IN MEMORY OF W. W. WILKINSON.

Farmville, N. C., Dec. 17, 1907.

On Monday, the 9th inst, just as the sun was sinking behind the western hills, there was a little group standing around a bed of suffering in the home of Mr. W. H. Wilkinson, two miles from Farmville. With tear dimmed eyes and sorrowing hearts, they stood eagerly watching the last faint spark of life as it slowly flickered away from the manly form of a young man just as he had reached his 28th year, William Moses Wilkinson.

On the 6th of last June this young man was at his post of duty as a guard of the county convict camp, when quick as a flash he was stricken with paralysis and fell helpless to the ground. It was thought for quite a while he would not survive the stroke, but he slowly rallied and was taken to Greenville, and a few days later was removed to his father's home. With parental care, loving attention and cheering words he improved so he could be out to some extent for a few weeks, but was confined to his bed again and grew worse until angels came and wafted his spirit through the portals above.

During his long suffering he was exceedingly meek and patient, often remarking it would soon be over with him, and expressed a desire as to where he should be buried.

Among his many friends he was always a favorite on all occasions, and by these he will be greatly missed. For four years he was a salesman for his brother C. L. Wilkinson, of Greenville, part of the time being in a branch store in Tarboro. In both of these towns he made a host of friends.

Father, mother, four sisters and two brothers survive him. The funeral took place in Farmville cemetery, service being conducted by Rev. D. W. Arnold, of Greenville. The pall bearers were Messrs. J. T. Thorne, R. E. Belcher, A. S. J. Bryan, B. S. Smith, J. S. Smith and Jack Smith.
