The ladies are addressed sometimes with too much familiarity. ## Republicans and Prosperity.

In an address delivered at his home town of Danville, Ill., last year Speaker Joseph G. Cannon attributed our abundant national prosperity to the continuance of the Republican party in power, and reminded his hearers that under the Democratic regime in 1893 no less than 3,000,000 American working-men were out of employment. This was a characteristic bit of Republican oratory; it is a favorite device of the party spell binders to take credit for all the beneficence of Nature and to insist that the sun shines more brightly and the dew falls more generously under Republican auspices. But certain recent events are calculated to embarrass Mr. Cannon, and the day may come when he will wish he had not been so quick to identify the hard times of 14 years ago to the Democratic administration.

For there are hundreds of thousands of idle workingmen in the United States at the present moment, and there are likely to be more. Chairman Fowler, of the house committee on banking and currency, who has just been appointed by Speaker Cannon, puts the possible number of the unemployed at two millions, and he can hardly be called a prejudiced prophet, and if the Democratic administration was responsible for the condition of things in 1892, it is only fair to hold the Republican administration responsible for the condition of things now, and the worse the condition of things becomes the more should the Speaker of the House of Representatives wish that he had not so volubly attributed the panic of 1893 and and its aftermath of idle factories to the wicked Democrats. ## Cortelyou Must Come Into Court.

Washington, D. C., Dec., 18.—Justice Gould, of the District Supreme Court, today cited Geo. B. Cortelyou, Secretary of the Treasury, to appear in court Friday, January 3, 1908, to show cause why he should not be enjoined from turning over or delivering the balance of the \$21,450,000 of the Panama Canal Bonds to certain banks and persons to whom he has announced allotments. The citation issued by Justice Gould is based on a petition filed by Geo. W. Austin, of New York, who describes himself as a tax-payer and property owner of the United States and who declares he made a proposal to purchase bonds of the advertised issue of the face value of \$3,000,000. He avers he had agreed to pay at the rate of 103.375 and accrued interest per one hundred dollars and on notice of the acceptance and his subscription stands ready to deposit the amount with the Assistant Treasurer at New York.

Taft has returned and his next move will be trying to get on the lid.

Faces of absent ones turn homeward now for Christmas, and it is a time of joy everywhere.

The candidates for governor seem to have exhausted their ammunition before election year arrives.

The wireless telegraph stations along the coast are kept busy picking up messages from the fleet.

Secretary Cortelyou in a signed statement says he is not in it. The rest of us thought as much before he made the statement.

Congress is talking about retrenchment in the way of cutting down appropriations, but saying nothing about cutting down the members' salaries.

With street cars, elevated roads, the subway and automobiles in New York, the people should not be put to much inconvenience about something to ride in while the cab drivers are on a strike.

One of the ministers at a Methodist conference in Philadelphia hit Speaker Cannon a knock out blow. He said "it is a disgrace and an outrage that a man whose lips drip with profanity and whose energies are directed to the furthering of the liquor interests of the country should occupy a position of power only second to that of the president." The speaker ought to feel like thirty cents after that charge.

**Where the South Loses.**  
Talking about "the waste of power which our system of government makes necessary," or that the sentiment for change is responsible for, it is exemplified by the Southern States in their disposition to make frequent changes in their members of congress. The North and New England have demonstrated the value of keeping experienced men in congress. A representative or senator gains influence by experience and the South has lost immeasurably in the past by retiring men who had just reached the point of influence and power. Nobody can deny that the South has suffered much by this practice, nor does it seem to profit from the lesson. There is too much of a disposition to crowd out a good man just to make room for some party favorite or to reward some politician with office. The South should look at this matter of representation in congress from a business standpoint and when it gets men there, either in the house or senate, who can do things, keep them there as long as they prove useful.—Charlotte Chronicle.

### ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Directions. For the Care of Children's Teeth—Domestic Notes.

The first teeth, like the second, are required for the proper mastication of the food, which is all the more necessary in the growing child, who needs more nourishment in proportion than an older person of twice his size. As soon as the teeth appear they should be cleaned with a soft cloth, and when the child is old enough a little brush should be given to him, and he should be taught how to use it. After this the mother or nurse should see that it is used regularly. The mouth of every child should be examined two or three times a year by the dentist, and any little cavities discovered should be stopped with temporary filling. Indeed, as much care should be taken of the first set of the second set of teeth, for they are just as necessary to health, beauty and comfort.

### Cleaning Soiled Ribbon.

Pick out all pieces of thread. Lay ribbon down right side up on cloth covered table. If the ribbon is wide, pin down smooth as possible. Put a small piece of white soap in a dish or saucer, then put in a little cold water. Make a soft pad of old muslin. With this rub a little of the soap and water together. Commence at one end of the ribbon. Saturate a little at a time, rubbing hard on soiled places and where creases are. Keep ribbon smooth. If the cloth underneath the ribbon becomes too wet, move the ribbon. When it is perfectly clean and smooth dry without any pressing. Ribbon cleaned this way will look nearly like new.
