## ENROUTE TO THE CONVENTION.

Splendid Special Train Service—Charlotte Extends Glad Hand.

Charlotte, N. C., June 23.—The Seaboard Air Line railroad gave the people superb service in its special State convention train that was run from Raleigh to Charlotte today. The Norfolk & Southern train that took many of the eastern delegates to Raleigh was transferred to the union station, where the change was made to the Seaboard special without trouble. This train, which was composed of eight day coaches and three Pullmans, left Raleigh promptly at 11:30 with every car comfortably filled. Mr. C. H. Gattis, the traveling passenger agent of the Seaboard at Raleigh, accompanied the special and personally saw that the passengers had every courtesy and comfort.

The special reached Charlotte in good time and the delegates found a cordial welcome awaiting them. The city is a mass of humanity, ablaze with electricity and gorgeous in decorations. The crowd, great as it is, is well cared for. There are roofers everywhere working for their respective candidates and enthusiasm runs high. All is yet at sea as to who will win the nomination for governor. Candidates for other offices are not considered much until the nomination for governor is out of the way. All interest centers around that office and many of the delegates have no thought of anything else.

The Pitt delegation came through in good shape and are comfortably quartered at the Selwyn and Central hotels. Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis, who will be temporary chairman at the opening of the convention, is the guest of Judge Burwell.

When the special reached Sanford, Mrs. Ada Cherry, who is visiting her father there, was at the depot to shake hands with the home folks who were aboard.

## THE CLEVER HOUSEWIFE.

Cleverness Does Not Alone Lie in Book-Learning.

With all the discussion that is now going on about what constitutes the clever woman, it is interesting to get the opinion of a great English author and editor.

A clever woman, as a wife, is a woman who is skilled in the conduct of life, in the control of the household, and, above all, in the management of her husband, says William T. Stead, in the July Delineator. A woman who could neither read nor write would be a bad wife for any ordinary man in a civilized community; but such an illiterate woman, if she were clever in all the arts of domestic economy, in the rearing of children, and in being at once the inspiration and comfort of her husband, would be clever enough for the cleverest man in existence, and infinitely preferable to the cleverest woman in book-learning that has ever been turned out by university.

There is a Language in Laughter.

A laugh is a good thing—some kinds of laugh, at least. But there are smiles that are as cruel as a knife thrust, and the laughter of the thoughtless, echoing person is meaningless, says Ann Story Allen in July Designer.

It is curious how, now and again, anecdote after anecdote will raise a laugh or a smile long after the original jest or point has been lost sight of. A drawn-down countenance a mispronounced word, even an ungenerous personal remark will draw forth a loud echo of what started as spontaneous mirth. One laughs on and on, because, seemingly, it would be discourteous to relax one's face to its natural lines again.

Have you ever listened quite impersonally to the words that brought forth these sounds? As senseless, as void of wit, wisdom or real jollity as the conversation of fairly intelligent persons well could be.

But if the laugh is purchased by the sacrifice of a kind thought, by the telling of a half-truth, by the dragging down of some secret belief, either yours or another's to parade it as harlequin—then the price is too high.

There is so much that is legitimately funny; there are so many ways besides unkind ones; there is so much of the humorous that is close to the borderland of tenderness, that it is really well worth while "making people laugh" by such means as leave no sting, that carry no hint of treachery.

Use your wit cautiously. See that your humor has no vanity pushing it along into notice; and, if you aren't funny a bit, and can't remain content to laugh at the pleasant jokes of others, and to frown down quite independently those that are unkind.

Let your laughter be as honest as your speech.

## EX-GOVERNOR JARVIS GIVEN AN OVATION.

—Resolutions on Death of Ex-President Cleveland.

Charlotte, N. C., June 24—The Pitt county delegation met this morning in Charlotte and selected Harry W. Whedbeas spokesman for the delegation and J. L. Fleming as a member of the committee on credentials. The convention could not begin promptly at noon owing to a great demonstration for the candidates.

Ex-Gov. Jarvis was given an ovation as he entered the hall. He made a great speech as temporary chairman of the convention. The districts were called at the conclusion of his speech that they might name their members of the various committees. The convention then adjourned at 2 p. m. for dinner.

Just before the convention adjourned for dinner R. P. Buxton, of Winston, read resolutions expressing regret at the death of Ex-President Grover Cleveland. The convention adopted the resolution standing with bowed heads while the band played "Rock of Ages." The convention then adjourned in respect to his memory until 4:30 p. m.

## Negro Boy Killed by Train.

A small negro boy named David Keys died this morning at the Washington Hospital as a result of severe injuries sustained from being run over by an A. C. L. truck train about 5 p. m. yesterday on Third street.

The boy, who was reported to be attempting to steal a ride on the train, was about 10 years of age. One of his arms was mutilated so badly that amputation was necessary. The skull was fractured to such extent that the brain was oozing from an embrazure when he was carried to the hospital.

This is another warning to boys and their parents to avoid such accidents.—Washington Messenger, 23rd

Who? Wait for the news.

There is not much danger of a dark horse.

Charlotte will have at least 8,000 visitors today.

The Teddy convention is now in session at Oyster Bay.

You would think that the governor is the only officer to be elected.

As predicted the Charlotte convention is the largest ever held in the State.

The editor is away taking in the convention. He promised to tell us what happens.

We all have our ear to the ground listening for something from Charlotte.

That is a picture of ideal Americanism at Charlotte. The North Carolina type is nowhere surpassed.

The managers for the different candidates for governor have made claims which varied greatly. We will now have a chance to see which was right.

