BIDS ON THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

EIGHTEEN COMPETITORS FOR BUILDINGS CONTRACT.

Greenville firm is lowest and gets award—Greensboro firm gets contract for heating plant.

As was stated in a brief news item in The Reflector Tuesday, the contract for erecting the buildings for the Eastern Carolina Teachers' Training School was awarded to the Building & Lumber Co., of Greenville.

That there was much interest in this contract for the buildings, was shown by the number of competitors who were here to present bids to the executive committee of the board of trustees. When the bids were all in it was found that there were eighteen contestants for the contract. Four buildings are embraced in the contract, administration building, girls' dormitory, boys' dormitory and refectory. The bids were as follows, beginning with the highest:

Mitchell's residence on Mitchell street, upsetting the trap and throwing Misses Gladys and Hazel Mitchell, Miss Glenn Forbes and the driver, Emmett Andrews violently to the ground.

The party had just returned from a drive and the team had been stopped at the front door and the ladies were just preparing to leave the trap, when a colored boy riding along the street on a bicycle fell from his wheel breaking a lot of glass ware that he was carrying. The noise startled the horses and they bolted. As they ran out the gate and started dashing into a wire fence across the street, the driver, with rare presence of mind pulled them to the right. The quick stop set the trap throwing the ladies out. In falling Miss Gladys's clothes became entangled and she was dragged some distance before they gave up.

The driver was unable to release the reins and himself dragged some distance although he was unhurt.

Miss Gladys was severely injured by the fall. Her shoulder was severely cut and the face, being struck by the distance face of the horse, was bruised. Her arms were broken to protect her from the horse's teeth.

It is considered fortunate that the accident occurred before the horses were harnessed. The driver would all probably have been seriously and possibly killed. Kinston Free Press.

MR. MANNING'S CLAIM.

Says That Mr. Kitchin Leads by 35.65 Votes.

Mr. J. S. Manning, manager of Mr. Kitchin's campaign, gives a statement to the Raleigh News and Observer in which he claims that the returns from the counties so far holding primaries give Mr. Kitchin a lead of 35.65 votes over Mr. Craig. Previous to last week Mr. Manning claimed that the vote stood Craig 251.59, Kitchin 2 8.50, Horne 87.91, and that out of the counties holding last week Kitchin got 70.81, Craig 22.07, Horne 20.12, making the totals Kitchin 303.31, Craig 273.66, Horne 108.03.

Mr. J. P. Kerr, manager of Mr. Craig's campaign, claims that the way the vote stands is Kitchin 295.51, Craig 280.93, Horne 110.56, making Kitchin a little less than 15 votes ahead.

There are yet 14 counties to hold primaries or conventions.

HOW TO CATCH A THIEF.

Novel Scheme Employed In India Locates Dishonest Servant.

"A recent contributor to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat mentions some curious trials for crime still employed in various parts of the world," said a returned missionary from India who recently paid a visit to the city, "but none of them compare with the rice trial, which is still in vogue in most parts of the peninsula, as a method of detecting a criminal.

"A friend of mine living in Calcutta discovered that various small but valuable articles had disappeared from his house. He knew that the thief must be one of his own servants, but had no means of proving it. So, after all his efforts at detection proved useless, he sent for a 'thief doctor,' who had a high reputation for his ability to catch criminals and recover stolen property.

"On the appointed day the doctor appeared and requested that all the native servants be summoned to the courtyard. They were called, and as they filed into the open air he observed keenly the faces and actions and bearing of each one that passed. The last was a man of whom I had entertained very strong suspicions. He averted his eyes and gave such signs of nervousness that mentally confirmed the suspicions I had already entertained. All the servants squatted in a circle in the middle. The doctor built a small fire, into which he threw fragrant woods and drugs that made a smoke so nauseous that I was compelled to retire a little way from the sickening fumes. While the smoke was at its highest the thief doctor ordered the circle to contract, then passed around the fire, blowing the fumes with a palm leaf fan into the face of each servant, repeating certain phrases, which I was told called down unnumbered curses upon the evildoer.

"This process over, he placed before each squatting servant a palm leaf, then produced a jar covered with mystic figures, and, carrying it in his hands, he paraded around the circle, chanting in a loud, harsh voice curses more terrible than he had bestowed before on the thief. This done, he produced a watch, a regular old timer, took note of the hour and administered to each of the suspects a large tablespoonful of dry rice powder, and after each had taken his medicine the doctor again danced around the circle, sometimes within, sometimes without, shouting, yelling, shrieking in the most ear piercing tones for several minutes, occasionally consulting his watch. At the end of five minutes he stopped, passed around, and each servant held up his palm leaf, with the mouthful of masticated rice on it, for inspection. All had stood the test except one, the man whom I had suspected and who had also evidently been noted by the doctor. His face was distorted, his eyes protruded, and he rapidly worked his jaws in agony, trying to chew the flour that in spite of all his chewing remained dry. At the doctor's command he spit out the dry powder on his palm leaf, and the doctor, turning to his patron, said, 'There is the thief.'

