FARMERS DO NOT RAISE ENOUGH CORN.

The item in the columns a few days ago in effect that farmers were giving too much attention to the so-called money crops to the neglect of the more important food crops, led one of the largest supply merchants in the county to remark that his bills for purchases of Western corn to sell again to the farmers of Pitt county had been much larger this year than his bills for purchases of meat. He said it was a sad commentary on intelligent farming that so much money is sent out of the county for corn, and that the farmers could never be prosperous so long as they followed this condition. It will impoverish any county that continually buys its food supplies instead of raising them at home.

This is indeed true. If the total amount of money annually sent out of Pitt county for corn could be named the figures would be amazing. And this, too, in one of the best corn producing counties in the State. There are enough swamp lands in Pitt county, if properly drained, to grow sufficient corn to feed the people of North Carolina. But instead of raising corn to sell, the county is spending a large part of what is made on other crops for corn grown elsewhere.

As long as this continues our farmers will be poor, and they should set about at once to change this condition. They should begin now taking close observation of their corn fields with the view of selecting the best ears from the most thrifty stalks for seed. And when harvest time comes these best ears should be gathered to themselves and put aside for planting next spring. Let your motto for next year be "twice as much corn as last year." Go about this intelligently by selecting the best seed, planting on your best land and cultivating the crop thoroughly. The county must raise more corn.

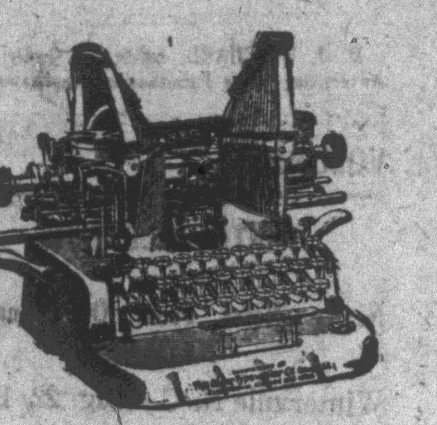

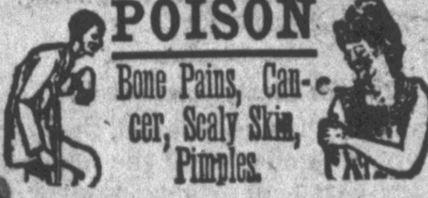

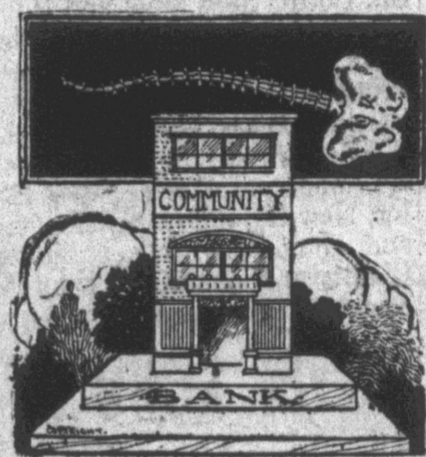
