## COTTON MEETING

### President Moore Calls This for Raleigh Wednesday of State Fair.

A great meeting of the cotton farmers of North Carolina is to be held in Raleigh on Wednesday, October 16, this in the Great State Fair Week. Railroad rates are especially low.

The meeting is to be an important one and it should be attended by all cotton farmers who can come. The Southern Cotton Association recently set 15 cents a pound as the price for cotton and it is now selling for less than twelve cents. This will be one matter considered, and President C. C. Moore of the Southern Cotton Association in his call for the convention, published below, says cotton will sell at 15 cents before the next crop is made.

### Call for the Convention

The call for convention is as follows:

The cotton farmers of North Carolina will hold the fall convention at Raleigh, on Wednesday, October 16.

President Harvie Jordan will be present and will address the convention on matters that will be of interest to every man in the state.

A call for delegates from farmers in every township where cotton is grown and from every town and city where cotton is marketed. Every section of the state where cotton is grown or marketed should at once select delegates to represent their section at this important meeting.

Farmers, merchants, hold your cotton from market when price is declining, do not depress price by selling on declining market.

Cotton is worth 15 cents commercially and will sell for 15 cents before another crop is made.

## JESSE LEMUEL SUGG.

### Death of an Excellent Citizen

Friday night the 4th inst. at a few minutes after 10 o'clock, Mr. Jesse Lemuel Sugg passed away at his residence on Fifth street. He had been sick for some months and the end was not unexpected, yet his death brings great sorrow to many hearts.

Mr. Sugg was some past 57 years of age, having been born in Greene county April 29th 1850. He moved to Greenville in 1882 and engaged in the insurance business here, conducting a successful agency for twenty-five years. He was popular as an agent, and enjoyed the highest esteem and confidence of our people.

November 14th, 1884, he married Miss Minnie L. Linn, and is survived by the wife and three little daughters. He also leaves two brothers, Col. I. A. Sugg, of Greenville and Mr. B. F. Sugg, of Washington, and one sister, Mrs. Henry Harding, of Greenville.

Mr. Sugg made Greenville a useful citizen, and once served as a member of the board of aldermen. He was public spirited, generous, a good neighbor and a warm friend.

He was a member of the Methodist church and also of the Masonic fraternity, and was faithful in his duties to both.

The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon, the remains leaving his late residence at 3 o'clock. Services will be held at the Methodist church and at Cherry Hill cemetery, the interment being with Masonic honors.

## ORIGIN OF SUNDIALS.

### The Chaldeans, It is Said, Made the First Ones Used.

The Chaldeans claim the honors of the first sundial, and from them the knowledge of it found a way through Egypt and Greece. Herodotus says that the Greeks learned from the Chaldeans the art of making dials and dividing the day into twelve parts, and while many allusions are found in Greek literature bearing on the length of a shadow in telling the time of day no explanation is given of how this measuring is done. A story is told of a man who was invited to dine when a shadow was twenty feet long, which was about the hour of 5 in the afternoon, according to the host's reckoning, but the over-anxious guest mistook the invitation to read according to morning shadows and arrived before the feast was served.

This story finds a parallel in the memories of many who have visited in secluded mountain districts where the mountaineers tell the time of day by the shadows that creep from summit to summit. The Arabs were the very first to introduce sundials showing the hours of equal length. The oldest now in existence, however, give signs of Greek workmanship. One is found in Egypt at the base of Cleopatra's Needle, and another, the most pretentious of sundials, is in Athens—the Temple of the Winds, in reality an octagonal building with a dial on each of the eight sides. Many Greek dials were hemicycle in form, while those of the Scandinavians and Saxons were vertical or horizontal.

St. Augustine introduced the Roman system into England, and many of the old churches in England have vertical sundials over the doors, and throughout England and Scotland they are frequently found on the side of houses, while the horizontal dial is used in the garden or on the lawn. In time they became the fashion, princes made gifts of them, and they were considered appropriate monuments to the dead, and they became more handsome and elaborate in design. A fine sample of the art is that at Glamis castle, which has eighty-four gnomons.

The simplest design is that primitive block of stone with a dial engraved upon it and a rude gnomon, or triangular projecting piece, which by its shadow shows the hour of the day. The word gnomon, or gnomone, is fancifully a derivation—"the know man or gnomon of a dial, the shadow whereof pointeth out the hours."—Kansas City Star.