"A full confession followed, together with the recovery of the articles stolen, and in return for his service the doctor received a fee representing about 50 cents and went away perfectly satisfied. Of course the whole performance was an experiment of the effects of self-consciousness of guilt. The innocent readily passed the test, but the guilty man could not make his salivary glands do their duty, and I think his terror was increased by the nauseating smoke and the frightful curses shrieked out by the doctor."

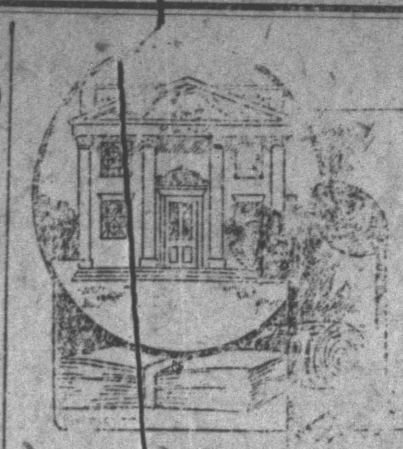

THE CHEERFUL TURTLE.

This Queer Creature Enjoys Many Peculiar Advantages.

"To be or not to be—a turtle? To be certainly, if I could not be a man," declares one who speaks with knowledge of his subject. "Basking in tropical suns or cruising leisurely in cool depths, the turtle has an exceedingly good time. As soon as the baby turtle emerges from the egg he scuttles down to the sea. He has no one to teach him, no one to guide. In his little brain there is implanted a streak of caution, based on the fact that until a certain period his projecting armor is soft and no defense against hungry fish, and he immediately seeks shelter in the tropical profusion of the gulf weed, which holds within its branching fronds an astonishing abundance of marine life.

"Here the young turtle feeds unmolested and knows that his armor is hardening apace. Once he has attained the weight of twenty-five pounds he may 'cheek' freely any monster of the deep. After that no fish or mammal ever interferes with him. Intending devourers may struggle all day to break through his iron shell. They always fail.

"The turtle, like the sperm whale, has but one enemy—man. But the cheerful turtle can stay below the surface for a week if he wants to, and he often does, while if he had to spend an equal time on land he would enjoy the change and be none the worse for it. Injuries that would be instantly fatal even to fish leave the turtle apparently undisturbed, and his power of keeping death at bay is nothing short of marvelous."

Advertising For Federal Building Sites.

Treasury Department, Office of the Secretary.

Washington, D. C., June 3.

Proposals will be received, to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m. July 2, 1908 for the sale or donation to the United States of a suitable site, centrally and conveniently located for the Federal building to be erected in Greenville, North Carolina. A corner lot, of (approximately) 120x150 feet, is required. Each proposal must give the price, the character of foundations obtainable, the proximity to street cars, sewer, gas, and water mains, etc., and must be accompanied by a diagram indicating the principal street, the north point, the dimensions and grades of the land, the widths and paving of adjacent streets and alleys, whether the alleys are public or private, and whether or not the city owns land occupied by sidewalks. The vendor must pay all expenses connected with furnishing evidences of title and deeds of conveyance. Improvements on property must be reserved by the vendor; but pending the commencement of the Federal building they may remain on the land upon payment of a reasonable ground rent. The grantor must, however, remove all improvements on thirty days' notice so to do. The right to reject any proposal is reserved. Each proposal must be sealed, marked "Proposal for Federal building site at Greenville, North Carolina," and mailed to the Secretary of the Treasury "(Supervising Architect), Washington, D. C. No special form of proposal is required or provided.

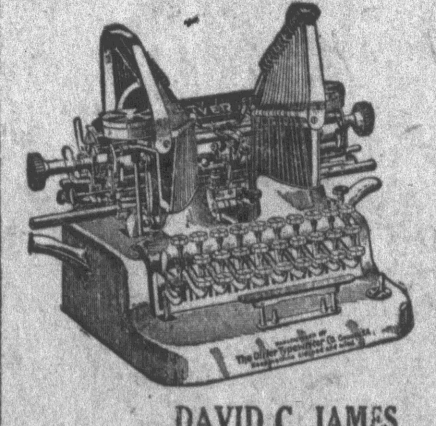
