ALDERMEN IN LONG SESSION

AND TRANSACTS CONSIDERABLE BUSINESS.

Levy Taxes for Current Year—Elect Officers to Fill Vacancies—Discuss Sidewalk Paving.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night with all the members present. Notwithstanding several special meetings had recently been held, there was business enough to keep the board in session until 2 o'clock, a. m., when adjournment was had to the 14th.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the issuing of a note for \$2,199.40 to the Norfolk & Southern railway to cover an amount due by town for freight. Upon the recommendation of the finance committee the levy on taxes for the current year was made as follows:

For general purposes 53 cents on each \$100 property valuation and \$1.59 poll.

For maintenance of graded schools 40 cents on property and \$1.20 on poll.

For interest on school bonds 6 cents on property and 18 cents on poll.

For interest on improvement bonds, first series, 24 cents on property and 72 cents on poll.

For interest on improvement bonds, second series, 27 cents on property and 81 cents on poll.

This makes the total tax \$1.50 on each \$100 of property valuation and \$4.50 on each poll, an increase over last year from \$1.15 and \$3.45, but this increase is mainly for interest on the additional bond issue that the town voted last year for the training school and improvements.

A note for \$1,412.15 was authorized to be issued in favor of F. J. McGuire to cover an amount due him for street paving.

A resolution was adopted that all communications from the water and light commission to the board of aldermen must be reduced to writing and so transmitted.

The water and light commission reported that citizens had requested arc lights on the corner of Evans and Twelfth streets, Reade and Tenth streets and Pitt and Twelfth streets. No action was taken on the requests.

The street committee reported that the street sweeper had been ordered.

The market committee made report of the stalls in the market house that had been rented.

The mayor was instructed to have publication made giving notice that all trees on Dickinson avenue that interfere with sewers shall be cut down, and that all persons who are opposed to the cutting down of such trees be notified to appear at an adjourned meeting of the board on the 14th when their objections will be heard.

The committee appointed to sell the town horses reported so far they had been unable to make a sale.

J. V. Harper appeared in regard to selling ice cream on Sunday, and the matter was referred to the ordinance committee.

On the question of paving the sidewalks on Evans street and Dickinson avenue there was much discussion and several motions were made. Alderman W. S. Moye moved that a contract be made with F. J. McGuire to do the paving at \$1.25 per square yard. Aldermen Higgs offered an amendment to this that the paving be done on a 10 per cent. commission basis. Aldermen

F. M. Wooten was elected a dispensary commissioner to fill a vacancy on that board.

D. D. Overton was elected chief of the fire department.

Mayor Whedbee and Alderman Flanagan were appointed a committee to investigate the conduct of G. A. Clark for overstepping his authority as policeman.

A donation of \$20 was made to the Rough and Ready fire company for the purpose of sending delegates to the meeting of the firemen's association.

A petition from citizens of Dickinson avenue asking that sidewalks be paved from curb line to property line, a distance of not less than 8 feet, was laid on the table.

After allowing accounts the meeting, at 2 o'clock, adjourned to Friday night, 14th.

THE PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD.

May Acquire the N. & S. When Receivership Ends.

News of the greatest interest to Eastern North Carolina concerning the Norfolk and Southern railway comes from Norfolk. It is persistently rumored there, and the rumors are not discredited, that following the present receivership of the Norfolk and Southern, the Pennsylvania railway will control the road and operate it as a Southern feeder to the big Northern system. One of the receivers of the Norfolk and Southern, Mr. Thomas Fitzgerald, was once with the Baltimore and Ohio railway and at that time was closely allied with the Pennsylvania railway interests; and it has been stated that he represents the Pennsylvania railway now in the receivership of the Norfolk and Southern.

The Pennsylvania railway recently took over the N. Y., P. and N. railway and it is said that its absorption would give the Pennsylvania railway direct connection with the Norfolk and Southern, making the ownership of the latter road logically probable.

The Standard Oil Company seems no longer to be considered as the largest holder of stock in the Norfolk and Southern, currently given to the idea that Standard Oil was most heavily involved in it being due to the fact that the Rockefeller interests own large areas of timber along the right of way of the road and a cooperage company at Belhaven.

At the instance of the Pennsylvania, it is said, the big improvements undertaken by the Norfolk and Southern have been stopped, among these improvements being the great million dollar bridge across Albemarle sound. When the panic came the bridge was about half completed and the statement issues from an authoritative source that the Pennsylvania railway ordered that the work be suspended temporarily. It was said that the Pennsylvania had been putting up the money for the improvements on the Norfolk and Southern.—Raleigh News and Observer.

