WATCH PRESENTED.

Grifton Preparing to Move Forward.

Rev. W. J. Everton, pastor of the Methodist church at Grifton, is a very happy man. His pleasures were already great over the result of the recent prohibition election in that town, and an incident occurred Sunday morning that filled his cup of joy to overflowing. Just as the morning service in his church was about to conclude, Prof. Cole, superintendent of the graded school, arose in the congregation and in behalf of the people of the town presented Mr. Everton with a gold watch in appreciation of his efforts in the prohibition campaign. In accepting the watch the minister expressed his gratitude at such an expression of esteem from the people among whom he labored.

Mr. Everton was in Greenville today, and in talking with The Reflector about the effect of prohibition on the town and Grifton's prospects, said the town is already taking on new life and everything points to a bright future. He says that in the next year Grifton will sell more lots, erect more buildings and inaugurate more business enterprises than in any year in its history, and that prohibition is going to help the town's progress.

Happiness, Not Income, is the True Way to Measure Matrimony.

The question of the cost of matrimony comes up continually, perhaps, because it is so impossible to answer definitely, says the December Delineator.

The fact is, this money question in matrimony is not half so important as it seems. Happiness is what the average young man and woman seek in matrimony. Their personal characters, their love for each other, and their adaptability to circumstances, are more vital, and when love is young, life on small rations often becomes the happiest sort of existence, all the sweeter because of the small sacrifices entailed.

Young couples that keep house in a small way, the girl taking upon herself the household tasks, can live comparative comfort on what will support one—so far as actual living expenses are concerned. And this fact can always be relied on: when house-keeping is the method of living, one rent, one gas bill and one of all the various household accounts serves for two—even the butcher's, grocers, and baker's bills, with a little management.

Calling in Certificates.

The determination to call in the clearing house certificates and resume specie payment has taken on very definite shape, says the Atlanta Journal.

Chicago has already destroyed twenty-five thousand dollars worth of the certificates which have been paid back into the banks, and this will be continued as fast as they find their way back to the banks.

Chicago is not alone in her willingness to follow this course. The bank officials of that city have sent out one thousand letters to banks in the south and west, asking their opinion of calling in the certificates. Nine hundred and ninety-eight of these have promptly expressed their willingness to resume payment in currency, and only two have temporized about the matter.

With the exception of these two banks, they are one and all ready and willing to go back to real money. They realize that the storm is over and that the only thing which stands in the way is a certain lack of confidence. This cannot be restored absolutely and completely until the certificates have been called in and the banks once more resume specie payment.

A significant feature of this consensus of opinion taken by the Chicago banks is the fact that the banks of the south and west, where the scarcity of money has been most deeply felt, are as prompt as those of any other section of the country in their consent to the resumption of currency payments.

Facts like these cannot be discounted. It is a substantial and convincing evidence that the worst of the financial stringency is over and that business will resume its normal sway as soon as the people themselves make up their minds completely that there is nothing more to fear.

ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Directions For the Care of Children's Teeth - Domestic Notes.

The first teeth, like the second, are required for the proper mastication of the food, which is all the more necessary in the growing child, who needs more nourishment in proportion than an older person of twice his size. As soon as the teeth appear they should be cleansed with a soft cloth, and when the child is old enough a little brush should be given to him, and he should be taught how to use it. After this the mother or nurse should see that it is used regularly. The mouth of every child should be examined two or three times a year by the dentist, and any little cavities discovered should be stopped with temporary filling. Indeed, as much care should be taken of the first as of the second set of teeth, for they are just as necessary to health, beauty and comfort.

Cleaning Soiled Ribbon.

Pick out all pieces of thread. Lay ribbon down right side up on cloth covered table. If the ribbon is wide, pin down smooth as possible. Put a small piece of white soap in a dish or saucer, then put in a little cold water. Make a soft pad of old muslin. With this rub a little of the soap and water together. Commence at one end of the ribbon. Saturate a little at a time, rubbing hard on soiled places and where creases are. Keep ribbon smooth. If the cloth underneath the ribbon becomes too wet, move the ribbon. When it is perfectly clean and smooth dry without any pressing. Ribbon cleaned this way will look nearly like new.

To Clean Light Gloves.

Provide yourself with a cake of pure white soap, a little skim milk and some clean soft rags. After placing the glove on the hand dip a piece of rag into the milk and rub it on the soap. Scrub the gloves thoroughly, changing the rags as they become soiled, using as little milk as possible, so as not to wet the gloves. Gloves cleaned in this manner dry quickly and look like new even to the gloss.

Pan Broiled Salt Mackerel.

Freshen a mackerel by soaking it overnight in cold water. Dry in a towel; place flesh side down in a hot, well buttered frying pan; brown on one side, then turn and brown on the other, adding more butter as needed. When cooked through add from one-third to one-half cupful of thin cream and let it boil up well. Remove the fish to a hot platter, pour over it the gravy and garnish with parsley.

