Makes a Splendid Beginning on Thursday.

For some time the people of Ayden have been wanting a tobacco market in that town. A few weeks ago they began planning to this end by organizing a stock company to erect a warehouse. The house was pushed to completion, was leased by J. W. Glenn and J. J. Gentry, warehousemen of experience, and the opening sale took place on Thursday.

The people of Ayden and community were jubilant over the success that attended the opening of the tobacco market. A tremendous crowd was present and the sale was a large one, something like 20,000 pounds of tobacco being on the floor, and it sold at good prices.

So enthusiastic are the Ayden people over the market that they have already arranged for a second warehouse to be ready for business by the first of September, and it has been rented in advance.

The opening of the tobacco market there is going to mean much in the upbuilding of Ayden. A strong factor that will make it a success is the earnest support the business men of the community are giving it. You can hear every one of them talking and working for the market. Such a spirit of co-operation and community pride is the making of a town.

INSTITUTE FOR THE WOMEN

From the Farm Homes—To be Held in Greenville Friday, Aug. 14.

In connection with the regular, annual farmers institute for men to be held at Greenville, Friday Aug. 14th, there will also be held a meeting for the women from the farms. One or two women speakers will be furnished by the State department of agriculture and these will be assisted by the men conducting the men's institute. As this meeting will be held on the same day and at the same place as the farmers institute a joint meeting of the men and women may be arranged for the afternoon.

The women have greater and even more perplexing problems in the homes than the men have on the farms. Why should they not come together and discuss these problems and get inspiration and help in solving them. We have heard of no woman attending such an institute who did not become interested.

Those not familiar with the purposes of the institutes being held by our State department of agriculture for the benefit of the women from the farm homes may be interested in knowing something of the class of subjects discussed at these meetings. Any or all of the following may be discussed if those present desire:

The farm fruit garden, the farm vegetable garden, farm poultry, farm butter making, beautifying the home surroundings, home conveniences, literature for the farm home, home making, home nursing, cooking meats, vegetable, etc., bread making, educating the girls on the farm.

These are a fair sample of the questions that may be discussed at these women's institutes; and surely they are practical subjects and an intelligent discussion of them cannot fail to be of much benefit to those who attend. Do not forget this meeting for the women.

Trade Report.

Richmond, Va. Aug. 5, 1908.

Bradstreet's Saturday will say for Richmond and vicinity.

Trade in most lines show some improvement over a comparative period of last month. Orders for dry goods, shoes, hats and kindred lines continue coming in in fair volume. Stocks in the retailers hands especially in rural districts, are reported much depleted, and jobbers are encouraged at the outlook for fall trade. Local wholesalers for seeds have just closed the most successful season in their history. Produce is at its usual end season dullness. Building, especially in small structures, is active in most sections of the district. Retail trade is dull. Collections continue slow.

Crop Report.

Seasonable weather has prevailed throughout the district for the past week, and crops have been much benefited. In some sections damage to crop has resulted from storms, but not to a degree that would affect general report. Small quantities of the 1908 crop of tobacco are being marketed in North Carolina at satisfactory prices. This crop in Virginia is reported in excellent condition.

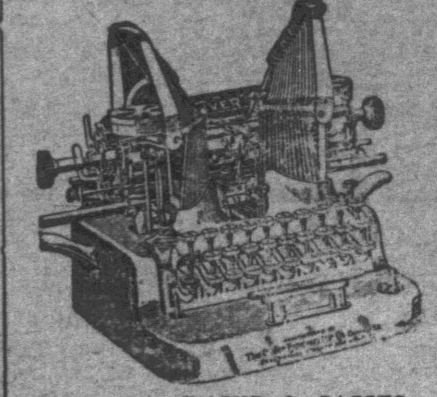

Within limits the patriotism of caddies for their own links is to be admired, but in the following story, told by Mr. Sidney Fry, it seems to be carried a little too far:


