## BALLOON CAUSES TWO ACCIDENTS

### AN AERONAUT AND A CITIZEN THE VICTIMS

Prof. Broadwick Injured by Landing on Fence—Capt. White Falls and is Badly Hurt.

There were two accidents that caused personal injury, Thursday evening, and both of them were due to the balloon ascension. Mlle. Theresa, the little woman who had been making the aerial flights, was not feeling well and did not take the trip Thursday evening, but that the crowd might not be disappointed Prof. Broadwick decided to go himself.

The evening was calm with hardly a breath of air stirring. Prof. Broadwick made the ascension at 6 o'clock, the crowd watching him eagerly as he performed daring feats in mid air on the bar beneath the parachute. The balloon went almost straight up for a great height then sailed a little to the north west. Mlle. Theresa stood watching from the starting point, when she thought the balloon had gone sufficiently high, fired a pistol shot signal for the professor to cut loose the parachute and descend. The signal was not heeded, and after watching the balloon go higher and higher for a few moments she fired two rapid shots.

Then there was the sudden drop through space of the man and parachute and in a few hundred feet the parachute opened beautifully and checked the arrow-like speed of descent. Yet the exceeding calmness of the air and the heavy weight of the aeronaut made the descent rather rapid. The balloon fell on Dickinson avenue near the residence of Capt. C. A. White, and the parachute in the lot behind his residence. Here was where the accident came to Prof. Broadwick. He fell on a picket fence and the sharp ends gave him two very bad wounds, one on either side of the small of his back. He was carried to Hotel Greenville where Dr. Fountain attended to his injuries. Besides being badly bruised, three ribs are broken, but he is getting along as well as could be expected and will soon be out. He says he is accustomed to accidents and laughs about them.

The other accident was to Capt. C. A. White. He was in his front yard, and seeing the balloon fall in the street and the parachute sailing over the house he began turning about to watch the latter, not noticing carefully where he stepped while looking upward. By a misstep or stumble he was thrown down across a curbing to the pavement. In the fall his right wrist was broken, and the left wrist sprained and his side badly hurt. Drs. Nobles and Laughinghouse attended him and today he is resting fairly well. Being about 75 years old and not a strong man, his recovery will be slower than if he was younger. The captain's host of friends sympathize with him in his misfortune.

#### Mr. W. P. Ormond Dead.

Mr. W. P. Ormond, of Pitt county, died late Friday evening at the hospital in Kinston after a severe illness of several weeks. Mr. Ormond who was about 65 years of age had been in failing health for some time. He had lived an aggressively active life and was a much respected citizen. He was a native of this county but during the past fifteen years had lived on his farm in Pitt county. During the civil war, he fought for the Confederacy and won considerable distinction as a fearless, faithful and trust worthy soldier. He was a Republican, of prominence, at one time representing the counties of Greene and Lenoir in the state senate, having defeated Mr. Jake Parrott, the Democratic candidate. He is survived by three children, Miss Elenora, of Goldsboro, N. W. Ormond, of Ormondville and Mrs. Dr. Laton, of Albermarle, as well as a large number of kinsmen, among whom is Hon. Y. T. Ormond. The remains were interred in the old family burying ground at Ormondville Saturday.—Snow Hill Standard Lenoir.

W. W. Ashe, of the division of forestry in North Carolina, spoke on forestry.

## The Australian Ballot.

The Australian ballot is somewhat as follows:

Booths, or little frame houses, are built in the streets at certain selected points as polling places. The ballots are previously printed carrying the names of all the candidates. The voter goes into a booth or closet in the little voting house and there makes a cross mark opposite the names he votes for. Then he folds his ballot and puts it in the box, none, except himself, knowing for whom he voted or did not vote for.

The object of the cross mark manner of indicating for whom the vote is cast is to save any handwriting which might be identified. Also to make it easy for the man who cannot write.

The Australian ballot would be a good thing for us here in this State. There's many a man now voting one way and hoping another. There are many questions upon which the Australian ballot would give an entirely different result from that which the present open ballot gives and especially the open ballot with a coercive mob about the polls. —Charlotte Chronicle.

## Introductory Remarks.

Polk Miller tells a story on a young fellow who was honored with the duty of introducing a popular speaker to a waiting audience. It was his first attempt and when he arose his remarks forsook him utterly. Confused and desperate he stood for a second or two, and pointing to the speaker with his thumb over his shoulder he plaintively said, "That's him," and sat down. 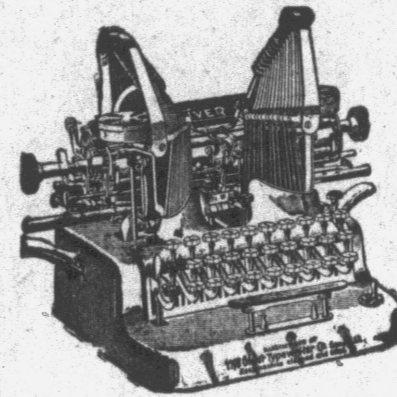

## NEW SCHEDULE WATER AND LIGHT RATES

Effective October 1st, 1908.

