LEFT ON A ISLAND TO STARVE

Thrilling Story of Four Russian Emigrants—Men Almost Starve

Washington, N. C., D. C. 10—Four Russian emigrants arrived in this city a few days ago. These men could not speak a word of English and were almost starved when they arrived. Through an interpreter they told of the many hardships they had encountered since their arrival in North Carolina. According to their story they were taken to some point, the name of which they could not remember, by a railroad agent to work on a railroad. On arrival there they found all the vacancies filled and the agent discharged them, without a cent of pay and nothing in the way of food. Next they applied to a captain of an oyster boat for work and went aboard, but after a day or two of this the captain finding them not acquainted with the work, put them off on an island, presumably Indian Island, at the mouth of Pamlico river, about forty miles from this city.

Without a scrap of food and no money their condition grew desperate and finding an old dilapidated row boat on the island, all four embarked, hoping that they might be picked up by a passing vessel. Without any oars and no sail they drifted about for forty hours or longer until finally a current carried the boat upon a beach, which they found to be the main land. They then walked until they reached a road and followed it until they arrived in this city.

When they arrived here they were well nigh starved, had not a cent of money and were unable to speak a word of English, having to communicate by signs, until an interpreter could be found, when through him they told their pitiful tale. The four men were given lodging at the city hall and a collection was taken up among the city officers, and they were given enough for several meals. The spokesman of the party says that they would like to settle here if they can obtain work. The men are all able-bodied men of pleasing countenance and no doubt would make good laborers.

A TACTFUL GIFT.

The Way Philip D. Armour Aided Dr. Henry M. Field.

When Dr. F. W. Gunsaulus was in the pastorate of Plymouth church, Chicago, Philip D. Armour was his most eminent parishioner. Mr. Armour had long admired the New York evangelist and was distressed when he heard that the decline of the journal threatened to leave its editor and owner, Dr. Henry M. Field, in penury in his old age.

Now every day I sit in my office and communicate with my agents all over the world, and my business multiplies wonderfully just because I can keep in touch with markets for my products in every country. And I owe it all to your brother. If it hadn't been for his faith in the ocean cable I could never have built up such a trade. I keep wishing I had done something while he was living to show him that I appreciated his achievement."

Boiling a Ham.

A great many women do not know how properly to boil a ham. Many of them put it in a pot of water and let it cook, fast or slow, as the fire may allow, until they think it is done. Try this way for a change and see if the little trouble involved is not worth while. Boiled ham to be at its best requires very slow cooking. Put the ham in a kettle, cover it with cold water and let it soak four hours. Take it out, wash it thoroughly, scrape and clean off the hard edges of the skin; put back in the kettle, cover with cold water and let it simmer until the meat is tender when tried with a fork. A ten pound ham would require about five hours' cooking in this way. Remove the ham from the fire and let it stand in the water for an hour, then take from the water and remove the outside skin. Sprinkle the ham with granulated sugar and cracker crumbs, a dash of paprika and insert two or three whole cloves. Put in a slow oven and bake for an hour.—Chicago News.

THE HOPEFUL VIEW.

From a recent article by Elbert Hubbard in which he sums up his observations in a tour through twenty-four States, we take the following 'extracts, believing they are timely and will be helpful to those who read them carefully:

The people of America never were so happy, healthy and prosperous as they are today.

Never before have we had so much to be thankful for.

Never before was the future so bright.

Never before was the average of intelligence so high.

The workers are at work. Factory, forest, farm and mine are calling for laborers. The cost of living has increased, but wages have more than kept pace—the savings banks attest it. There is no such thing in America as "the problem of the unemployed."

The stocking may be better than either. My advice is, put all your spare cash in the bank and let it remain there, paying your bills by check. The bankers of this country are men to believe in and bank on. The rogue banker stays in business only about as long as that famous snow-ball lasts in Biloxi. I've been doing business with banks for thirty-five years and never have I been ripped up the back by a banker. Be frank with your banker and he will be frank and generous with you.

The people who imagine the ginger jar, stocking, clock or trousers pockets are safer receptacles for money than a bank, are shining marks for mining sharks, also for moth, rust, thieves and fire. A banker's success depends absolutely on one thing, and that is protecting his depositors, and American bankers, of all men, now know it. It is a good working policy to have faith in your banker—in times of doubt consult him. He may give you unpleasant advice but the chances are, he's right.

All of which is the advice of a man who has never let a note go to protest, who has never failed nor had a fire, and who while not microby with money has all he needs, even if not all he wants. We are learning how to preserve our health, how to keep our tempers, how to laugh and how to give and take—especially take. Honesty as a business asset is everywhere recognized. Mutualty, reciprocity and co-operation are words that loom large.

We believe in education, growth, development, evolution. We read, we study, we discuss, we think. The literature of exposure and defamation has been overdone; the yellow journals have been needlessly yellow. They have shot too low.
