THE VOTES FOR CON. KITCHIN.

MR. MANNING SAYS YESTERDAY GREATER THAN EXPECTED.

States That Kitchin Led Craig by Forty Four Votes, is only Twelve Behind Craig Now and Will Lead Him This Week.

Mr. J. S. Manning, of Durham, the State manager for Hon. W. W. Kitchin in his campaign for the Democratic nomination for governor, last night telephoned the following statement to the News and Observer:

"The result from the counties holding primaries today gives Mr. Kitchin more votes than I estimated in the statement published in the News and Observer on Thursday morning.

"The votes of today, as far as ascertained, gives Kitchin 54 61, Horne 12 or 13, Craig 10.85, making Kitchin's lead over Craig in those counties acting, practically 44 votes. This leaves Craig with a lead of only about 12 votes. Kitchin will lead in the primaries to be held this week and will overcome this lead of Craig. I stand by my statement that Kitchin will lead Craig by 50 votes at Charlotte."—Raleigh News and Observer.

THE VOTE FOR GOVERNOR.

How the Candidates Stand so Far.

Last week primaries and conventions were held in 12 counties, bringing the total counties that have taken action so far up to 70, leaving 28 yet to hold conventions. Of those that have held conventions, Hertford, Rowan and Lincoln did not instruct their delegates, and it is not accurately known how Camden and Columbus stand. The other 65 counties have 578 votes in the State convention and reports divide these among the candidates for governor as follows: Craig 253.22, Kitchin 223.73, Horne 87.05.

Mr. Kitchin's gain last week was three times as much as Mr. Craig's and the latter gained only two votes more than Mr. Horne. According to reports all three of the candidates seem satisfied as the result now stands.

Mr. Kitchin's manager Mr. says Manning, last week's primaries gave Kitchin more votes than he had previously estimated and he is satisfied that Kitchin will lead by 50 votes at Charlotte. Mr. Kerr, Mr. Craig's manager expresses equal confidence that his man will go to Charlotte in the lead. As to which is correct it cannot be told until the remaining 28 counties hold their conventions. It is very evident that Mr. Horne will go to the State convention holding the balance of power, and it is all guess work as to who will get the nomination.

Major London for Corporation Commissioner.

The position of Corporation Commissioner is a judicial one. Most of the questions that come before the commission for decision are of a judicial nature. The position is one of the most important under the State government. No man should be placed on the commission because he represents any special class; because he is for the corporations or against the corporations or is anxious to do some special thing. The place should be filled by a man of judicial temperament, one capable of looking at all sides of a proposition and doing justice without fear or favor. Such a man is Maj. Henry A. London, of Chatham county, who is a candidate for the position. Major London would fill any position in the State with credit, but he is peculiarly fitted for the position of Corporation Commissioner. He could not be carried off his feet and made to do an unfair thing by clamor; neither could he be wheeled into granting improper concessions to corporations. In addition to his qualifications for the place he seeks, Major London is a Confederate soldier and has a record of intelligent and faithful party service which deserves recognition.—Statesville Landmark

Mr. G. S. Prichard Dead.

A message received here Sunday from Littleton announced the death of Mr. George S. Prichard which occurred Sunday morning at Panacea Springs. Mr. Prichard was a prominent tobacco grower of Greenville and made his home here during the tobacco season, living at Panacea during the summer. He was a member of the Methodist church here, and Rev. M. T. Plyler went to Panacea Springs today to conduct the funeral service. Mr. Prichard leaves a wife and several children.

Greenville Boy's Contribution to the Art of Cartoonist.

BOOZE
DIED
MAY 26, 1933

and on the base another inscription reading

GONE BUT NOT
FORGOTTEN

On top of the monument are two doves, one of them cooing "Good bye, booze," while an owl perched on a limb overhead sings "And the world goes on just the same."

FOUR BREAK JAIL.

Wounded Man Turns Others Out of Jail.

Sometime after midnight Sunday night four colored prisoners made their escape from the county jail, and two of them are yet at large. Their names are John Teel, Jesse Valentine, Cleveland Taylor and Charles Williams. John Teel is the negro who made a dash for liberty, a few weeks ago, while being taken from court to jail, and was shot through the hip. Since being placed in jail, because of his wound he was not confined in a cell with other prisoners, but was given a cot in the corridor where he could be better attended to. He had not walked at all since being shot but had made much complaint of his wound all the time, especially when an officer was around. Sunday night John got off his cot, took some pieces of iron from a stove in the corridor and broke the lock off the cell in which the other three were confined. Being released from the cell they found it easy to cut a hole through the brick wall and swing out to the ground.

Teel was soon captured, Williams came back and gave himself up, and officers are after the other two.

CONGRESS HAS ADJOURNED.

House Got it on the Senate for One Time.

Washington, May 30.—The first session of the sixtieth congress comes to an end with the senate's supremacy in legislative affairs somewhat shaken but still prevailing. The victory of the house, as embodied in its speaker, in compelling the senate to remain here and enact currency legislation, was the most notable victory the lower branch of congress has achieved in recent years; but it is a fair guess that with seven months for recovery the senate will come up fresh and strong next December.

For years the members of the house have railed against the dominance of the senate, but the house has made little progress in regaining the powers and prestige that formerly were conceded it. The "senate-knocking" speech of the session just closed was made in the house by Mr. Burton, the erudite statesman from Cleveland, Ohio. He held up the British house of commons as an example of what the American house of representatives should be, and by inference declared the United States senate should be in the same category as the British house of lords.

This would be going a little farther than most Americans would care to travel. The power of the British lords does not extend beyond the right of veto, and they would not dare veto any measure of the commons which the county approved. The British sovereign also possesses the right of veto, but custom has robbed him of the power to exercise it. So that, for actual influence on the destinies of the empire, the influence of the lords is nil.

But there is in the United States a well grounded conviction that the senate absorbed too much of the power that should lie with the popular and directly elective branch of the national legislature. Some of the most eloquent and most dramatic speeches ever heard in congress have been on this subject. Among the most notable of these was the one delivered four or five years ago by Bourke Cockran of New York. It fired the heart of the house membership and made it ready for revolt, but the senate went serenely along bossing things in the high and mighty way it had been doing for more than a quarter of a century. In the house the fuse hissed and sizzled clear up to the bomb; but there was no explosion.

When Joseph G. Cannon became speaker of the house he made no secret of his determination to combat the senate's assumption of superiority. But "Uncle Joe" has not made much headway. Now and then he has scored a temporary triumph, but in the main the senate has had its way. The matter of the currency bill was the most remarkable of his scattered victories.

CRATERS OF DIAMONDS.

Barney Barnato and the Secret of the Blue Rock.

Barnato would have given \$40,000 for it and taken the risk, but he did not hear anything of the transaction until the tenderfoot had bought and the man who thought himself clever had departed.—Chicago News.

GREAT PEAKS OF ALASKA.

Some of the Most Imposing Snow Mountains in the World.

The fact is not generally known that some of the most imposing snow mountains in the world lie within the limits of the United States. I refer to the great peaks of Alaska, at least one of which, Mount McKinley, is over 20,000 feet high, while Mount St. Elias is over 18,000 feet and, being situated within twenty-five miles of the coast, can be seen in its entire height from the deck of a vessel.

Other magnificent peaks, as Mount Fairweather and Mount Crillon, lie very close to the shore, and, since the line of perpetual snow in these northerly latitudes is at 3,000 feet or even less (in the case of Mount St. Elias it is virtually at the water's edge, for the base of this mountain is surrounded by vast glaciers which flow down to the sea), continuous snow and ice surfaces may there be seen rising from 15,000 to 18,000 feet above the spectator. I think I am not mistaken in saying that few, if any, such sights can be witnessed in any other part of the world.

Mountaineering expeditions to these Alaskan peaks are very interesting, but at the same time very laborious, not because of unusually stiff rock or snow work—neither is probably as difficult as that encountered in the Alps—but largely because they are situated in a wild, unexplored country at great distances from any proper base of supplies, so that before their ascent can be even attempted much time and effort must be expended in the solution of various perplexing problems not pertaining to climbing proper.

And this I understand to be also true in a general way of mountaineering in the Himalayas, the Andes and the Caucasus. All of these great ranges still offer what the Alps no longer can—new fields to conquer. These have unquestionably a fascination peculiar to themselves, and every one should go in search of them. To a certain extent the absence of such new fields may be said to detract from the pleasure of mountaineering in the Alps.—William Williams in Scribner's.

London Word Butchers.

Time is required by an American ear to accustom itself to English "as she is spoke" in London. The cockney who had no difficulty of corrupting the Norman French, making Route de Roy "Rotten row," and Marie le Bon "Marylebone," and Beauchamp, who was one of the principal lieutenants of the Conqueror and was rewarded with the lands at Warwick, into "Beecham," would readily call High Holborne "Ighobon" and Ludgate Hill "Lugutill." Indeed, the English of the cab and bus driver, bright as they are in their own employments, is not readily understood. One has to ask a bus conductor more than once as to the identity of the place to which he is bound, for in calling out the names there isn't the faintest resemblance to what he considers the proper pronunciation.

The Declaration of Independence.

The committee appointed June 11, 1776, to draft the proposed Declaration of Independence consisted of the following members: Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston. Lee, the mover of the resolution for independence, being called home before the appointment of the committee, Jefferson was put in his place, and it therefore fell to him to draft the Declaration. The document prepared by Jefferson was freely discussed in committee, and general verbal changes were made, but in substance the famous paper is today just as it was when handed in by Jefferson.—New York American.

An Economical Cook.

A Chinaman will bake a dinner for a dozen with a mere handful of fuel. The boiler he uses is large and cone shaped, being sometimes two feet in diameter and one foot deep. It covers the fire with merely a small portion of the lower part of the case, but the heat and flames infold the rest. Water and rice are put at the bottom, with a frame over them, and on this are placed dishes of fish, fowl and vegetables to boil. The whole is covered with a wooden cover, in the center of which is a hole about four inches in diameter, and in this another dish is often placed, the contents of which are cooked by the steam.
