## RESENT TAFT'S REMARKS.

### A Prominent G. A. R. Veteran Deserts Republican Party.

Chicago, Sept. 25.—The Republican managers are anxious to forget, and to have the people, especially the old soldiers, forget the absurd speech which Candidate Taft delivered in New York on last Memorial day when he made his deliberate assault upon the memory of General Grant. Republicans have not even sought to show that Mr. Taft meant well when he referred to General Grant as a drunkard, for so judicial and careful a man as Mr. Taft is alleged to be could not have made the statements which he did without having done so intentionally. Consequently, they most desire that the speech shall be forgotten. But the men who for four years followed the standard of the illustrious Union general, whose recollection of the valor, patriotism, humanity and soldier-like qualities of their famous commander, as well as the memory of many a hard fought struggle under him, are not likely to forget so soon the studied effort to cast reproach upon General Grant. From Memorial day to election day is a comparatively short time and they will not forget to record their disapproval of such utterances as those of Mr. Taft.

An incident of the old soldier's resentment of Mr. Taft's assault upon Gen. Grant occurred recently at a political meeting held in Centralia, Ill. At that time Capt. R. D. Peyton, a veteran who fought under General Grant, joined the Bryan-Kern-Stevenson Club at that place, and in doing so took occasion to announce his reasons for deserting the Republican party. Among other things he said that Mr. Taft had besmirched the honored name of General Grant in his reference to him as a drunkard, and that he would vote against him, for that reason, if for no other.

This declaration brought out a vigorous speech from Dr. Ditzler, a Confederate soldier. With tears streaming down his cheeks this veteran of the civil war paid the following tribute to the memory of Gen. Grant:

"Boys, I was with General Lee when he surrendered his army at Appamatox Court House. I saw Gen. Grant—God bless him—turn Gen. Lee's sword and hand it back. I heard him issue orders to clothe and feed us. I saw our boys ride away on the horses that he insisted we should keep. I know that his heart was bleeding for us all. I rise to protest against this charge of drunkenness. It is wrong. It is too late for this upstart, Taft, to blight with whiskey the dowers of love and trust that for so many recurring summers have blossomed on the grave of our illustrious dead."

There are indications that thousands of other veterans on both sides feel toward Mr. Taft as do these two old soldiers.

### Stirs Native Patriotism.

The author of "The Clansman" may well adapt Fletcher of Saltoun's famous motto and say that he would rather make a nation's dramas than its laws. ### "Talk it over with Willingham"

## The Innocent Bystander Now Tries His Hand.

Many readers will recall the remarkable damage suit that was passed upon on appeal by the Supreme Court last term, in which damages were asked of the Norfolk & Southern Railroad Company by a plaintiff, who while out with a gun fired, just for fun, at a knot-hole in an old shanty on the railroad right of way and the "thing exploded," leaving very little thereabouts except a hole in the ground. Dynamite, which was stored in the shanty, caused the explosion.

The demand for damages was based on the ground that the railroad company should not have had the explosive stored in such a public place and it should have been marked as an explosive storage. The court held that the plaintiff contributed to his own injury by firing at the knot-hole needlessly and that he was really a trespasser.

Now the Supreme court has just heard another appeal in a damage suit growing out of the same incident. It is P. W. Fanning vs. N. and S. Railway Co. and J. G. White & Co. Fanning was the companion of the plaintiff in the former suit when he fired at the knot-hole. Fanning contends that the shot was fired over his protest and without his having any part in the acts that were held in the other trial to constitute contributory negligence. He comes in as an innocent bystander.

This case was heard in the trial below by Judge W. R. Allen last May and non-suited at the close of the plaintiff's evidence. —Raleigh Dispatch.

### Complaint Against Butler is Filed.

Greensboro, Sept. 26.—Complaint in the case of ex-Judge Spencer B. Adams against Marion Butler, Lester F. Butler and the Caucasian Publishing Company has been filed with the superior court.

There are two complaints. One against Marion Butler and Lester F. Butler, and the other against the Caucasian Publishing Company. Fifty thousand dollars damage is asked in each case.

This action grows out of charges made by the Butlers and published in the Caucasian in reference to the conduct of Judge Adams while he was chief justice of the Choctaw and Chickasaw Court, of Indian Territory.

The defendants are given thirty days in which to file their answer.

Considerable interest is manifested in the case, since ex-Judge Adams has been exonerated every time these charges have been brought against him.

### Sentenced to Hang.

Robert Roberson, the negro who a few weeks ago killed Mr. Charles Whichard at Robersonville, was tried at the present term of Martin county Superior court and convicted of murder in the first degree. He was sentenced to be hanged on Nov. 12th.

4. Lowering of the tariff.
5. Injunctions.
6. The trusts.

On No. 1 the Republican platform is silent; the Democratic favors.

