PROHIBITION ADDRESS.

Rev. R. L. Davis Speaks to Large Audience.

Rev. R. L. Davis, State organizer of the Anti-Saloon League, preached in Jarvis Memorial church Sunday morning, and at night made an address on prohibition. He said prohibition is the paramount issue that confronts the churches of North Carolina for the next eighteen months—not that other doctrines and principles are not important, but that prohibition is more important because so much depends on ridding the State of the liquor license evil.

Mr. Davis took the ground that no State or municipality has the right to license a business that destroys manhood and wrecks homes, that there is no civil law that is not subordinate to Divine law. He used quotations not only from the Bible, the foundation of law, but also from the declaration of independence the constitution of the United States, and from the legal writings of Blackstone to sustain this position.

He pointed out the fact that more than half the places in North Carolina in which liquor is legally sold are located in half a dozen counties [in this, immediate section, Pitt being one of them, and with this condition it is no wonder that the State boards of the different denominations have to help pay for the Gospel being preached in these counties.

Mr. Davis said State prohibition is one of the certainties of the near future and North Carolina will see it with the beginning of the year 1910. There are now but twenty five counties in North Carolina in which liquor is legally sold, and the other seventy-three counties will say to these twenty five in the next legislature "you must come over with us and rid North Carolina of the sale of liquor."

The objection some people make to prohibition because some States that had it had abandoned it, was fully answered. Mr. Davis said the mistakes those States made was in thinking the law would enforce itself. The law was simply the instrument, and it took men to enforce it.

Mr. Davis spoke for more than an hour, his address being interesting and full of sound argument.

The legislative committee for the inspection and comparison of the books and vouchers in the office of the State treasurer have found the records correctly and neatly kept and warrants and vouchers to correspond, all intact. They enter the following as the status of the treasury at the close of business November 30, 1907, the end of the fiscal year:

General fund—Balance on hand December 1, 1906, \$347,534 38; receipts for fiscal year ending November 30, 1907, \$2,603,293.35; total receipts for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1907, \$2,850,817.73. Disbursements, December 1, 1906 to November 30, 1907, \$2,655,282 20; balance on hand, general fund, December 1, 1907, \$295,535.53.

Educational fund—Balance in treasury December 1, 1906, \$58,431.58; receipts December 1, 1906, to November 30, 1907, \$49,453.93; total receipts, \$107,885.51; disbursements, December 1, 1906, to November 30, 1907, \$97,913 03; balance in treasury December 1, 1907, \$9,672.49.

Total balance, both general and educational, funds in the treasury, December 1, 1907, \$305,508.02.

MR. W. T. FLEMING DEAD.

Passed Away at Old Fort While Enroute to Asheville.

Telegrams from Old Fort announce that Mr. Willis T. Fleming, of Greenville, died there this morning, but no further particulars were given.

This sad intelligence was indeed a shock to Mr. Fleming's people and host of friends here at his home. He had been in poor health several months. Two weeks ago he went to a hospital in Baltimore for treatment, but there was advised that he would obtain more benefit at a mountain sanitarium and he returned home. Last Thursday morning he left here to go to Asheville, but his death occurring at Old Fort it is inferred that he must have been taken worse enroute and stopped off there. The remains will be shipped home, probably reaching here Tuesday evening or Wednesday noon.

Mr. Fleming was 40 years old, and a son of Mr. and Mrs. K. H. Fleming, who with one daughter, Miss Lennie Fleming, survive him. To the aged parents and the sister all hearts go out in sympathy.

Mr. Fleming was senior partner of the mercantile firm of Fleming & Moring, who did a large business here. He was a young man of spotless character and integrity and was held in high esteem by every one. He was a prominent member of both the Masonic and Red Men fraternities here.
