APPEAL TO THE VOTERS.

Why the Present Board of County Commissioners Should be Re-nominated.

Editor Reflector:

We, the undersigned Democratic voters and citizens of Pitt county, request a small amount of space in your paper to call the attention of the Democrats of the county to a few of the many reasons why the present board of county commissioners should be re-nominated at the Democratic primaries, to be held on August 29th, 1908.

1st. The present board of county commissioners were elected at the last general election in November, 1906, and consequently, will have served the county for only one term or two (2) years at the expiration of their present term of office, and as it has been the almost unbroken custom of the Democratic party to re-nominate and elect, not only the board of county commissioners, but all other public officers, for at least two (2) terms, which custom is, in our opinion, a wise and just one, specially for county commissioners, who serve the public practically without pay, and generally without the plaudits of the people of the county, regardless of how well they may have served them, and we can see no reason now to break the custom of our party, which is of such long standing.

2nd. The present board has inaugurated and begun the construction of a great many new and permanent public improvements in the county, and several unfulfilled contracts that cannot possibly be completed during their term of office, such as the completion of the steel bridges at Greenville and Grifton, and it would be, indeed, awkward to put in a new board to see to the carrying out of contracts made by the present board, as well as unjust, both to the present board and to any new board. The present board should be allowed another term at least, in which to complete the improvements already begun, so that the same might bring credit to them, if properly and economically done, and censure to them if extravagantly and incorrectly done.

3rd. A member of the board of commissioners of the county would reside at the county seat. This will prove a great advantage specially in the handling of conflicts, and in the report of damages done by storms, rains, etc., on the roads, bridges and etc., as well as in many other ways.

4th. The present board of county commissioners have had considerable improvements made on the roads, bridges, dams and etc., in the county, and have, as we are informed, laid out and established plans for further developments along this line, which will be of material benefit to the public, and will eventually satisfy the people in each locality of the county, as the work done in particular localities has already pleased the people of such localities. Of course, the board would not, in a year and a half, reach every locality in the county, but we think they have done well indeed, and will, if re-nominated and elected, according to the usual custom, do much good.

5th. In saying what we have said above, we do not want to be understood as reflecting in any way upon the ability and integrity of any of the other gentlemen who have registered as candidates for county commissioner, on the contrary, we desire to say that the men regis-

\$1,000 Robbery at Oak City.

Chief of Police F. P. Pulley was notified this morning of a daring robbery at Oak City, Tuesday night when, robbers entered the new brick store of Harrell & Ross and helped themselves to \$1,000 worth of new goods, that had just been marked.

Harrell and Ross received the consignment of new merchandise the latter part of last week and had just completed marking the stock preparatory to opening the new store.

Two robbers gained entrance through a rear door and hauled the merchandise away in a wagon. The only trace to the old robbers is the wagon tracks.

Mr. Hines, of Greenville; with his blood hounds was called to the scene of the robbery early this morning. The dogs were unable to follow the trail as the robbers used a wagon, but Mr. Hines followed the wheel tracks to Tarboro, a distance of seventeen miles, arriving here this afternoon. He went before Justice of the Peace F. H. Pender and secured a search warrant and expects to find the merchandise in this town.—Tarboro Southerner.

North Carolina Banks.

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 21.—North Carolina State, private and savings banks according to summary statement just issued by the corporation commission, have \$45,366,556 resources and deposits of all classes aggregating \$25,774,132, with capital stock aggregating \$7,477,625 and undivided profits and surplus \$2,964,350. The summary is made by the commission from reports from the 238 banks at the close of business July 15th. The summary shows among items of resources loans and discounts \$32,231,708 value of banking houses and furniture \$1,346,070, trust and deposit resources \$1,348,394.

It is interesting to note that the last summary of the condition of national banks in this State showed \$41,976,973 so that the total resources of all classes of banks in this State runs up about \$87,343,530.

Its Heart Kept on Throbbing.

REPUBLICAN CO. CONVENTION.

Selects Delegates to State, Judicial and Congressional Conventions.

The Republican county convention was held here today to select delegates to the State and district conventions. There were about fifty Republicans in attendance, all white, and every township in the county except one was represented.

Chairman R. C. Flanagan called the meeting to order and after stating its object and having the roll of townships called, he named W. R. Dixon as temporary chairman.

On motion W. R. Dixon was made permanent chairman and H. T. King secretary.

The county is entitled to five votes in the Republican State convention, but a motion was made that all Republicans from the county who will attend the State convention be delegates.

The following names were reported for delegates, and were chosen to represent the county at the State, judicial and congressional conventions: Harry Skinner, R. W. Ward, W. J. Manning, M. G. Bryan, E. A. Kline, W. H. Harrington, S. M. Pollard, R. C. Flanagan, Gray Moore, S. V. Laughinghouse, W. R. Dixon, T. H. Barnhill, T. A. Carson, J. I. Baker, E. E. Dail, G. W. Prescott, S. R. Ross, C. A. Fair and H. T. King.

There was no regular speech making in the convention but several talks about nominating a good county ticket and organizing thoroughly for campaign work.

September 19th was selected as the date to hold a convention to nominate a county ticket, the primaries to be held on the 12th.

The county executive committee met after the convention adjourned and re-elected R. C. Flanagan chairman.

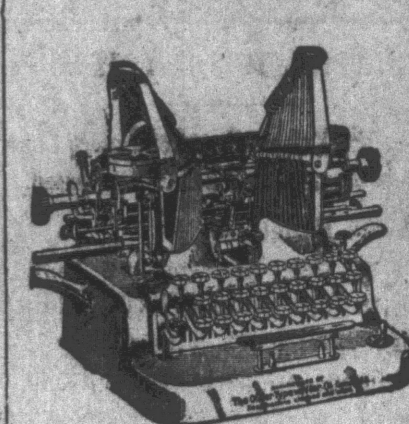

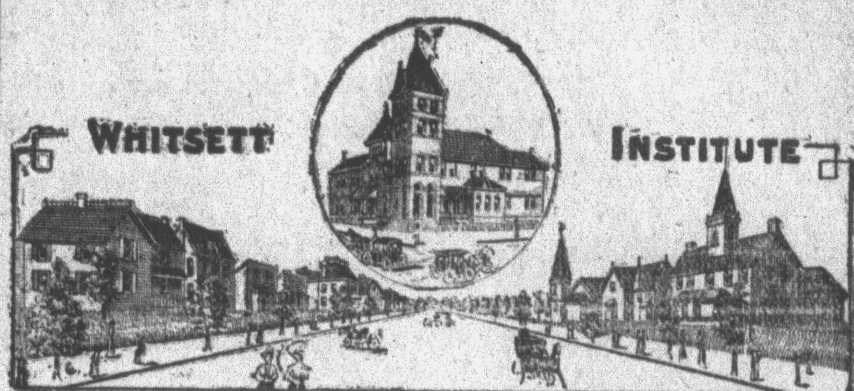

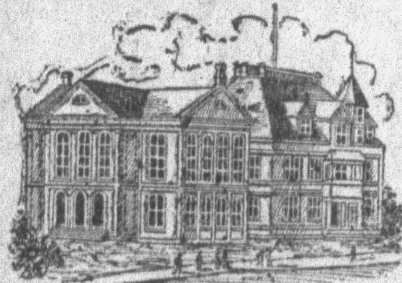
