The Democratic Outlook is Brilliant.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 28.—The New York Herald, which possesses a skill and accuracy seldom equaled in feeling the political pulse, is astonished at the result of its recent investigation. About the first of September, they estimated that Mr. Taft had 206 sure electoral votes and that Mr. Bryan only had 161 sure votes of the 242 necessary to elect. In a recent issue of that paper they declared that Ohio, North Dakota, Kansas and Oregon, which they had placed in the sure Republican column must be taken out and placed in the doubtful column with strong Democratic bearings. The New York Herald during the last twenty-eight years has been an unerring political prophet, and while it is an independent paper, the forecast that they make shows that Bryan's election is now almost certain. This discovery was a great puzzle to the Herald at the outset but they have now discovered the secret. It is Roosevelt's despotical dictation to the Republican leaders that has resulted in a feeling of disgust and apathy not equaled in Harrison's overwhelming defeat in 1892. All the leading Republicans feel that the nomination of Mr. Taft was not made by the Republican party but by the direct appointment of Mr. Roosevelt himself. This kind of political game is not relished by in every Republican and it is said that hundreds of life-long Republicans in every Republican county are going to cast their ballots for Mr. Bryan as a rebuke for this dictatorship. They want to teach Mr. Roosevelt a lesson that will be remembered by all of his successors in the white house.

It was hoped by members of both parties that this campaign would pass off without any bitterness or mud slinging being indulged in. It has remained for Mr. Roosevelt the president of the United States, to lower himself to the level of a ward politician and to revive the old disgusting methods of mud slinging campaigns. Every man in the country that knows the record of Mr. Bryan, knows that he is as incorruptible as Lincoln or Washington ever were, and superior to Roosevelt or Taft. Everyone of the policies that Mr. Roosevelt claims as his own was taken bodily from the teachings of Mr. Bryan and Democratic platforms and it is a fact that Mr. Roosevelt never originated a single one of them. This is what makes Roosevelt so mad.

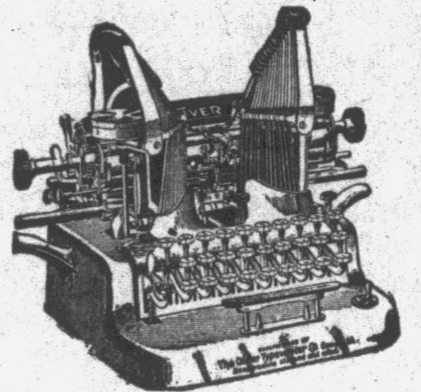

MOVING PICTURES.

The Idea on Which They Are Based Is Older Than Christianity.

Although it is true that the moving picture machines are of decidedly modern invention, the idea, or discovery, upon which motion photography is based is older than Christianity. In the year 130 B. C. the Egyptian scientist Ptolemy ascertained that the human eye had the property of retaining a light, or object, for some time after it had vanished from its radius. To prove this by practical demonstration he traced a color line on a section of a piece of glass or glazed surface, after which he was able to show that by revolving the glass with great rapidity he could make it appear that the comparatively short color line extended completely around it.

While the importance of this discovery is now recognized, it was the middle of the eighteenth century before further investigations were made along these lines, and practically the end of the nineteenth century was reached before the experiments brought any very tangible results. It is true that during this period several toys, like the "wonderdrum," were devised to provide parlor tests of the duration of objective impression upon the eye, but it was not until 1837 that the celebrated photographer Murybridge succeeded in actually taking a moving picture. This was a series of views in which the motions of a running horse were consecutively shown.

As there was no camera that could be used for this purpose, Murybridge placed twenty-four cameras side by side at the edge of a racing track, parallel with a wall facing the sun. Each camera was provided with a rapid snapshot shutter operated by electricity, these being kept open by means of a thin silk thread which crossed the track and was fastened to the opposite wall. Thus when the horse came down the "stretch" he broke the threads successively, and as he snapped the shutters in rapid succession the effect was that of a continuous picture.

Revolutionary as this experiment was from a scientific point of view, the practicable results were anything but satisfactory. As the highly sensitized plate had not then been invented, the photographs lacked that sharp detail that is so necessary to successful enlargement or reproduction, but when in 1838 the dry plate appeared much of this difficulty was obviated, and motion photography ceased to be the dream of theorists.—John R. Meader in Bohemian Magazine.

The Gulf Stream.

The gulf stream, the great "river of the sea," flows from the gulf of Mexico (hence its name) through the Florida strait, along the eastern coast of the United States and is then deflected near the banks of Newfoundland diagonally across the Atlantic. It is estimated to be 150 miles wide off Charleston and 300 miles wide off Sandy Hook, where it spreads fanlike over the surface of the north Atlantic. Off Cape Hatteras its velocity is reckoned at about three miles an hour, off the banks of Newfoundland one and a half miles an hour; then the rate slowly merges into that of the northeasterly drift of the Atlantic—four or five miles a day. Its temperature is from 45 to 81 degrees, according to depth and latitude.
