## THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

### HOLDS AN INTERESTING MEETING THURSDAY NIGHT.

Adopts Resolution Requesting Aldermen to Put Sls. Near Tobacco Warehouses in Good Condition.

The Chamber of Commerce of Greenville met in the mayor's office Thursday night with about twenty five business men present. While the attendance was not as large as it should have been, those present showed that they were awake to the measures that mean for the progress of the town and the meeting was a very interesting one.

Dr. D. L. James, for the committee appointed to confer with officials of the Southern Express Company relative to the free delivery of express packages within the town, reported as a result of the committee's efforts that the officials of the express company had agreed to put on the free delivery September first.

Mr. H. A. White, for the committee appointed to confer with the county commissioners relative to accepting the offer of the government to send an expert here to give instruction in permanent road building, reported the progress of the committee. In this connection he read a letter from Congressman John H. Small who is assisting in this movement for better public roads in the county. A government expert will be here to go with the committee before the commissioners at their meeting on the first Monday in September.

There was then some discussion of the tobacco market and its value to the town, and that those in other avocations should show more interest in the market. Following this discussion the following resolution, offered by H. A. White, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Chamber of Commerce recognizes and appreciates the great value of our tobacco market to Greenville and Pitt county, and in order that the vast amount of leaf tobacco sold may be handled more speedily and to greater advantage by those directly interested, we recommend to the mayor and the Board of Aldermen of our city, that they have the streets mostly used in hauling this tobacco from the warehouses to the different factories, and vice-versa, put in the best possible condition at the earliest practicable time.

Realizing that at the present time the city's finances will not permit permanent improvements of this character, we suggest that clay (which is conveniently located) be hauled and mixed with the sand, which we believe will make a hard surface and greatly facilitate the handling of this year's crop.

Resolved further, that the president of this chamber do appoint a committee of three to confer with the Board of Aldermen with the view of securing their hearty co-operation in this matter, and that the secretary of this chamber be instructed to send a copy of this resolution to the city clerk, with the request that same be presented to the Board of Aldermen at their next meeting.

H. A. White, E. G. Flanagan and E. B. Ficklen were appointed to confer with the Board of Aldermen in this matter.

Reference was made to the need of a channel 10 feet in depth in Tar River as far up as Greenville, and a committee consisting of Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse, A. L. Blow and Jesse Speight was appointed to correspond

## FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

Interesting Sessions Held Here Today—Large Number Present.

There was a large number of farmers in town today, and their interest was divided between the large tobacco sales and the farmers' institute. The institute began in the court house at 10 o'clock, with a good attendance of farmers' who were much interested in what was going on. At the morning session T. B. Parker delivered an instructive address on soil improvement and legume crops, and Prof. W. F. Massey spoke on plant life.

Another session was held this afternoon when Dr. Tait Butler delivered an address. At the same time these meetings were going on in the court house there was another meeting for farmers' wives in the opera house where addresses were delivered by Mrs. W. T. Hollowell, of Goldsboro and Mrs. Burt, of Raleigh.

These meetings are very helpful, and we are glad to see our farmers and their wives taking such interest in them.

### Big Breaks Today.

There were lively times out on the tobacco market today, the warehouses having the largest sales of the season so far and a big crowd being present. The Liberty and the Star had from 49,999 to 50,000 pounds each, and the other houses had something like 25,000 pounds each, making close to 75,000 pounds on the market. There was some little complaint of prices being low, but on the whole farmers were pretty well satisfied as the quality of the tobacco was poor. The sale run over into the afternoon before it could be finished. It was noticeable that the good tobacco brought fine prices.

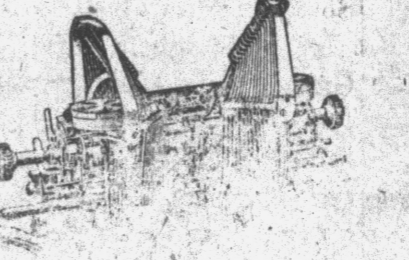

C., Aug. 12.—"The Atlantic Coast Line Railway is, through a lumber company, pushing its line from Spring Hope to Raleigh and ten miles of the system has already been built and the construction force is heading this way.
