## La Follette Beaten in Debate by Gir.

It is not generally known that the wife of Senator La Follette took her university degree in the same class with her husband, says the December Delineator.

As Miss Belle Case she vanquished "Bob" La Follette in a joint oratorical contest at the University of Wisconsin. She then permitted herself to be won by the doughty young student, and in turn pointed the way to the governorship of his native state, and, later to the United States Senate.

Before her marriage this Badger State girl had been admitted to the practice of law, and the marital partnership was followed by a business one, for a shingle, reading, "La Follette & La Follette" announced to the good people of Madison that the newly-married couple had opened an attractive office and were ready for any legal clients who might call.

The county commissioners of Guilford employ an expert every year to catch up with the folks who try to evade taxation by failing to list property and polls. The report just made for the present year shows that over 1,000 persons in Greensboro alone failed to list property or polls, the property alone amounting to over \$25,000. In the list of nonlisters of polls or property are many traveling men or drummers, who live in Greensboro or have had their headquarters and families there for years, and have never paid a cent of State, county or city taxes. Another set of non-poll taxisters are men who get very good salaries and young men who have moved to town within the past few years, but totally fail to show their sense of obligation to the State, county or city government by evading this public duty. A similar investigation in Charlotte disclosed an approximate total of \$50,000 of property unlisted for taxation. The assessors have collected \$4,000 in back taxes. In some cases some of the prominent and wealthy men of the town have not listed certain property for taxation in three to five years. One citizen, it is said, has \$35,000 of solvent credits, bank stock, bonds, etc., which he has not returned for taxation in five years, and another man holds a note against the city for \$5,000 which he has not returned. The worst feature of it is that these people are brazen in their attempts to rob the government and show no compunction of conscience about the matter. They ought to be exposed by publishing their names and let the world see who they are.

Every county in which there is a town of any size would find it profitable to make a similar investigation. One made in Buncombe a few years ago resulted in unearthing thousands of dollars worth of property that had escaped taxation. It is a singular fact, but it is true, that the more property one has the more he is disposed, in many cases, to try to escape taxation by one sort of device or another. The man of small means pays much more, in proportion to what he has, for the support of the government than his wealthier brother.—Stat-ville Land-mark.

## Eat More Candy

"Give children plenty of pure sugar, taffy and butterscotch and they'll have little need of cod-liver oil," says Dr. Woods Hutchinson in the Christmas Woman's Home Companion.

"In short sugar is, after meat, bread and butter, easily our next most important and necessary food. You can put the matter to a test very easily. Just leave off the pie, pudding or other desserts at your lunch or midday dinner. You'll be astonished to find how quickly you'll feel 'empty' again, and how 'unfinished' the meal will seem. You can't get any working man to accept a dinner pail without pie in it. And he's absolutely right. The only thing that can take the place of sugar here is beer and wine. It is a significant fact that the free-lunch counters run in connection with bars furnish every imaginable thing except sweets. Even the restaurants and lunch grills attached to saloons or bars often refuse to serve desserts of any sort. They know their business! The more sugar and sweets a man takes at a meal, the less alcohol he wants. Conversely, nearly every drinking man will tell you that he has lost his taste for sweets. The more candy a nation consumes, the less alcohol.

"The United States government buys pure candy by the ton and ships it to the Philippines to be sold at cost to the soldiers in the canteens. All men crave it in the tropics, and the more they get of it, the less rum and whiskey they want.

"In fine, the prejudice against sugar is born of puritanism and stinginess, equal parts. Whatever children cry for must be had for them, according to the pure doctrine of original sin; besides, it costs money. I know families in the rural districts yet where the head of the family groans over every dollar's worth of sugar that comes into the house as a sinful and 'unwholesome' luxury."

## Young Lady Killed.

This morning Mrs. C. S. Forbes received a telegram from Shelby announcing that a friend of hers, Miss Aileen Kendall, had been killed by a street car in Charlotte. From a special to the Raleigh News and Observer we get the following particulars of the terrible accident:

Charlotte, N. C., Dec. 2.—Miss Aileen Cabaniss Kendall, a student at the Baptist University at Raleigh, was run over and killed by an electric car on East avenue at 10 o'clock tonight, while her kinswoman, Mrs. C. C. Cabaniss, of this city, had a narrow escape, being painfully, though not seriously hurt, while Mr. Cabaniss narrowly escaped injury.

