## ROBERSONVILLE MURDERER HID.

### SEARCHERS CLOSE TO HIM FRIDAY NIGHT

He is Wounded and it is Believed Colored People are Helping Him to Evade Capture

Mr. Earl Ross, of Robersonville, was here today and tells us the negro who shot and killed Mr. Charles Whichard, on Wednesday, has not yet been captured, though searching parties are hunting for him. A party went to the home of another colored man about 3 miles from Robersonville, Friday night, where it had been rumored the murderer was hiding. The inmates of the house stated that the murderer had been there but left about 15 minutes before the searching party arrived, and also stated that he had a wound in one hip caused by a shot from some of the pursuing parties.

The people around Robersonville are very much wrought up over the killing of Mr. Whichard and will spare no effort in capturing the murderer. It is believed that the colored people of that section are aiding the murderer in keeping out of the way of searching parties.

A gentleman from near Williamston who went with the sheriff's posse Wednesday to aid in the search, was returning home after midnight that night, when he was halted by a crowd of some six or eight men in the road. They took him out of his buggy and the crowd drove off with his horse. The man walked on home and upon arriving there found his horse and buggy standing at the gate. Some pistol shots were heard as he was entering his house. It is supposed that the crowd who stopped him were out expecting the sheriff to pass that way with the murderer taking him to Williamston and that it was their purpose to take him from the officers.

The murderer has been seen three times by searching parties, but each time was some distance from them.

### Judge Moore Dead.

Asheville, N. C., Aug. 14.—Judge Frederick Moore, of the Superior court bench, died shortly after eight o'clock tonight after an illness of two weeks of typhoid fever.

## Seven Members of the "Rabbit's Foot" Seriously Burned.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 14.—Seven members of the Rabbit's Foot Company, a colored minstrel organization which appeared in Charlotte several nights ago, were badly burned in a car at Shelby at seven o'clock this morning. The injured were given medical attention at Shelby and were later brought to Charlotte in a special car, the train arriving about noon, and placed in the Good Samaritan hospital for treatment. Most of the victims of the flames were horribly burned about the hands and face.

Two horses which belonged to the company and which were hauled in one end of the car, where the members of the troupe slept, were burned to death.

The fire was caused by the explosion of a gasoline tank attached to a cooking stove which was located in one end of the burned car.

### Organize Precinct Clubs.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 14.—A call for the organization of Democratic clubs in the United States to aid in Mr. Bryan's campaign was issued today by the Democratic national committee. Mr. Bryan, imformed Chairman Mack and other members of the committee that he believed that the Democratic cause would derive its greatest impetus from the formation of these clubs throughout the country. The appeal for club organization was signed by Chairman Mack and John W. Tomlinson, head of the Committee on Club Organization.

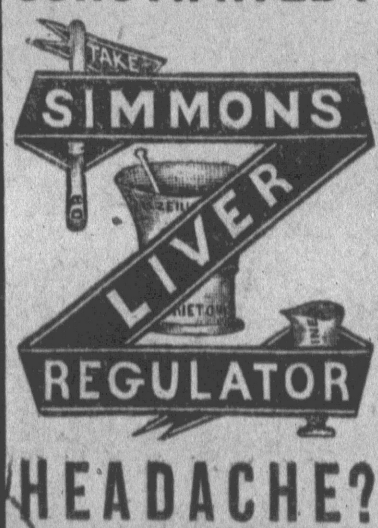

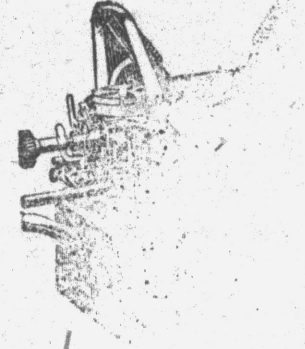

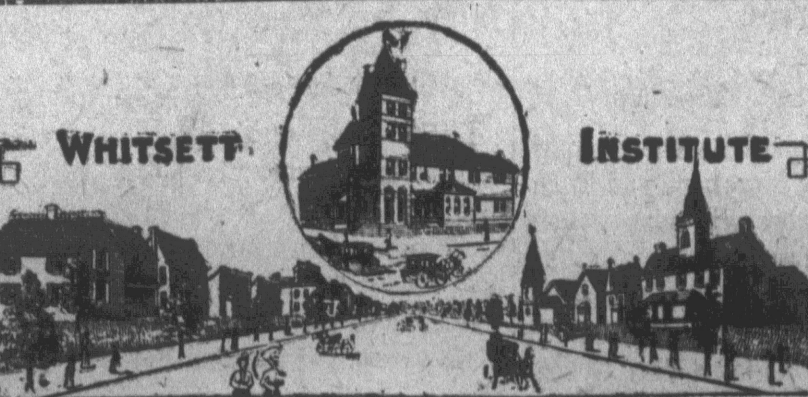
