## UP TO THE RAILROAD.

### Newspapers Do Not Make Time Tables.

It is a rule with newspapers to pay no attention to communications when it is not known from whom they come. But The Reflector received one Saturday from Grimesland, that even while not accompanied by the name of the person sending it, can be noticed. It is the time table of the Norfolk & Southern railroad clipped from this paper, and on the margin of it is written the question if we do not know where Grimesland is at. Then through the time table is drawn a line showing that Grimesland is between Chocowinity and Greenville from which we infer that the sender of it would like for us to insert Grimesland in the time table, as it does not appear there.

### Killed by Witch Engine.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 28.—Mrs. Her Holmes and Mrs. U. G. Munsell, of Springfield, Mass., delegates to the convention of Bible students of America in session here, were run down by a Norfolk & Western switch engine in this city tonight almost within sight of their husbands, and instantly killed. No headlight was on the tender of the engine, nor was there a flagman on the running-board as the train backed out of the Merchants & Miners warehouse across Main street. The crew declare they heard no screams and saw no one, although eye witnesses say that the women shrieked for help at the top of their voices. Caught by the brake beam of the tender, their clothing became entangled in the rods and they were dragged for several hundred yards. Their bodies were found a few feet apart.

It was a pathetic sight. Recognizing the body as that of his wife, Mr. Munsell gave a groan and then ran to tell his friend, Mr. Holmes, of the accident. Passing the body of Mrs. Holmes he hurried toward the foot of Jackson street, where he met Mr. Holmes. The latter was greatly overcome and was prevented from jumping into the dock by the police.

### Good Description.

For instance, Theodore Roosevelt, in his life of Benton, says: "A political machine can only be brought to a state of high perfection in a party containing very many ignorant and uneducated voters. ## STATE NEWS.

Mr. W. F. Harding lost \$60 yesterday between his home and the Trust Building. Charlotte Observer.

Enfield, N. C., Sept. 28.—The new Enfield Knitting Mills made a start this week and it is pleasant to hear the whistle. From 75 to 100 hands will be given employment but the force will be doubled as fast as possible.

Salisbury, Sept. 28.—John Lewis Heilig, 16-year-old boy, the son of Mr. K. P. Heilig, died about noon today after a day's suffering from a horrible accident of yesterday.

Wilmington, Sept. 28.—L. S. Powell, 28 years old, had both his legs mashed off up to the knee early this morning at the plant of the Whiteville Lumber Company, at Whiteville, Columbus county, where he was employed. He was brought to the hospital here for treatment, but died within an hour after reaching the institution.

Statesville, Sept. 28.—The report got abroad in Statesville to-night that the postoffice at Taylorsville was robbed last night of \$1,200 and that the robbers had stolen a horse and buggy from a livery stable there and left town, coming towards Statesville.

The young man was employed by the Grace Furniture Company, doing business on the main line of the Southern, and about 2 o'clock yesterday was adjusting a belt that runs the machinery. The stick which he was using was caught up by the wheels and jerked him into the machinery. The most frightful of internal injuries resulted, and so badly battered was he that he never could give an intelligible account of his misfortune.

Fayetteville, N. C., Sept. 18.—Luther and James Cam, two young white men were tried before Squire Overby on a charge of malicious mischief. James was discharged, while Luther was bound over to the Superior Court in the sum of \$50. The defendants were charged with putting three drams of powder in a pipe, which they induced another young white man to smoke, with the result that the latter was seriously injured about the face and eyes by the explosion which followed. This occurred near Flea Hill church, all the young men being from that township.

Winston-Salem, Sept. 28.—Insanity, which was of two years' standing, is the cause given for the suicide this morning of Zoily C. Church son of Mr. T. L. Church, a prosperous merchant of Ready Branch, 13 miles from Wilkesboro. The suicide lived in the same neighborhood. The lifeless body of Church was found about 10 o'clock this morning, dangling from a rope suspended from a joist in his barn. The family missed him about 9 o'clock and began a search for him. He was cold in death when found. Church leaves a wife and several children.