The party had alighted from one car and attempted to cross in front of a rapidly approaching car from another direction when the terrible catastrophe took place. The conductor of the car which struck the party said that the dampness of the track made the brakes difficult to control, and that the stopping of the car was more difficult.

The body of the dead girl was dragged one hundred feet down the street before the car stopped. Miss Kendall was returning from Raleigh, and was within one block of the home of her relatives when killed. The body will be taken to Shelby tomorrow for burial. The affair has created deep regret.

**ALL OVER THE HOUSE.**

Treatment For Tender and Perspiring Feet—Domestic Helps.

A splendid footbath, cooling and healing, is made by dissolving two ounces each of rock salt and borax with one of powdered alum. Put this in a wide mouthed bottle and use a tablespoonful to each gallon of water, soaking the feet well.

Where the feet perspire a great deal they are always tender and the skin soft. A healing, soothing powder that should be used after a thorough soaking and drying is made of ten grains each of powdered alum and naphthol, two-thirds of an ounce each of powdered borax and starch, a fifth of an ounce of salicylic acid, sifted with two ounces of best talcum powder.

Sift well many times through a hair sieve and be quite sure to reach every part of the feet, especially between the toes. If the footbath is taken at bedtime, the feet dried and this powder used the relief is wonderful. Such a treatment modifies all disagreeable odors from perspiration.

**To Hemstitch on the Sewing Machine.**

Hemstitching which can hardly be distinguished from the hand work and which may be done much more speedily may be done on the sewing machine in this way: First draw the number of threads desired in the goods to be hemstitched, then fold the hem over and baste the edge of the hem in the center of the drawn threads. Now loosen the tension on the sewing machine and stitch exactly along the edge of the hem. Pull the bastings out and, taking the goods in one hand and the hem in the other, pull the edge of the hem to the bottom of the drawn threads, and your work is finished.

**For Cleaning Varnish.**

Tea leaves are invaluable as a means of cleaning varnished paint. When enough have been laid aside for the work they should be put into the basin of water and left to steep for half an hour. The strained tea is used instead of water to clean varnished surfaces. The tannic acid left in tea leaves after all that is wholesome in them has been extracted acts quickly upon grime and grease.

**Washing Painted Walls.**

Get a pail of water, not too hot, with a few drops of ammonia and a nice soft flannel. Wash the walls down with soap and flannel and dry well with a soft cloth. When the walls are thoroughly dried get another pail of warm water, with a few drops of ammonia, and go over the walls with a wash leather, which gives a brilliant polish.

**For Embroidery Edges.**

Many garments are spoiled by having the embroidered edge split and frayed by a careless laundress. The garment can be made to last twice as long and many dollars saved by stitching around the scallops twice, having a loose tension. This makes a strong, firm edge and does not detract from its appearance.

**Bathing a Sick Child.**

If a child is so ill that it is necessary to bathe him in bed and there is any indication of fever, add a little vinegar to the cool water, as it has a refreshing effect upon a hot body. Instead of vinegar put some baking soda into the water if there are any eruptions on the body. It is cooling and allays any irritation.

**Rusty Nail Wound.**

Grate potato and thicken over the fire in vinegar until it becomes the consistency of salve. Apply as salve on cloth and bind to any rusty nail wound, wire cut, etc. This has been known to prevent lockjaw and blood poisoning until a physician could be called to give treatment.

**Stains on the Neck.**

A lotion which will remove the yellow stains on the neck caused by tight or high collars is made as follows: Alcohol, four ounces; rose-water, two ounces; tincture of benzoin, fifteen drops. Apply several times a day with a little sponge.

**Washing Woolen Stockings.**

Wash woolen stockings quickly in a lukewarm lather and do not let them lie in the water to soak. If they seem very much soiled, a little borax in the water will quickly cut the dirt. Rinse in the same temperature of water.

**Marking Linen.**

Write your initials or name in pencil; then carefully stitch over these lines on your sewing machine. Either red or white marking cotton can be used as a close stitch, and coarse threads give best results.

