President Moore's Letter.

Charlotte, N. C., Dec. 2, 1907.

Mr. Editor:

Permit me to call the attention of your readers to the important meeting to be held in your county court house on Saturday, December 7th.

On that day there will be meetings all over the south to discuss the financial situation, the relations of banks to farmers, the matter of changing the time for annual settlement of accounts from October to January and February, and other matters of great importance to the farmers.

President, secretary and other officers of the county cotton association are to be elected on that day. Every man in the county who is interested in maintaining a fair price for cotton should be interested in selection of officers to serve for the next twelve months. The most influential men of the county should be selected to serve as officers, and when elected, these should give their very best efforts to make the county association a means of help to every one in county.

The name and address of newly elected officers should be forwarded to this office at once.

Even the speculators and the foreign spinners admit that the cotton association has been of great benefit to the southern people. It is conceded that had there been no cotton association organization, the prices of cotton this season would have ranged below seven cents per pound. This being so, it behooves every man in the south to take part and make the movement stronger and more useful.

All over the south, mass meetings will be held on Saturday. A determined effort will be made to hold cotton now in the hands of farmers for 15 cents per pound. Reader, will you help?

The matter of collecting the dues and bale levy should be considered next Saturday. Our work has been sadly handicapped for want of funds to cover expenses. We should at once create a fund ample to cover all expenses for the next twelve months. Every farmer in your county will cheerfully contribute 10 cents a bale on the production of his lands, if the matter is properly presented to him.

Mr. Farmer, what are you doing to try to maintain a fair price for your cotton? Will you go to your court house next Saturday?

MR. BRYAN'S SUNDAY LECTURE.

Whether we agree or disagree with the political theories of Mr. William J. Bryan, says the Baltimore Sun, no one can deny his marvelous power as an orator. And it is certain that such lectures as that which he delivered in Baltimore Sunday afternoon are a powerful influence upon young men for upholding and sustaining good morals and the Christian religion. King David wrote long ago that "the fool hath said in his heart there is no God," and a celebrated preacher added that "none but a fool would have said it." Mr. Bryan seized upon the manifest weak points in the argument of those who deny the existence of God, and he dwelt upon it and impressed it upon his audience with brilliant rhetoric. Great scientists have assailed the Mosaic account of the creation and the whole narrative upon which the Christian religion is founded. But they have never advanced any other reasonable theory to account for the facts as we have them. The theory of evolution is a reasonable theory as far as it goes, and does not contradict the

essential doctrine of the Bible. But the weak point in the doctrine—if, indeed, it can be called a doctrine—of the skeptic is the absence of any theory as to a primal cause. It is perfectly conceivable that with matter in existence, endowed with all the various properties that it is known to possess, the universe as it now exists may have been evolved. But what marvelous and incomprehensible Power was it that first created matter and endowed it with those latent attributes which finally caused it to grow into the vast and illimitable universe, scattered through boundless space, with the mysterious force of gravity, the nature of which no man knows, to keep the earth and the heavenly bodies in their everlasting course? What inconceivable intelligence was it that framed, or created, or evolved so marvelous a mechanism as a human being endowed with the mind which has produced such wonders in this world? That there was such a creative power is certain. When we see a house we know that there was a builder, and all the theories of scientists and all the negations of agnostics cannot destroy that knowledge and no argument can disprove that fact. When we see an oak tree we know that it was built after a fashion that no human builder could achieve, but is built by a Builder nevertheless.

Now, the question which the scientists and skeptics and agnostics have never even attempted to answer is, What has become of the great Builder of the universe? Is it reasonable to suppose that such a Being was mortal and has died or ceased to exist? Is it conceivable that after having created so prodigious and wonderful a man with a spirit for which a kingdom is too small a bond, that the Creator should, if living, retire and lose interest in the work of his hands?

And such a theory would be too hard a tax upon human credulity; What, though in solemn silence, all Move round the dark terrestrial ball; What though no real voice nor sound Amid their radiant orbs be found? In reason's ear they all rejoice, And utter forth a glorious voice Forever singing as they shine The Hand that makes us is divine.



ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Treatment For Tender and Perspiring Feet - Domestic Help.

A splendid footbath, cooling and healing, is made by dissolving two ounces each of rock salt and borax with one of powdered alum. Put this in a wide mouthed bottle and use a tablespoonful to each gallon of water, soaking the feet well.

Where the feet perspire a great deal they are always tender and the skin soft. A healing, soothing powder that should be used after a thorough soaking and drying is made of ten grains each of powdered alum and naphthol, two-thirds of an ounce each of powdered borax and starch, a fifth of an ounce of salicylic acid, sifted with two ounces of best talcum powder.

Sift well many times through a hair sieve and be quite sure to reach every part of the feet, especially between the toes. If the footbath is taken at bedtime, the feet dried and this powder used the relief is wonderful. Such a treatment modifies all disagreeable odors from perspiration.