Ex-Gov. Jarvis will preside at the opening of the convention today. The wisest and best thing to do will be to make him permanent chairman.

There is nothing that will help a town any more than easy accessible thoroughfares. We have excellent railroad facilities, but the town is in danger of losing permanent trade because of the inconvenience which people on the north side of the river now have to suffer. It is only about a month now before the tobacco market will open, and that inconvenience should be relieved as far as possible before that time. This is a matter of concern to all the business men of the town.

Since we have better facilities for moving truck, more of our people ought to go into that kind of business. Trucking can be made a most successful business in eastern North Carolina, and Pitt can be one of the leading counties. By engaging in the trucking industry our people would not have to depend entirely upon cotton and tobacco for a market crop. Then too, trucking brings money into the county in the spring and early summer, and thus gives a more even business year.

One hundred and fifteen people left here last Sunday morning for a day's outing at Morehead City, and this during hard times. People are not to blame for getting a day's outing when they have no public place for rest and recreation in Greenville. Some public money might well be expended in providing a park

for Greenville. The town continues to grow, and the longer the matter is deferred the more difficult will be to secure a site. A large town must have public conveniences and attractions.

## ANIMAL LEGENDS.

**The Buzz of the Mosquito and the Swallow's Forked Tail.**

In Palestine, where several religions exist side by side, legends have crossed, and intermingled in such a way as to make a distinct folklore. A collection of stories from "Folklore in the Holy Land," by the Rev. J. E. Hanauer, contains many Bible legends in new forms and with humorous additions. One explains how the mosquito came to buzz and why the swallow's tail is forked.

After the fall of man the serpent missed the reward which the evil one had promised him—namely, the sweetest food in the world. An angel was appointed to assign to every creature his food and dwelling place. The serpent asked for human flesh. But Adam protested and pointed out shrewdly that as nobody had ever tasted human flesh it was impossible to maintain that it was the most luscious of food. Thus he gained a year's respite for the race.

Meanwhile the mosquito was sent round the world with instructions to taste and report upon the blood of every living creature. At the end of twelve months it was to report in open court the result of its researches.

Now, Adam had a friend in that sacred bird the swallow, which annually makes a pilgrimage to Mecca and all holy places. This bird shadowed the mosquito all the twelve months until the day of the decision. And, best of all, the automatic habit of fuller and more rhythmic inhalations may be firmly fixed.—Eustace Miles in Metropolitan Magazine.

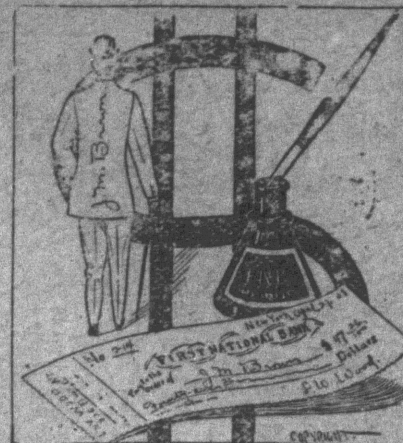

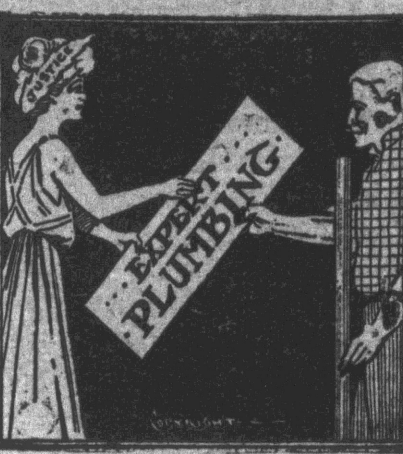

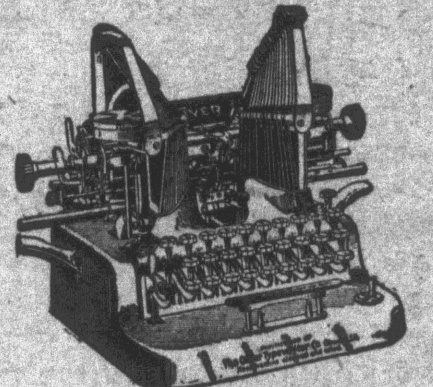

**THE SAILFISH.**  
It Takes Great Skill to Land Him With Reel and Rod.  
The small number of sailfish annually taken in Atlantic waters is partially explained by the uncertainties and difficulties to be encountered in locating their presence as well as the great skill, experience and endurance required in handling them with rod and reel.  
Although infrequently seen near the Florida keys, they seldom leave the vicinity of the warm gulf stream, whose waters approach within five miles of Palm Beach.  
One usually finds them on warm, sunny days, swimming with their great dorsal fins slightly out of water, and immediately a school is discovered all power must be used to forge ahead of them, cross their path a hundred yards in advance, then stop and allow the boat to drift slowly, when a lively fresh bait should be cast.

While they often strike at cut bait or a spoon in trolling, they are seldom well hooked, owing to the peculiar character of their jaws. As a rule they bite very quietly and must be given thirty to forty feet of line before striking, as their mouths are small, hard and bony, not unlike the tarpon in their internal structure, and can rarely be captured unless the bait is well swallowed.

When hooked they create a terrific commotion, first endeavoring to peel the most powerful reels in their rushes, then making perpendicular leaps in rapid succession, clearing the waves by many feet, trying desperately to shake out the hook and finally making long side dashes just under the water, somewhat like a kingfish.

These movements are occasionally interrupted by low, rapid flights just above the water, when their immense sail seems to play its part in aerial navigation.—Forest and Stream.
