GENERAL NEWS.

Happenings in Various Parts of the World.

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 15.—Five men were instantly killed and several injured by the premature explosion of dynamite in the plant of the Benson Mines Iron Ore company, in Benson today. Benson Mines is on the Carthage and Adirondack railroad, forty-five miles from Carthage.

Springfield Ill., Aug. 15.—The second lynching of the Springfield riot, according to a report to the police, occurred at Springfield and Edward streets tonight a negro whose name is William Donegan, was strung up to a telephone pole by a mob of such proportions that the firemen and policemen who responded to the first alarm were unable to handle it. Re-inforcements of troops were sent for.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 15.—The United States armored cruiser Colorado, of the Pacific fleet, en route from Puget Sound navy yard to San Francisco, ran ashore at Double Bluff in Puget Sound, twenty-five miles north of Seattle, about 10 o'clock today. Wireless messages from the cruiser to this city report her as resting easy and the belief was expressed that she would be floating at high tide this evening.

Bayside, L. I., Aug. 15.—Captain Peter Conover Hains, Jr., U. S. A., son of Brigadier General Peter Conover Hains, U. S. A., retired fired five bullets from a revolver into William E. Annis, of New York, owner and publisher of Burr McIntosh's Monthly and other magazines, late today on the landing stage of the Bayside Yacht Club, Flushing, and Annis, whom Captain Hains' brother had accused of having been improperly attentive to the captain's wife, died in the Flushing Hospital a few hours after the shooting.

Spartanburg, S. C., Aug. 15.—Mrs. W. T. Anderson was stung to death today by bees at her home at Mountain View, several miles from here. Mr. and Mrs. Anderson were enroute to church and had just left their home when the mule they were driving took fright and in trying to check the animal Mr. Anderson pulled the wrong line and ran the mule into a bee hive, causing the bees to swarm out by the thousands. Mrs. Anderson was badly stung and died in two hours. The mule and Mr. Anderson were also stung.

As Viewed in Washington.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 15.—Mr. Bryan in his speech of acceptance, delt the Republican party some terrific blows, on some very vulnerable spots. Mr. Bryan charges Secretary Taft with attempting to amend the Republican platform; which is an admission that the trusts and not the people wrote it. It is well known that a motion was made in the Republican national convention to provide for the physical valuation of railroads as a guide by which the amount of stocks and bonds should be issued by the roads. It is well known that the Republican national convention voted down this proposition. A great hardship on the people of this country results from the fact that when a railroad is organized and its stock is sold, the money for that stock goes into the pockets of the organizers and promoters as pure graft and then the crowd of grafters that organizes it, issues bonds for building the road. So that all of the proceeds of the stock is practically stolen and the bonds go to the building of the road.

By this wholesale stealing and grafting which has characterized all the roads of the country, the people are compelled to pay rates for transportation, high enough to pay the interest on the bonds issued and dividends on the stock, which is practically all water. If the railroads of this country had been built on honest principals, and if they were now being built on honest principals, the public could secure transportation at one half of what they are now paying. Mr. Taft has seen the evil of this and has recently held a joint debate with his own platform. This only shows how completely the Republican party has surrendered to the corporations and trusts. Mr. Bryan not only stands to correct this mighty evil but his party is united at his back.

Whereas the Republican party is bitterly opposed to it as shown by their vote in the Chicago convention which voted down the physical valuation proposition by 880 votes against 112 showing that more than 8 to 1 of the leaders of the Republican party, are opposed to it.

THE SECRET OF GLAMIS.

A Ghost That Hovers About an Ancient Scottish Castle.

"The old manor houses and castles throughout England," said the posted man, "have innumerable stories of ghosts, which the old colored 'mummies' used to call 'hants,' attached to them. The most famous of them all is perhaps the one connected with Glamis castle, the country seat of the earls of Strathmore, in Forfarshire. This is the most ancient inhabited castle of Scotland, although, of course, little of the original structure still survives. It was here that Macbeth, one of the minor kings of Scotland, murdered Duncan, and the principal scenes of Shakespeare's 'Macbeth' are laid within and without the castle walls. It came into the hands of the Lyon family, the present owners, about 1371, and from then on a long series of tragedies marked the progress of that family.