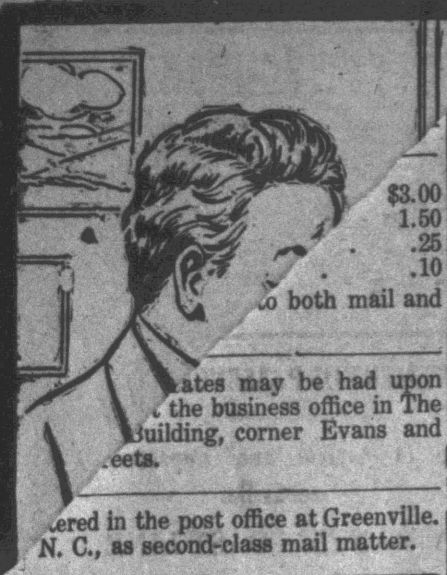
The sincere sympathy of this lodge go out to the bereaved family and loved ones and especially to our worthy brother and his family, and we commend them to Him who knows and does all things well.

A REASONABLE VIEW.

The Reflector confesses that it is unable to see the matter of the State corporation commission allowing telephone companies to make their rates for night messages the same as for day messages, in the same light as it is viewed by some of its exchanges. The Raleigh News and Observer, for instance, denounces the ruling as "arbitrary, unjust and unreasonable." We have never yet been able to see why either a telephone or telegraph message should be sent at a cheaper rate at night than during the day, when it requires just as much service and expense to transmit one as the other. We have been a telegraph operator for twenty five years and know that it is just as much trouble and requires just as much labor to handle a night message as a day message, and we take it for granted that the same is true in the matter of telephone messages. If the companies can afford to send messages at a certain rate at night, it looks to us like they can afford to give just as low a rate in the day time. It seems to us that it would be equally as reasonable to say that railroad and street car lines should carry passengers at a lower rate by night than they do by day, as to say that telephones should give lower rates for night service. In most lines of occupation, especially where service is regulated by labor unions, the scale of wages for night work is higher than for day work. If a physician visits a patient at night his fee is usually twice as high as for the same visit in the day time. The newspapers themselves have to pay printers a higher rate for night work than for day work. In almost any service requiring night work higher pay is demanded than for day work. Therefore we are unable to see why the telephone companies should be abused for wanting as much for night service as for day service. The Reflector believes in perfect fairness in all things, and that is its reason for this expression of opinion on this subject.

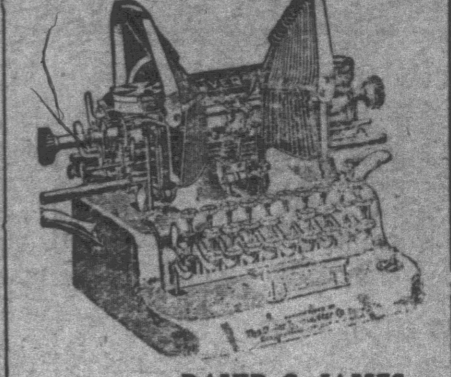

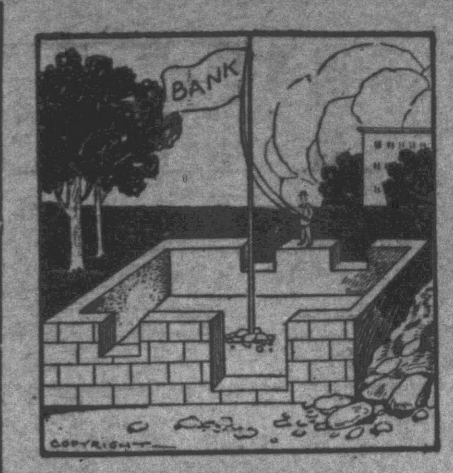

Going Up in a Balloon and Coming Down in a Parachute.

THE AGONY OF A FIRST TRIP

Experience and Sensations of an Acrobat Who Took the Place of a Professional Aeronaut in an Emergency. The Dash Through Space.

I once went up in a balloon and came down in a parachute. Something went wrong, and all the money in the world dotted would not induce me to make the experiment again.

One grows strangely accustomed to dangers as an acrobat, and when it was suggested that I should earn \$25 in as many minutes by taking the place of a parachutist who had fallen ill at the last minute I jumped at the chance.

It was at a large country fair. The laughing crowd had probably never seen a balloon go up. As the great silk bag gradually swelled a silence fell upon the onlookers.
