## MR. KITCHIN PLEASE ANSWER.

We would be glad to know where Mr. W. W. Kitchin was last Saturday when congress was called upon to vote on the Crum-packer resolution to reduce southern representation in congress? No more important measure to the South has been before congress, and neither he nor his brother, Claude, was present to vote on it.

We think a little more consideration of the interest of the people of the State would entitle him to ask for another office with more likelihood of success. If he will take the salary of one office and neglect the most important measures how can he expect to be intrusted by the people with the office of governor?

Will Mr. Kitchin tell us how many times he has answered the roll call in congress at this session? It is stated that he has missed at least 200 roll calls. Is this true? The people have paid him \$7,500 per year. What has he given them in return?

Locke Craig was a member of the legislature of North Carolina for 60 days during 1893; he introduced the Railroad Commission Act, the "Jim Crow" car law and the Craig bill (requiring all foreign corporations, railroad and insurance companies to become domestic corporations before they could carry on business in North Carolina) He was one of the leading advocates of the Constitutional Amendment, and helped to frame it. Has Mr. Kitchin done this much in 12 years in congress? A.

Ashley Horne's success has enabled him to invest his money in enterprises and this has given work to people and placed money in circulation. Business is suffering today because money has been withdrawn from circulation and thereby the wheels of industry have stopped. The nearer the convention comes the more disgusting the campaign grows.

Georgia held her gubernatorial primaries Thursday, and the reports are that Brown beat Smith about 15,000 votes.

Everybody in Greenville has so lost their heads over who is to be the candidate for governor that the business people will not come together in a chamber of commerce meeting to attend to some matters that ordinary courtesy, if nothing else, should cause action to be taken on. There ought to be an early meeting of the chamber with every business man in the community present.

In Pitt county during this campaign for the nomination for governor, there have been more willful falsehoods told by Democrats against Democrats than have been heard during a campaign between opposing political parties. And we suppose that the same thing is true in many other counties over the State. If this is helping the Democratic party we confess unwillingly to see it that way.

The Wilson Times put in a claim that Wilson was the banner township in the State in the recent prohibition election, having cast 799 votes dry and 46 wet, a ratio of about 16 to 1. The Weldon News knocked this out with a claim for Weldon, that town having cast 233 dry votes and 9 wet, about 25 to 1. But both of them will have to withdraw their claims and yield the banner to Roanoke Island, where a total of 193 votes were cast and every one of them dry. That is a record to be proud of.

Tomorrow's primaries will about wind up the gubernatorial agitation in Pitt county for the time being. We hope there will not be the least disposition of unfairness toward any candidate. As the strength for governor is to be taken, Mr. Kitchin, Mr. Craig and Mr. Horne should each have their full representation according to the strength developed by each, and everything should be so conducted that after the county convention is over there can be no charge by any one that there was the least unfairness.

## THE SACK MOVED.

A Young Girl's Terrible Ordeal in a Lonely Farmhouse.

A young girl had a terrible experience at a lonely farmhouse on the estate of Count Karolyi, near Budapest. Early in the evening a man, apparently almost exhausted by carrying a heavy sack, knocked at the door of the farm and begged for a night's shelter. The only occupant of the place at the time was the farmer's young daughter. She naturally refused to admit him, but at his earnest entreaty allowed him to leave the sack. The stranger, depositing his burden in the kitchen, then left, and the girl continued her preparations for an evening meal.

A noise caused her to look around, and to her horror she saw that the sack was moving. On the blade of a knife she saw the man cutting through the sack. Thoroughly terrified, she picked up her father's revolver and fired. The movement stopped at once, and blood commenced to ooze through the sack.

The girl, now almost mad with alarm, fled from the house. As she tore down the road she firmly grasped her father's revolver, and having obtained the assistance of two gendarmes, hurried home. The gendarmes speedily cut open the sack and inside found the dead body of a burly man, armed with a revolver and a knife, with a gunshot wound in the head, which had evidently caused death.

Suspended from his neck was a whistle, and believing it was intended as a means of summoning accomplices, the police blew a series of calls. Almost immediately three men ran up and, seeing themselves trapped, opened fire with revolvers. A desperate fight followed, the gendarmes using their revolvers freely. One of the robbers was shot dead, and his two companions were captured.

### Stanley Was a Waif.

Stanley, the famous explorer, was a waif, and his original name was not Stanley at all, says the Deineator. The little boy's "real name" was John Rowlands. He was born near Denbigh, Wales, in 1840. When he was three years old he was put in a poorhouse at St. Asaph. It was ten years later that he sailed away to America as a cabin boy. In New Orleans a merchant by the name of Henry Morton Stanley adopted him, and the little boy was given his name. The "John Rowlands" was discarded from that day, and it was Henry M. Stanley, Jr., who served in the United States navy, won fame as a war correspondent in Turkey and with the British army in Abyssinia and as the crowning achievement of his life, after he had penetrated the darkest wilds of Africa and found Dr. David Livingstone, opened up the Kongo region for intercourse and commerce with the world.

# How Many Bricks Have You Sent Away?

That sounds like a funny question, addressed to every citizen of this town and community, but it's really a serious one.

Listen: There is now just completed a magnificent building of red brick exterior and concrete interior right in the business heart of one of the biggest of American cities. It occupies a whole block and calls itself in a large lettered sign "The Largest Monolithic Building In the World." It has many floors, with about a hundred acres of floor space. The entrances are of solid marble. The floors are beautifully tiled. Altogether it is a credit to the big city in which it stands. Oh, it's a Jim Dandy!

Now, how many bricks have you sent to the city to go into this big building? Honest, how many?

Of the hundreds of thousands of bricks put into the walls of this building the city where it stands has contributed not a single red brick. Country people, the people of small towns and cities far away from the big metropolis, have sent in the bricks for the construction of this splendid edifice.

You may have sent in a few hods of bricks yourself without knowing it.

Listen: This magnificent structure, which ornaments a city you probably never will see yourself, is built of bricks bought with the dollars of people living in towns just like ours—towns that would like to have some new brick buildings themselves now and then. Every dollar contributed to the city building fund means a nice, hefty hod of bricks for this big, beautiful skyscraper, "largest in the world" of its kind. This building was put up, through the kind donations of their unknown country cousins, by a firm that ran a small store in that city a few years ago.

But this firm conceived the cute idea of having thousands of strangers contribute bricks to build its fine, large, new store.

And the building is a Mail Order Store. See?



## ARTIFICIAL EYES.

They Were Made by the Ancient Egyptians and Romans.

It is not exactly known when and where artificial eyes first came into use. But this much is certain, that in ancient times Egyptian and Roman priests, who practiced medicine and surgery, could make artificial eyes as well as artificial hands, arms and legs. In Egypt they knew this art as early as 500 B. C.

The method of these eye manufacturers was very simple. In the case of a flesh colored piece of cloth, one and one-half to two and one-quarter inches in size, a piece of clay of the natural size of the human eye, was attached and so painted over as to represent the eye and its lid. This piece of cloth was fixed over the socket of the closed eye by means of an adhesive substance. However primitive these eyes, they were highly valued and were worn by the Egyptians and Romans. An eye of this kind was found in the ruins of Pompeii.

The first known mention of modern artificial eyes—i. e., eyes worn within the socket—is contained in a rare illustrated work published by the French surgeon Pare in 1561. Pare invented three kinds of artificial eyes. The first consisted of a thin metal band placed around the head of the wearer. One end was provided with a small oval plate covering the socket, the other end being fastened to the back of the head. The plate was covered with soft, smooth leather, on which an eye was painted. Pare's second invention consisted of an enameled hollow golden ball in the shape of an eye worn within the socket. The third was an eye in shape like that worn today, but made of gold and enamel. These eyes were, of course, very costly, and only the wealthy could afford to avail themselves of them.

Later eyes were made of porcelain, which, on account of their cheapness, soon became very popular. Glass eyes were invented in 1579. Already in Shakespeare's time they were the finest products of primitive manual skill. Still, compared to them, the glass eyes of today, though manufactured by mechanical means, are veritable works of art.—New York Tribune.

### Baby Goes A-shopping.

"Did you ever see anything like that?" exclaimed a woman standing by the lace counter in a department store when she watched a mother pick up a young, wide awake baby, which was done up like a bundle and which lay with purchases upon the counter. Only its little head stuck out, and no one would have imagined the roll was alive until one beheld the funny little face, puckered up and framed in woolen wrappings. As the mother walked away she carried her spoils thus: Baby on the left arm; shopping bag, filled, in the left hand; several bundles in the crook of her right elbow; a long but thin pocketbook in two fingers of the right hand. And such is woman. She seemed happy.—New York Press.

### Must Be Consistent.

In one of the police courts the other day there appeared before the magistrate a certain old Irishman who has been a continual offender for years, her besetting sin being the flowing bowl. The court failed to treat her as an old acquaintance until she calmly announced her age at thirty; then he stopped her.

"See here, Mary," he said, "you've been coming here for ten years, and all that time you have given your age as thirty years. I won't stand it any longer. Why do you do it?"

"Sure, your honor," was the quick reply, "I wouldn't be after telling you one story at one time and another next time. 'Twouldn't sound right."—New York Globe.

### Origin of the Dolly.

From the name of Robert D'Oyley originated the word dolly. A grant of land was given to him in the reign of William of Normandy on condition that he should give yearly a tablecloth of at least 3 shillings value at the feast of St. Michael. According to the custom of the times, the women of his family were skillful with the needle and felt great pride in embroidering their "quit rent tablecloths." In time these cloths came to be valuable and were used as napkins at the royal table. They were called "D'Oyleys."

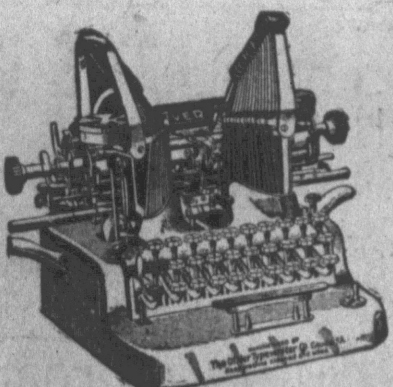
