## Happenings on Sunday.

In Monday's Charlotte Observer, the only Monday morning paper printed in the State, we note the following tragedies and accidents occurring on Sunday:

John Clinard, of Winston, while brooding over financial losses and inability to meet pressing obligations, committed suicide by shooting himself with a pistol.

At Midville, Ga., the town marshal was shot and killed by a negro whom he had reproved for wrong doing and summoned to appear in court.

A Methodist parsonage at Chester, S. C., was destroyed by fire.

Frank Click, a machinist of Nashville, Tenn., shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide.

A train on the Louisville and Nashville railroad was wrecked in Montgomery, Ala., and several trainmen were hurt.

With a dead engineer sitting at the throttle, a freight train on the Lehigh Valley railroad crashed into another train near Allentown, Pa., and several trainmen were hurt.

The body of a young man who had committed suicide was found in a swamp near Hawkinsville, Ga.

Five persons were killed and ten seriously injured by a boiler explosion near Mexico City.

In New York an automobile backed over an embankment, killing a woman and seriously injuring two men.

Three persons were burned to death and another injured in a fire in Boston.

Two steamers collided in the English channel and seven people were drowned.

For breaking a promise to marry her, Charles Randle was fatally shot by Miss Ida May Brown at Blue Creek, Alabama.

Quite a record for one day, and there were also a number of smaller accidents.

## Mrs. Mooring Dead.

Mrs. Josephine Mooring, wife of ex-Sheriff G. M. Mooring, died a little before midnight Monday, at their home, Carolina township. About three years ago Mrs. Mooring suffered a stroke of apoplexy and has since been in poor health. Recently she suffered a second stroke, which caused her death. Besides the husband she leaves six daughters and two sons, one of the latter being Mr. J. S. Mooring, of Greenville.

The funeral took place this afternoon.

A Thought by Watterson.

Col. Watterson, editor of the Courier-Journal, keeps his ear to the ground. The following expression is the result of recent listening:

"The failure of the president to make any sign or to utter any word touching a third term for himself in the White House when the members of the Republican national committee stood assembled before him is most significant. It looks very much as if the consensus of opinion among the Washington correspondents that he is a candidate and has been adroitly planning to produce conditions which will bring about his nomination and seem to force him to accept it were true, and that from now onward each aspirant will have to reckon with this man in the closet, ready to burst forth at the sounding of the prearranged signal bell for the onslaught upon the candidates now in the field to begin."

"At Washington representative government long ago gave place to ring made government, the party in power working through its steering committee in the Senate and the Speaker and his rules committee in the House, the president having more actual authority than any constitutional monarch in the world. All this is required to establish autocracy and absolutism is the breaking down of the barrier set up by Washington and accepted by his successors and the people as a sacred tradition, and never in the history of the country has any man appeared in its public life so equipped for the work, so booted and spurred, as Theodore Roosevelt in the event that he be once fairly mounted and seated in the saddle."

"Even as it is he has expulated most the assumptions of the man on horseback, save only the name of it. Given a third term, a fourth and a fifth, and in case he survived these, life tenure would not only come easy but be matters of course"

LaGrange Goes Dry.

A prohibition election was held in LaGrange Monday, and carried for prohibition by a vote of 106 to 12 in a registered vote of 140.

Cotton Crop Estimate.

The government today issued its estimate of the cotton crop for this season, placing it at 11,678,000 bales.

The census bureau fills up Bulletin No. 90 with facts and figures relating to the supply and distribution of cotton in the year ending August 31, 1907. In that year the Southern cotton mills consumed 2,410,998 bales; the Northern mills, 2,573,923, and the foreign mills, 8,503,265 bales. The stocks on hand September 1 aggregated 1,514,567 bales. The home mills used 33 per cent. of the crop; the foreign mills, 57 per cent., and there remained 10 per cent. on hand at the end of the last cotton year.
