Notice to R. F. D. Patrons.

Postmaster at Grifton desires to call attention to the practice of some patrons of rural delivery of placing loose coins in their boxes each time they desire to dispatch letters instead of supplying themselves with postage in advance of their needs.

This practice imposes undue hardship on rural carriers in removing loose coins from boxes and delays them on the service of their routes.

The postmaster, therefore, urgently requests that patrons of rural delivery provide themselves and keep on hand a supply of stamps consistent with and in advance of their needs. It is also very desirable that rural patrons place in their mail boxes small detachable cups of wood or tin in which to place coins, when necessary, in purchasing supplies of stamps.

The bill, as we understand it, sets forth that none of the existing local or State laws shall be repealed by passage of the Long-Dowd bill, or by its adoption or rejection, so to speak, by the people. This should help the prohibition side immensely, as the people in the dry cities who favor saloons will not be able to vote saloons into these places, but will simply be passing upon the status of other places. ---Wilmington Dispatch.

The Noted School Teacher, Alleged Seducer, Held in Wilmington.

Wilmington, N. C., Jan. 27.--C. H. James, the school teacher from Manteo, N. C., who recently figured in the sensational arrest in Virginia on a charge of abduction of Miss Midgett, one of his pupils, is in jail here in default of bond to appear against two young white men found to the higher court on a charge of robbing him while he lay drunk on the steps of a lodging house back of the Front street market house, a few days ago. Letters found in a dress suit case which was stolen from him disclosed his identity as he had given the name of "Charley Jones," when he was arrested. Mayor Springer has written to the authorities at Manteo, Dare county, to know if he is still wanted there. He admits being the school teacher James, but says he was found not guilty at the trial in Manteo.

FOR PROHIBITION.

Passed With Only Three Opposing Votes.

Exactly on the stroke of midnight the house of representatives passed with only three dissenting votes the State prohibition law practically unchanged from the form in which it came from the senate, except that the date of the election was fixed on the last Thursday in April, 1908, instead of the first Thursday in August.

Representative Dowd, of Mecklenburg, who had charge of the bill in the house, managed its passage with consummate skill and ability.

The Senate discussed the Graham rate bill, and if last night's session indicated anything, it was that the agreement made by the Governor and the railroads to settle the rate controversy on a 2 1/2 cent basis would be adopted by the Senate.

The most pleasant feature of night session was the speech made by Mr. Graham and the response thereto by Lieutenant-Governor Winston, in which friendship was restored between two worthy men. The Senators and galleries applauded both utterances.

The discussion on the rate bill was long, but every word interesting. — News and Observer.

Late on First Trip.

Under the new schedule of the Norfolk & Southern the west bound train from Norfolk is scheduled to pass here at 6.40 p. m. It was considerably behind time on its first trip, Monday night, not reaching here until 8 o'clock. We hope it will be able to catch up and make schedule time.

Before this week is out the Republicans in the legislature will show their hand at playing politics with the rate bill and the prohibition bill.

After the editors go to Charlotte you can count on every mother's son of them being in favor of the next State convention going there.

Another New York bank, The National Bank of North America, has gone into liquidation, but there is no need of the panicky feeling being renewed over it.

With railroads running through Greenville in two directions, there are many good sites for factories. The thing much needed is to put factories on these sites.

The Orange, Va., Observer sums it up like this: "You wear a heavy overcoat one day, a linen duster the second, a porous plaster the third and a doctor's bill the fourth." That office must have been up against the grip, too.

Twenty-seven years ago, on the first Thursday in August, 1881, occurred the first prohibition election ever held in North Carolina, and prohibition was defeated by 116,072 majority. This year another election is to be held on the same question and it ought to result in a victory for prohibition as large as the defeat of twenty-seven years ago

Nothing can be said in favor of the whiskey traffic or of whiskey drinking yet we would force no man to quit it against his will.—Durham Herald.

This is a strange position for a moulder of public opinion to take. We take it from this assertion that if the editor of the Herald knew a man who, when sober, made a good and kind husband, but when drunk was a brute to his family, that the editor would not force that man against his will to be sober. About as reasonable to say he would not force a man not to commit murder against his will, nor force a man not to steal against his will.

Things that are in the near future for Greenville and already assured are: A large veneer manufacturing plant, buildings for the Eastern Training School, a steel bridge across Tar river and street paving. In addition to these there is a bill pending in congress for the erection of a public building in Greenville. Don't all this point to enough good things ahead to give confidence in Greenville's future? Carbonic Acid Springs.

In the Auvergne region of France a large amount of carbonic acid gas comes from the soil and is one of the last traces of the former volcanic activity of this region. The springs that yield the gas are found generally in the fissures of the ground which allow the water to rise. One of the Montpensier springs has become known as the "poisoned spring." Animals which descend to the cavity to drink are soon asphyxiated by the gas which is given off by the water and accumulates here. Bodies of birds, rabbits, dogs, sheep and other animals are found, and even persons have narrowly escaped. Vegetation is also affected by an overdose of the gas. Spots can be seen running in a line across the fields, where the plants have suffered from gas coming up through the fissures of the ground at different points. Soundings show the presence of a great quantity of gas, and it is usually in a very pure state.

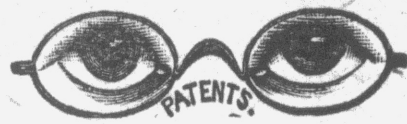
