinion but were inclined to look on them with disfavor, one said they would do no harm if properly managed, and 128 spoke against them in unqualified terms. The denunciation of them by some principals is most stern and severe. The principal of the high school at Albany, N. Y., includes the statements of many others in his sweeping assertion: "The high-school secret societies are thoroughly pernicious in their influence. I am unable to discover one redeeming feature connected with them, while their demoralizing influence is constant and thoroughly evident."

Others thoughtfully and unhesitatingly put down such statements as: "They are apt to degenerate into smoking and gambling clubs on the part of boys and frivolous, gossipy, idle places on the part of the girls;" "they are not maintained for the purpose of cultivating the nobler side of young men, or developing in them pure thought;" "they quickly become social clubs where are cultivated the worst tastes and practices between young people"; "the members do unmanly deeds as a body in secret that not one would think of doing openly."—From "Are Secret Societies a Danger to Our High Schools?" by Marion Melius, in the American Review of Reviews for September.