**A Kitchen Hint.**

If a glass tumbler into which very hot water must be poured is set on a tray or table during the process instead of being held in the hand it is much less apt to break.

**DOUBLE HOLIDAYS.**

Next year Washington's birthday, Memorial day and the Fourth of July all fall on Saturday, thus giving the public three double holidays. Ordinarily these three do not come on the same day of the week, but by the intervention of Feb. 29 this year Washington's birthday falls just fourteen weeks earlier than Memorial day, which regularly comes five weeks before the Fourth of July. The advantage to the busy public of having these holidays fall on Saturday, so that they have two days of leisure together, is obvious. In creating the last holiday—Labor day—advantage of this principle was taken in the selection of the first Monday instead of a selected day of the month. In 1909 Washington's birthday falls on Monday, May 30 and the Fourth of July on Sunday, which will mean a Monday observance, so that for two years in succession double holidays are assured. In the latter year Christmas will also fall on Saturday, thereby affording the most complete trial of the double holiday possible in our calendar.—Exchange.

**Canned Shark.**

"They can shark in Sweden," said a butcher. "They make of sharks' flesh a very palatable and nourishing meat extract. For several years the business has been going on, and there are now several factories engaged in it. The stuff tastes exactly like extract of beef. The fish taste is eliminated, a secret process. The sharks, which are plentiful in those waters, are first chopped up fine in big hoppers and afterward boiled down to a liquid of the consistency of thin gruel. The oil is skimmed off, a second boiling follows, then a filtering. A clear fluid then remains. This is evaporated to the thickness of molasses, seasoned with salt and sugar and sealed up in jars after the addition of some unknown chemical. It is an excellent meat extract. It hasn't a suspicion of fishiness about it. It builds up a consumptive or anaemic person as well as the best beef would do."—Los Angeles Times.

**Ice Was a Luxury.**

Thrift is the great trait of the Dutch of Pennsylvania. It shows up in many odd ways. In one fine, clean farmhouse in Lancaster county, says a writer in the Boston Transcript, some visitors were surprised at seeing a large porcelain lined, nickel-bound refrigerator standing in the parlor. One of them asked if she might look inside.

"Yes, but we only keep newspapers in it," said the farmer's wife. "Heinrich, he likes me to have a fine refrigerator, but he says we got such a cool cellar we don't need to spend no money on ice at all, so we don't use it that way." "Heinrich," it turned out, was at that moment off trading automobiles.

**A Luncheon and a Critic.**

The following is offered as a prize luncheon: Grape fruit au maraschino, strained chicken gumbo soup, broiled squab chicken, potatoes Parisienne, macaroni au gratin, fried eggplant, lettuce hearts with French dressing, cheese, crackers, diplomat pudding.

If there is anything so tasteless as a lettuce heart, name it. Grape fruit with maraschino is a fraud. Cheese crackers are not fit for the fourth stomach of an ox. And who ever heard of strained chicken gumbo soup being served to a connoisseur? You might as well serve strained macgrathian clam chowder or strained Maryland diamond back terrapin.—New York Press.

**Affected His Brain.**

According to a Danish medical journal, the Roentgen rays were recently used upon a boy five years old, who was treated in hospital for a disease of the hair. After twenty-five applications of the rays the lad was sent home cured. But whereas his nature had previously been bright and intelligent, now he became absentminded and unreliable and was sent back to the hospital. He has been for some time since under medical observation, and the pronouncement of the doctors attending the case is that the Roentgen rays can easily penetrate the thin scalp of a child and have an undesirable influence on the brain.

**An Eye to Business.**

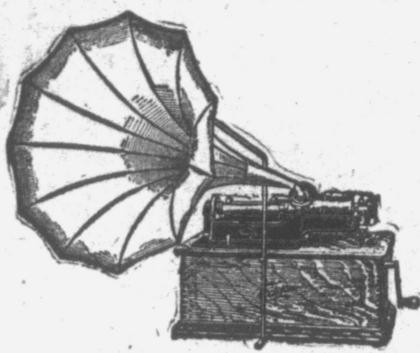
