Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 8.—The \$1,000 subscription of John D. Rockefeller to the fund to establish a memorial for "Uncle Remus" (Joel Chandler Harris) has a condition attached to it.

President Joyner, of "Uncle Remus" Memorial Association, received a letter from Mr. Rockefeller yesterday, stating that he would give \$1,000 provided the association raises \$49,000 in one year.

The letter surprised the officers of the association and they will inform Mr. Rockefeller that his gift will not be accepted with the conditions attached.

The association has fixed no limit to the memorial fund and does not intend to.

A FAMOUS PLATE.

The First Engraving Was Printed on a Laundress' Bundle.

Two groups of tourists were standing in the Pitti palace before the large plate of pure silver upon which Finiguerra, the great master of early engraving, had depicted his lovely "Madonna and Child" in a trellised arbor covered with roses. An Italian lady was telling her friends in an undertone the charming anecdote of Finiguerra and the laundress.

The artist, it seems, in mastering the new and difficult art of engraving upon metal had acquired a singularly keen eye and delicate touch, and he also possessed a number of very fine and sharp instruments, which he used in his work.

Being a kindly man, he sometimes placed both his sure hand and his fine tools at the service of his friends and neighbors in performing for them some of the simpler operations of surgery until he acquired quite a reputation for his skill in doctoring their hurts.

One day a poor laundress who had been washing clothes, in wringing out a garment in which a needle had been carelessly left, ran it deeply into her hand. Worse yet, it broke off in the wound, and a part remained imbedded in the flesh. She was in much pain, and on her way back from the stream where she had been washing she stopped at the house of the artist and was admitted.

Entering his studio, she hastily set down her wet and heavy bundle and held out the injured hand, begging his assistance. Finiguerra left his work to help her and after long and delicate manipulation extracted the broken needle. The woman thanked him and turned to go, lifting her bundle from its resting place.

Then he saw that she had set it upon one of his engravings. Like all others at that time, it was a plate of engraved metal, complete in itself and regarded as a single and sufficient picture, exactly as if it had been a painting.

But as the damp bundle was raised the quick eye of Finiguerra saw that it had received an impression from the engraved picture beneath, and his quick mind seized at once the suggestion of the possibility of indefinite reproduction from a single original. So that from the kindness of a great artist to a poor washerwoman sprang the discovery which has placed the beautiful products of the engraver's art within the reach of all of us today.

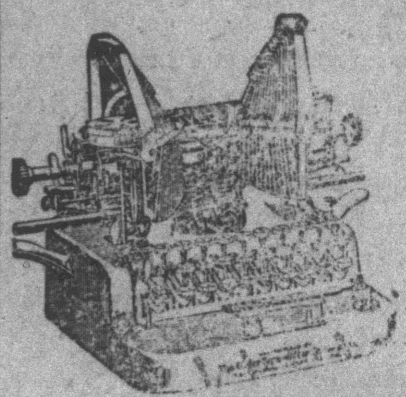

FIGHTING THE SEA.

The Amphibious Dutchman and Holland's Battle With Water.

Holland's existence is one long fight against the inroads of the sea. Much of the country is below the ocean level and has only been rescued from the waves by the colossal system of dikes. The Dutchman has grown so used to the water that oftentimes he is nearly an amphibious animal. Fifty thousand Hollanders live in barges on the canals. Even in winter, when the canals are frozen, these people stick to their boats, for they have no other home. The canal houses used to be towed by dogs, but now this work is done by men and women, each family towing its own boat.

Dutchmen are among the most expert navigators in the world. In utter indifference to the natural antagonism between land and water and in ability to make either contribute to their necessities, they have even excelled the English. At the relief of Leyden the prince of Orange, by breaking down the dikes and letting in the sea, made navigation feasible on a tract of ground which had formerly been dry land, and the strange spectacle was seen of the Dutch warships floating among the tops of orchards and past the chimneys of submerged houses.

When Holland was invaded by France another prince of Orange formed the plan of abandoning the country entirely and conveying all its population to the East Indies. Holland has always relied on the ocean as a security against hostile powers. In our own time a member of the Dutch royal family attended a great review of Prussian troops. Regiment after regiment of strapping fellows marched by, but all the Dutchman would say was, "Not tall enough." Finally a grenadier regiment of unusually tall men came into the field. "Every one of these soldiers is over six feet high," remarked a Prussian officer to the Hollander. "Surely you will admit these are tall enough?" The Dutchman shook his head. "We can flood my country with ten feet of water," he observed. Doubtless the Prussian took the hint.—Buffalo Times.

The Umbrella.

The first umbrella ever seen in the streets of London was carried by the philanthropist James Hanway, who died in 1786. For many years after the introduction of umbrellas a man could not be seen carrying one without being hooted for his effeminacy, particularly when passing a hackney coach stand. The drivers of these vehicles regarded the umbrella in the light of a rival. For a long time coffee houses and inns were accustomed to keep a single umbrella of great magnitude for the purpose of shielding customers from the rain as they passed from the door to their carriages. This monstrous structure was carried by a waiter. It was not until about the year 1800 that the use of the umbrella became so general throughout Europe and America that a man could carry one without attracting the attention of passersby to a disagreeable extent. In Spain and Italy the article was first domesticated. France adopted it next and lastly England.—Spare Moments.

The next day he happened to meet an acquaintance who had seen him the night before, who asked: "I suppose you enjoyed the concert last night, Mr. Smith?" "Yes. It took me back to the days of my youth," the old man said with a reminiscent sigh. "Ah, summer days in the country, girl in a lawn dress, birds singing and all that?" "No, the days when I worked in a boiler shop in Scranton."—Philadelphia Ledger.

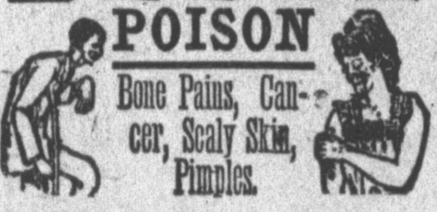
