### New \$20 Gold Pieces Put in Circulation

The first installment of new \$20 gold pieces has been shipped from the mint in Philadelphia to sub-treasuries. There were 115,000 pieces of them, their monetary value being \$2,300,000.

On one side of the coin is an eagle flying, while on the other side is a figure of "Liberty." The coins were made concave, the figures being in high relief, nine strokes of a hydraulic press being required to make them. Hereafter only one stroke will be used, and thus the coins just circulated will be different from those to be put in circulation later.

## TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

Small Attendance But Interesting Session.

Owing to the bad weather the attendance at the meeting of the teachers' association today was small, but the exercises were very interesting.

Prof. J. I. Foust, president of the State Normal College of Greensboro, delivered an address on "Community Spirit", arousing interest in community pride. He said if that had been done in North Carolina the log school house would never have been possible. He advocated carrying this idea into the school, and basing school discipline on the principles of self-government, thus raising up a generation of people who will take interest in their community and see that it has good school buildings, good churches, good houses and educated, upright people.

Mrs. R. R. Cotten made an interesting talk on the interest of parents in school buildings and strongly emphasized the need of good buildings in which to instruct children.

Mrs. Hollowell, of Goldsboro, president of the Woman's Betterment Association of the State, addressed the meeting on the work of the association and the good to be accomplished through it.

### No Railroad Holiday Rates in the State

Heretofore all railroads have given reduced rates for the holiday season: This year the rates go into effect on the 20th, but the reduction applies only to inter States. Tickets for points without the State, which are sold at the rate 3 1/2 cents a mile, will be sold at the rate of one and one third fares for the round trip. But there is no reduction for points within the State. Tickets are now sold at 2 1/2 cents and the railroad people think this is low enough.

As long as Mr. Roosevelt will not have it, we guess there is hardly a doubt that he will dictate who it shall be.

This year's record is almost made. Greenville should get a mighty hump on herself for great things in the coming year.

Who the Democratic national convention will nominate for president is pretty well assured, but with Mr. Roosevelt out of it the Republicans are all on the sea of uncertainty.

Some papers are already talking about what the next legislature will do in the way of railroad rates. Far better will it be to settle the matter now for all time and let the controversy be at an end.

Speaker E. J. Justice takes issue with the governor and all the other lawyers in the proposed compromise of the railroad rate matter, and says he will withdraw from the case rather than be a party to the compromise. And the governor says he can withdraw if he wants to.

At every session of congress some fellow bobs up with a bill wanting to reduce Southern representation. A good indication that all the fools are not dead. Some of these days they will learn that the South is the biggest end of the country.

The Atlantic fleet is all in readiness for the voyage from Hampton Roads to the Pacific coast, and will sail Monday. A rather significant incident has occurred in the dismissal of all the Japanese, several of whom were employed as cooks and servants on the vessels, and their places being filled with negroes. As the appearance of the fleet in the Pacific is somewhat expected to be a flaunt in the face of Japan, perhaps Uncle Sam thought the wise course was not to take chances with any of the Mikado's subjects on his ships.

This State is to present a silver service to the battleship named for North Carolina. Lately there has been much discussion of North Carolina not having a harbor with sufficient depth of water for the ship to enter safely so the presentation could be made in this State.

Charleston on one side of us and Norfolk on the other, have been calling attention to their fine harbors and bidding for the presentation ceremonies. But Governor Glenn has come to the rescue of his State by notifying the proper officials that North Carolina has an ample harbor for the presentation at Cape Lookout. That ought to settle the matter and the presentation should be made on North Carolina matters.