To Hemstitch on the Sewing Machine.

Hemstitching which can hardly be distinguished from the hand work and which may be done much more speedily may be done on the sewing machine in this way: First draw the number of threads desired in the goods to be hemstitched, then fold the hem over and baste the edge of the hem in the center of the drawn threads. Now loosen the tension on the sewing machine and stitch exactly along the edge of the hem. Pull the bastings out and, taking the goods in one hand and the hem in the other, pull the edge of the hem to the bottom of the drawn threads, and your work is finished.

For Cleaning Varnish.

Tea leaves are invaluable as a means of cleaning varnished paint. When enough have been laid aside for the work they should be put into the basin of water and left to steep for half an hour. The strained tea is used instead of water to clean varnished surfaces. The tannic acid left in tea leaves after all that is wholesome in them has been extracted acts quickly upon grime and grease.

Washing Painted Walls.

Get a pail of water, not too hot, with a few drops of ammonia and a nice soft flannel. Wash the walls down with soap and flannel and dry well with a soft cloth. When the walls are thoroughly dried get another pail of warm water, with a few drops of ammonia, and go over the walls with a wash leather, which gives a brilliant polish.

For Embroidery Edges.

Many garments are spoiled by having the embroidered edge split and frayed by a careless laundress. The garment can be made to last twice as long and many dollars saved by stitching around the scallops twice, having a loose tension. This makes a strong, firm edge and does not detract from its appearance.

Bathing a Sick Child.

If a child is so ill that it is necessary to bathe him in bed and there is any indication of fever, add a little vinegar to the cool water, as it has a refreshing effect upon a hot body. Instead of vinegar put some baking soda into the water if there are any eruptions on the body. It is cooling and allays any irritation.

Rusty Nail Wound.

Grate potato and thicken over the fire in vinegar until it becomes the consistency of salve. Apply as salve on cloth and bind to any rusty nail wound, wire cut, etc. This has been known to prevent lockjaw and blood poisoning until a physician could be called to give treatment.

Stains on the Neck.

A lotion which will remove the yellow stains on the neck caused by tight or high collars is made as follows: Alcohol, four ounces; rose-water, two ounces; tincture of benzoin, fifteen drops. Apply several times a day with a little sponge.

Washing Woolen Stockings.

Wash woolen stockings quickly in a lukewarm lather and do not let them lie in the water to soak. If they seem very much soiled, a little borax in the water will quickly cut the dirt. Rinse in the same temperature of water.

Marking Linen.

Write your initials or name in pencil; then carefully stitch over these lines on your sewing machine. Either red or white marking cotton can be used as a close stitch, and coarse threads give best results.

A Kitchen Hint.

If a glass tumbler into which very hot water must be poured is set on a tray or table during the process instead of being held in the hand it is much less apt to break.

She Might Have Been Empress.

Charles Bocher, who speaks of himself as "the oldest Paris opera subscriber, who was born in 1816," has published an interesting volume of memoirs. This is one of his stories: In 1827 his parents, with their children, were guests of Queen Hortense at the castle of Arenenberg. There Prince Louis (Napoleon III.) fell in love with Bocher's sister. He insisted on escorting the family when they departed from the castle and rode at the side of the carriage from Arenenberg to the French border. At Bash the prince asked Mme. Bocher for the hand of her daughter, but the offer of the romantic seventeen-year-old prince was not considered seriously, and she did not even mention it in the family circle until long after the event. After Prince Louis became emperor he showed that he had not forgotten his youthful infatuation and created Miss Bocher's husband, M. de Thorigny, minister of the interior.

MARRIED AND EXECUTED.

A St. Petersburg correspondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung gives a description of the marriage of Sinjowski, one of three young men who were tried by court martial for attempting to assassinate the czar, and Kit Purkin. The marriage took place in the prison in the presence of the wardens and was celebrated by a regularly ordained priest. The young man's request to have the ceremony witnessed by the two men who were executed with him a few hours later was denied. As an act of mercy the three men were allowed to be together for a little while, and the newly made husband was placed where he could see his wife and she could see him. At 3 o'clock the next morning the young men were taken in a closed wagon to a point on the seashore where they were executed. The feelings of the people of this country have become blunted by horrors, but a shudder ran through the whole community when it became known that these suspects, against whom no case had been established, had really paid the dreadful penalty.

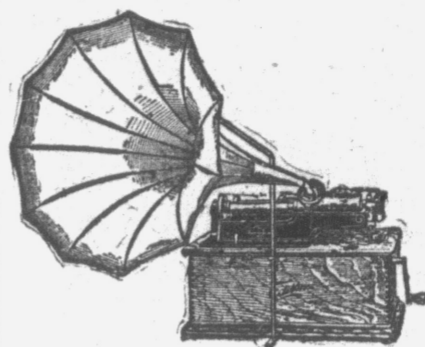