"The ghost that hovers about Glamis is a mysterious one, and the exact character of the manifestations is little known, but the point that makes it of thrilling public interest is the well known fact that there is a family secret in the Lyon family which only three living people share at the same time—the holder of the title, the heir apparent, if he has attained his majority, and the factor of the estate. Why the latter shares in the secret is not the least part of the mystery.

"On the day before the heir apparent attains his twenty-first birthday—or, if the then earl be sonless, the heir presumptive—he is solemnly initiated into the mystery. The opening of some hidden room or passage is connected with this initiation, and this has given rise to a legend in Scotland that a certain Earl Beattie of past times played a game of cards with the devil 'in propria persona,' lost the game and his soul at the same time, and the sealed chamber in Glamis is the one wherein the game was played. This is only one of many stories which purport to account for the mystery.

"As generation after generation has been initiated into the dread secret it has become widely known and advertised, and it is said in England that more than one of the heirs, when on the eve of coming of age, has promised his friends and cronies to reveal the mystery, but so far no such promise has ever been kept, nor has any factor of the house ever proved false to the trust reposed in him."—London Express.

FARMER'S ON TOP.

We rejoice with exceeding great joy that the "poor, down-trodden farmer" has arisen from the ashes and now bosses his business. We have recently visited a community where, a decade ago, the "time" merchant was the monarch of all he surveyed. The farmer put himself completely under the power of this village autocrat, and when he laid in his supplies the crusty clerks were under instructions to sell him as little as possible and at as high price. The poorer the buyer the bigger the price. In the fall of the year the crop was simply turned over the merchant, and there were hard times in the farmer's home until the next spring when the books were opened for another account. Oh, those were dark days for the tiller of the soil, and no negro who ever arose at the dawn of day at the crack of the overseer's lash was more of a slave. Things are different now. The farmer has learned a few things. He has put his brain to work, and by the proper use of fertilizer, the drainage of his land, the employment of better tools and the application of more common sense generally in the running of his business, he has become the Captain and the store man the servant. The fine prices of the past ten years have amply rewarded him for all his toil, and the rural free delivery has brought him into close touch with the outside world. We wish the changed conditions in this community might be universally true, and we are glad to believe there is steady progress everywhere in this direction. The raw and awkward hayseeder whose picture adorns the funny papers, is coming to be the finest gentleman in the bunch.—Charity and Children.

The farmer is indeed coming to the front. He is no longer the mere hewer of wood and drawer of water for the other fellow to make money on, but he is developing a capacity for business that equals the best of them. A most important step the farmer has taken in years is organization. It used to be said that the farmers could not organize, and any step in that direction was regarded as a joke. But things are not that way now. The farmers saw that other classes of men were organizing and working together for their mutual benefit, and they have gone to doing some of it on their own account.

Why, down this way about five years ago a bunch of them who were tobacco growers, got their heads together and concluded there was money in the tobacco warehouse business. They reasoned it out that if warehousemen could make big money selling the tobacco crop for the farmers, there was no reason why they, the producers, could not operate a warehouse in which to sell their crop and turn the commission money back into their own pockets. The result of this reasoning was that these farmers got to-

gether, bought a warehouse in Greenville, put a competent warehouseman in charge of it and started the business. Of course other warehousemen began fighting the new concern, called it all manner of names and tried to drive it out of business. But the farmers were not the kind to be choked off, for having got a taste of the business they saw it was just as easy to make money for themselves as it was for somebody else. And in this the farmers were no fools. From the very start their business was a success and good dividends have been declared every year, the aggregate for five years running away above a hundred per cent. That looks like the farmer knows how to organize and do business.

Now the parent business at Greenville has, in response to solicitations, widened out its operations and is conducting warehouses in three other neighboring counties. And from the Louisburg Times we see this same spirit is getting in the farmers up that way, they having organized a mutual company and started the warehouse business there. We hear that they got news of what Pitt county farmers had done, sent to officers here and got particulars of how the business was done, studied it over and organized a company of their own along the same line. Succeed? Of course they will.

Not only in the tobacco business are farmers coming together for their mutual benefit, but in many places they have organized and built cotton warehouses to manipulate that crop. They have a big warehouse of this kind nearby at Scotland Neck, and we see from the papers that farmers all over the cotton belt are organizing to build warehouses of this kind.

Yes, sir, the farmer is coming business man, and he is going to keep on coming until he leads all the rest. And here's hoping for his continued success and ascending in his business pursuits. Let him get on top and stay there.
