TOBACCO MEN ARE HOST.

Board of Trade Gives Banquet.

As the tobacco industry is the most important enterprise of Greenville and Pitt county, the Tobacco Board of Trade is the leading business organization of the town. The seventy odd men composing this organization are not only leaders in making business for the community, but also take front rank when it comes to social events.

Tobacco market closed for the holidays on Friday, 20th, and that night the Tobacco Board of Trade gave a banquet in the factory of the E. B. Ficklen Tobacco Co., to which many others were invited, each member having the privilege to invite a friend. Tables were arranged that bore a most tempting spread, the menu consisting of ham sandwiches, turkey, quail on toast, oysters, cranberry sauce, pickles, celery and coffee and fruit, cigars being distributed after the repast.

Mr. R. O. Jeffress, president of the Tobacco Board of Trade, being yet lame from his accident several months ago, requested Mr. H. W. Whedbee to act as master of ceremonies and toast master, which he did most acceptably. He is one of these ready men who fits in anywhere and fills the place to perfection in the absence of a minister he said grace introduced the speakers in calling the toasts and himself made the best speech of the evening.

Toast Master Whedbee in his remarks gave a brief history of the tobacco market since its beginning in 1891, and the wonderful development the market and the town had made in the years following. The present season approximately \$1,500,000 will be paid to the farmers for tobacco, while the operating expenses of plants and salaries of employes will foot up \$500,000 more, making a total of \$2,000,000 paid out through this one industry.

The tobacco market has brought to Greenville a large number of business men and citizens of whom the town may well feel proud.

WOMEN OF HOLLAND.

Their Costumes Too Complex For Words, Says a Feminine Writer.

The women's costume is a trifle too complex for verbal description, as feminine belongings usually are, says Florence Craig Albrecht in Scribner's, but the white lace cap which covers the head from eyebrows to nape of neck and from ear to ear, curving out in rounded wings on each side of her cheek, is always a conspicuous and inevitable portion of a woman's attire. It may possibly be that Sunday this cap is a trifle whiter or stiffer or daintier than on week days, but the difference is not very apparent.

The ladies assure us there is a vast difference in the quality of the net and the amount of handwork employed, but the lens made no special note of that. In shape and outline the camera finds great distinction between these caps and those of Katwyk or Marken or Boile Duc, but between Sunday and Monday caps in Volendam it records none whatever. For the rest of the costume feminine Holland asks above all things apparently a very flat, narrow chest, surmounting enormous hips, and Volendam is no exception to this fashion rule.

The invariable black "best waist" of the elder women is usually brightened by a square yoke of lighter color and material, and the dark apron or overskirt is topped by six inches or more of gay plaid or bright colored band worn over an underskirt of dull blue-striped or black material and uncountable petticoats.

About the throat a collar formed of many rows of heavy dark red coral beads is fastened by huge silver clasps, and the number of rows, the size and quality of the beads are matters for feminine pride.

Long hair is not the only glory of woman in Holland, save perhaps at Marken. It is usually hidden and at Volendam is cut quite close and entirely covered by a tight fitting thick black silk cap concealed beneath the snowy white lace.

The younger girls, from the tiniest toddler to the young meiseje, old enough to wed, wear dresses and caps the exact counterpart of their grave mothers, no less full of skirt or narrow of chest, but much gayer in color. A group of tiny maidens in a stiff breeze on the dike resembles nothing more than a swarm of butterflies.