On No. 2 the Republican platform is silent; the Democratic is for publicity before election.

On No. 3 the Republican platform is silent; the Democratic declares for it, besides covering every commendable point set forth in the Republican utterance.

On No. 4 the Republican platform is silent; the Democratic favors.

On No. 5 the Republican platform makes vague promise; the Democratic offers protection to labor by prevention of issuance of decrees when in other than labor disputes they would not issue.

On No. 6 the Republican platform actually proposes to legalize trusts; the Democratic to prevent private monopoly.

If the foregoing omissions be endorsed and the Republican party returned to power, these issues having been openly raised, what complaint can the people make if their rule be further prevented, as it has been in the past?

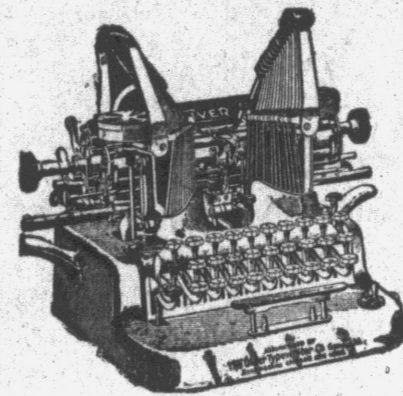

## NEW SCHEDULE WATER AND LIGHT RATES

Effective October 1st, 1908.

### WATER RATES TO CONSUMERS.

The minimum monthly rate to any consumer shall be \$1.00 for three thousand gallons (or less) of water.

For any amount over three thousand gallons, up to and including ten thousand gallons, a charge of 31 1-4c per thousand will be made.

Charges for an amount exceeding ten thousand gallons are as follows:

Second	10,000	gallons	25c per 1000.
Third	10,000	gallons	18c per 1000.
Fourth	10,000	gallons	16c per 1000.
Fifth	10,000	gallons	15c per 1000.
Second	50,000	gallons	14c per 1000.
Second	100,000	gallons	13c per 1000.

Price for a greater quantity than 200,000 gallons will be quoted upon application to the Superintendent.

### ELECTRIC LIGHT RATES TO CONSUMERS.

10c per K. W.

### DISCOUNT.

All of the above rates are subject to a 10 per cent. discount if paid on or before the 5th of the month in which service is rendered.

### BILLS.

Bills are payable at the office of the Water and Light Commission in the Masonic Temple. Notice of amounts due will be given by postal card or other means, but all bills must be paid by the consumer at the office of the Water and Light Commission, as making collections outside of the office is strictly forbidden.

Failure to receive notice by the consumer will not be accepted as an excuse for failure to pay bill when due.

Discounts will not be allowed after the 5th.

Both electric and water service will be shut off from delinquent premises without notice, after the 15th. of each month.

### REINSTATEMENT.

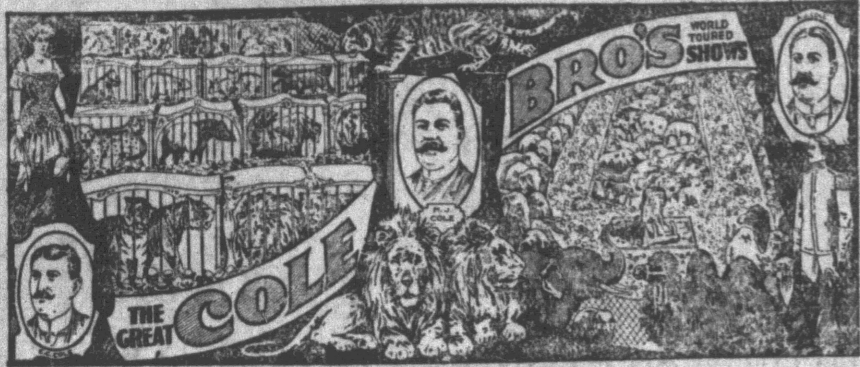
A charge of \$1.00 will be made to reinstate electric service and also water service when same has been cut off on account of failure to pay bills.

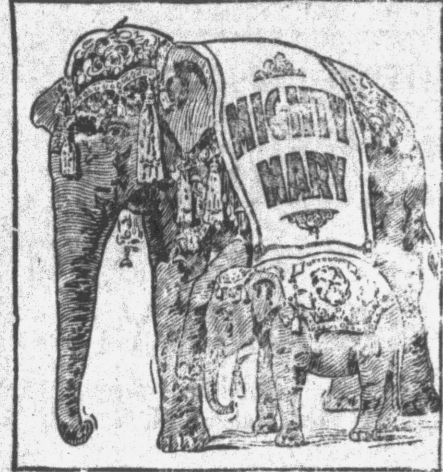