### WATER RATES TO CONSUMERS.

The minimum monthly rate to any consumer shall be \$1.00 for three thousand gallons (or less) of water.

For any amount over three thousand gallons, up to and including ten thousand gallons, a charge of 31 1-4c per thousand will be made.

Charges for an amount exceeding ten thousand gallons are as follows:

Second	10,000	gallons	25c per 1000.
Third	10,000	gallons	18c per 1000.
Fourth	10,000	gallons	16c per 1000.
Fifth	10,000	gallons	15c per 1000.
Second	50,000	gallons	14c per 1000.
Second	100,000	gallons	13c per 1000.

Price for a greater quantity than 200,000 gallons will be quoted upon application to the Superintendent.

### DISCOUNT.

All of the above rates are subject to a 10 per cent. discount if paid on or before the 5th of the month succeeding the month in which service is rendered.

### BILLS.

Bills are payable at the office of the Water and Light Commission in the Masonic Temple. Notice of amounts due will be given by postal card or other means, but all bills must be paid by the consumer at the office of the Water and Light Commission, as making collections outside of the office is strictly forbidden.

Failure to receive notice by the consumer will not be accepted as an excuse for failure to pay bill when due.

Discounts will not be allowed after the 5th.

Both electric and water service will be shut off from delinquent premises without notice, after the 15th. of each month.

### REINSTATEMENT.

A charge of \$1.00 will be made to reinstate electric service and also water service when same has been cut off on account of failure to pay bills.

All of the above rates and rules will be strictly enforced.

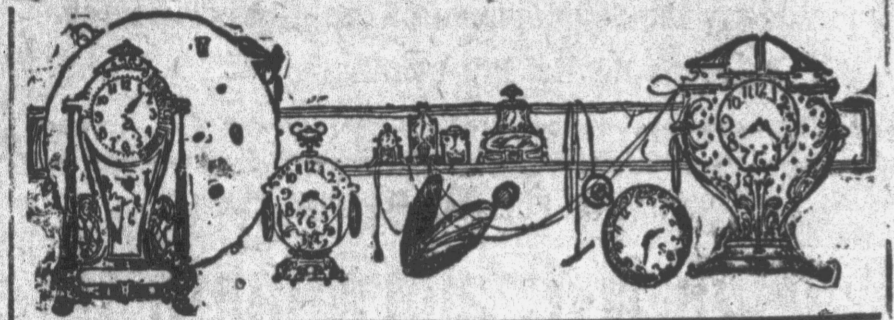

## CABLEGRAMS.

How Messages Are Recorded by the Siphon Receiver.

Although an ocean cable is in fact a telegraph line, it is so differently constructed that the rules for working land lines are almost entirely dissimilar. With the first long cables great difficulties were encountered in sending through them a current of electricity of sufficient power to render the messages rapidly. The methods for overcoming these difficulties and in use at present are described as follows:

Keys which when pressed transmit positive and negative currents are employed at the sending station in connection with the regulation battery. The current of the battery does not pass directly into the cable, but into a condenser, which passes it into the submarine line.

This greatly increases the force of the current used and serves to cut off interfering ground currents.

The instrument first employed in receiving cablegrams was a reflecting galvanometer. Upon the magnet of this instrument is carried a small curved mirror. A lamp is placed before the mirror and behind a screen in which there is a vertical slit. Flashes of light moving across this slit as the needles moved from left to right indicated to the trained eyes of the operator the letters in the message being transmitted.

But this method of recording messages was found to tax the eyesight of the operator severely, a few years' work often rendering them almost if not totally blind. Recognizing the fact that there must be something wrong with such a system, inventors set about repairing the defect, which resulted in perfecting the siphon galvanometer, which has all but superseded all other receiving devices.

In the siphon receiver the movements of the needle are recorded by means of ink spurted from a fine tube. This tube is attached to a coil suspended between two fixed magnets, which swings to the right or left as the pulsations pass through it. The siphon galvanometer is a great improvement, is not hard on the eyes and enables the operator to receive much more rapidly than with the old flash receiver.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

## Beauties of a Moth.

Moths are really very beautiful little insects in spite of their dingy coloring. Somber though their hues may be, one has only to place a clothes moth under the microscope in order to perceive its beauty. I caught one of these moths in my study, says an entomologist, and, wishing to examine it, damped a strip of glass and pressed the moistened part gently against the surface of its wings. When I looked at this through the microscope, the sight was really a most exquisite one. In the center of the little gray patch were thousands upon thousands of tiny scales, each shaped like a battle-axe deprived of its handle and marked by five delicate ridges running along it from base to tip, while all around were thousands more of much longer and more slender scales, each of which split up near the extremity into three leaf-like plumes. And over all these scales, as the light shifted, rainbow tints were playing.

## The Turkish Fez.

At one time all fezzes came from Fez, it being supposed that only there could the exact crimson dye required be obtained. It is curious that the name of an agricultural implement has thus been appropriated by headgear, for fez or fas means in Arabic a hoe. The favorite story is that Idrees II., the founder of the city, turned the first sod with one, remarking, "Here I plant my fas." Another version is that an older city called Saf once stood there, and Idrees simply transposed its name.
