QUARTER MILLION POUNDS

Tobacco Market Beats Last Season That Much in Three Weeks.

There are always some people ready to run down anything and everything, regardless of whether there are any facts to bear out what they say. Some of them have recently been making very reckless statements about the Greenville tobacco market, saying among other things that the market was going backward and not doing much business this season. To show the absurdity of such statements and to let the public know the facts, we have obtained some figures that speak for themselves.

The Greenville tobacco market since the opening of this season on Monday, August 3rd, up to and including the sales for Thursday, 20th, sold exactly 171,733 pounds more than the market sold the first twenty days of last season.

A conservative estimate places the quantity on the warehouse floors today, August 21st, at 200,000 pounds, while the same date of last year there were 90,000 pounds.

So it will be seen that for the first three weeks of this season the sales have been over a quarter million pounds more than the first three weeks of last season.

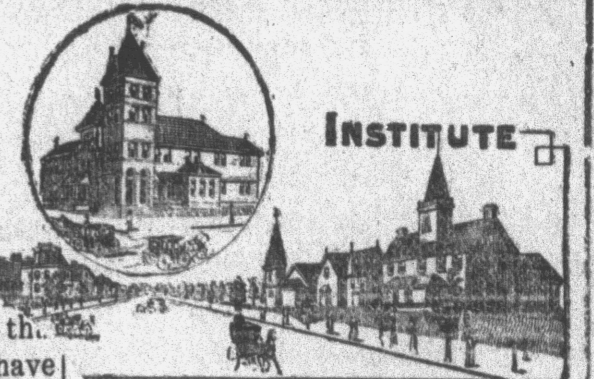

NOTES OF ANIMALS.

The Theory of One Writer About the Origin of Music.

Music did not have its birth "when Jubal struck the corded shell," as ignorant humanity has been led to suppose.

Music originated in the cry of the peacock, the bleat of the goat and the croak of the frog. According to an interesting article on the relationship between music and emotion, which appears in the Annals of Psychological Science, Dr. Henry Fotherby, the writer, also suggests that the appreciation of time and rhythm in music may be due to the rhythmic shock of the heart's beat on the circulation.

The nerves, he says, may play an important part in the appreciation of musical sounds, and he points out the connection between the nerves and music by the tendency to express music when heard by movements of the head and arms and sometimes by the trunk and legs.

Dr. Fotherby gives a feasible reason for the fact that the lower notes of the scale have always been employed to describe anger, fear and reverence, while the treble notes have been associated with sunshine, light heartedness, sociability and love. The lower notes associate themselves with the growls of wild beasts, the moan of the wind in the forest, the roar of thunder. The upper notes imitate the songs of birds, the chirp of the grasshopper, the hum of insect life. "The Hindoo note Sa, corresponding with our C," says Dr. Fotherby, "is the note of the peacock. Ri, our D, was the note of the lowing of an ox. These were always attributed to wonder and terror.

"Ga, or E, Ma, or F, were the cries of the goat and the crane respectively and were associated with compassion and love.

"Ni, or B, Dha, or A, were the notes of the elephant and the frog, the former associated with compassion and the latter with disgust or alarm."

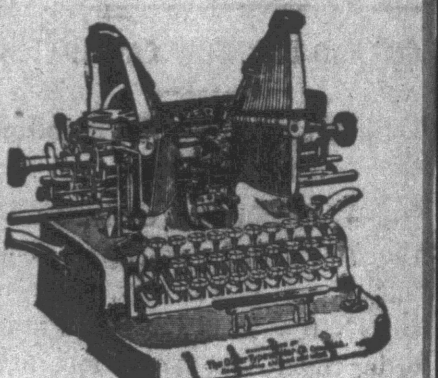

WHALE GUNS.

How They Originated and When They Were First Used.

The first attempt to use guns in the capture of whales was made as long ago as 1731. As the reader knows, the warships of that period carried swivels as well as great guns, the swivels being small cannon having a bore of something like an inch in diameter. They were called swivels because they were mounted on a universal joint, or swivel, by means of which they could be pointed in any desired direction. Some bright man-o-war sailor conceived the idea of using them to kill whales. The weapon that was then developed consisted of a stout barrel, perhaps thirty inches long, that was supplied with a wooden stock which was pivoted in an iron fork rising from the bow of a common whaleboat. The projectile was a short, two barbed harpoon, the shank of which was expanded a short distance above the barbs until it fitted comfortably within the bore of the gun. The expanded part of the shank was slotted, and a ring was made to slide to and fro within the slot. To this ring the harpoon line was secured.

In loading this gun a charge of loose powder was poured into the barrel, a wad inserted and rammed home with the butt end of the harpoon, the harpoon remaining, of course, within the barrel, ready for the shot. As the harpoon was pressed home the ring naturally slid along the slot and finally rested against the muzzle of the gun. The gun was fired by means of a flintlock that was inclosed within a metal case to protect it from the flying spray. Of course when the gun was fired the ring slid along the slot in the harpoon until it brought up against the butt; then it dragged out the line.

This swivel was used with some but no permanent success. Aiming was difficult while the boat was rolling and plunging over the waves, and with lack of accuracy came the danger of firing the harpoon into another boat instead of the whale. Moreover, the loose powder was often wetted, and the gun became useless at the moment when it was needed most.—Forest and Stream.

Melancholy Thought.

It is related in an old book on French cookery that Fontenelle, a French author of the early part of the eighteenth century belonging to the school of the precieuses, or literary exquisites, was found one beautiful morning lying at ease on the slope of a hill.

In the valley was a large flock of sheep. They skipped about daintily, waiting for their guardian to take them home. A friend of Fontenelle surprised him gazing meditatively upon these sheep.

"Aha!" said the friend. "The amiable philosopher ponders without doubt upon the vicissitudes of life."

"Yes," said Fontenelle. "I had been carefully looking over this flock, and I said to myself, 'It is possible that among these 200 sheep there is not one tender leg of mutton!'"

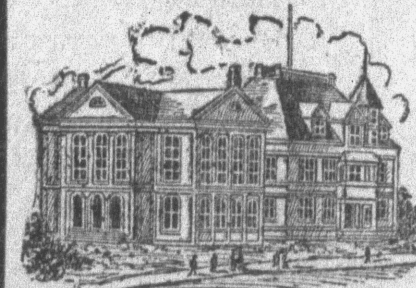