Cement For Glass.

Add one pint of vinegar to one pint of milk and separate the curds from the whey. Mix the whey with the whites of five eggs. Beat it thoroughly together and sift into it a sufficient quantity of unslacked lime to convert it into a thick paste. Broken glass or china mended with this cement will not break again and will resist the action of fire and water.

Hardwood Floor Finish.

To make a common floor look like hard wood first paint the floor with two coats of deep yellow paint. Usually one quart will do it. Then stain with one pint of stale beer mixed with 5 cents' worth of raw sienna powder. Brush hard with a brush broom and varnish.

To Clean Paint.

Take a cloth just large enough to fill the palm of hand and dip lightly in kerosene oil and go over several feet at a time. Then follow with hot water and soap, wiping dry with cloth free from lint. No matter how dirty, the paint after using oil will look good as new.

Freshening Stale Bread.

To make old bread like new when you find the bread is getting stale or dry just take the loaves and let water run on them for a second, place back into the bread tins and rebake for twenty minutes.

To Remove Splinters.

Splinters may be removed by pouring hot water in a wide mouthed bottle and then holding firmly against the flesh where the splinter is. The steam will soon remove it.

Polishing the Stove.

Use boiled linseed oil on the steel parts, rubbing on with woolen cloth. Clean nickel with whiting and ammonia and good stove polish for the top.

Cheese Salad.

Place a small cake of cottage cheese in a bed of shredded lettuce. Cover with a thick mayonnaise dressing and garnish with olives.

To Set Colors.

If fabrics are green, add vinegar to the water; if lilac or pink, a little ammonia. Salt will set the color of black and white muslin.

The Cause of Indian Summer and Origin of Its Name.

As the boys and girls all know, we usually have a season of comparatively mild, hazy weather some time in November, to which has been given the name of Indian summer. Familiar as the phenomenon is, however, few people know what causes it, chiefly perhaps because they have never tried to find out. Most of the scientists attribute the mildness of the air at that time to a change in the condition of the atmosphere, which confines to the lower strata the heat radiated from the earth's surface. This explanation is not wholly satisfactory to a layman, but it seems to be the best that the scientists can do for us. The hazy condition of the air at that time is more easily explained. It is due to the decay or the slow chemical combustion of leaves, grasses and other vegetable matter under the combined action of frost and the sun. As to the name, Indian summer, several explanations have been given of that, the most plausible being that the early settlers called it so because they believed that the smoky appearance at that time was caused by forest and prairie fires kindled by the Indians. Some people think that the name came from the fact that the Indians took advantage of that period to lay in their winter supply of game. - Chicago News.

A Trusting Monkey.

Poor little monkeys! They get hungry and tired and sleepy just like children. Here is a story of one who lives in Buffalo. He belonged to an organ grinder who stopped in front of a veranda where a kind hearted gentleman sat. When he came up and held out his little cap for a bit of money the gentleman, who is very fond of animals, gave him a red cheeked apple.

The monkey jumped upon his lap and ate the apple, and between the bites he fixed his bright eyes on the face of his new friend. He must have made up his mind that he could trust him, for as he finished the apple he laid his head against the gentleman's arm and fell asleep. The kind friend of animals paid the organ grinder to play a long time, so that the tired little monkey could have his nap. When he awoke his master pulled the chain, and he followed the organ again, much brighter and happier for the kindness shown to him.

The Water Mark in Paper.

If you will hold up to the light a sheet of writing paper you will, as a rule, see the brand of the paper or the name of the manufacturer in it. This is called the water mark, but it might with equal propriety be called the wire mark. It is made by wires placed in the molds, which have the effect of making the paper thinner there than anywhere else. The wires are fashioned so as to produce the figures or letters that the maker desires to show. The cross marks seen in many kinds of paper are likewise made by wires.

An Old Problem.

If a bottle and a cork cost \$1.10 and the bottle costs a dollar more than the cork, how much must the cork cost?

Answer. - Five cents. Because if the bottle costs \$1 more than the cork and the cork costs 5 cents the bottle must cost \$1.05. Therefore the five cent cork and the \$1.05 bottle must cost \$1.10.

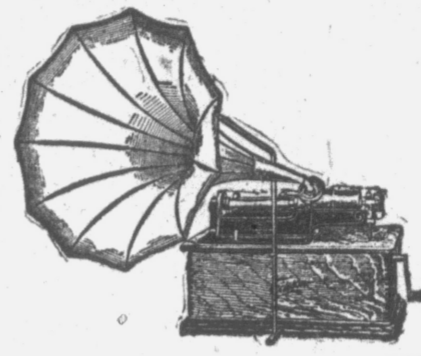