### Egypt's Sacred Beetle.

The scarabaeus, the sacred beetle of Egypt, was an object of worship in olden days and was most carefully embalmed at death. The ancient Egyptians believed the heart to be the center of intellect as well as the source of life and removed this organ when the embalming process took place, a model of the scarabaeus being put in its place. There are many varieties of this sacred beetle, as the monuments in Egypt show. The scarab was the favorite insignia of both men and women and was worn as a charm to protect from harm and insure desirable qualities to make them attractive. Many hard stones were used for these models, and turquoise matrix, lapis lazuli, jasper, amethyst, agate and onyx were much in favor. Some of the ancient ones are cleverly cut and were used as coin of the realm. The finest are found with the mummies in old tombs.—Argonaut.

### "Billington's Sea."

There is tangible evidence that the pious passengers of the Mayflower were not entirely without a sense of humor. Back of Plymouth over the hill upon which they planted their cannon is a large fresh water pond perhaps a mile in diameter, which, it appears from the records, was discovered by John Billington while he was prowling around one night, probably on a scouting expedition looking for Indians. In the morning he reported that he had found the sea in that direction, and there was a lively dispute between him and the other pilgrims as to the accuracy of his information. He stuck to his story with the same tenacity that he adhered to his religion, and to this day that pond is called "Billington's sea."

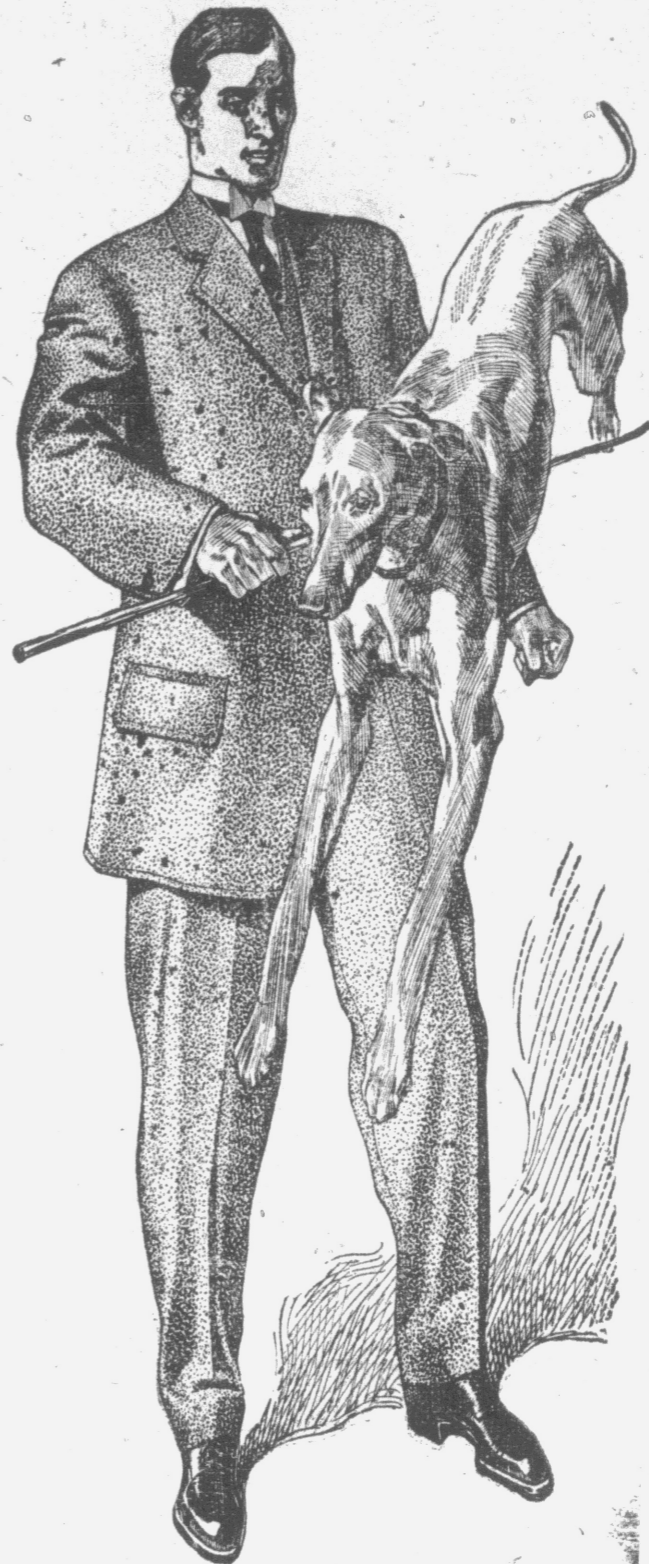
