Trade Report.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 1, 1908.

Bradstreet's Saturday will say for Richmond and vicinity:

Trade generally shows little deviation from last week. Between seasons conditions exists in several lines, especially in dry goods and shoes. Dealers in staple lines and in what are considered necessities are receiving a fair volume of business, but in the lines that are regarded as luxuries business is dull. Manufacturers of trunks and bags report an increase in sales over the spring season. Produce and fruits are plentiful and in fair demand. In Virginia, tobacco has been injured curing by unfavorable weather. Deposits at banks are light, but money is easy. Collections are slow and show no improvement, this condition in the south is largely attributed to planters declining to market cotton at present prices.

PLANT WASTE LAND WITH TREES

It May Mean a College Education for Your Son.

Planting your waste land with trees may mean a college education for your son, a wedding trousseau for your little daughter, and something for your old age, says George Wilder, in the October Delineator.

There is hardly a farm in this country that has not some waste land. If there is, it isn't in good old New England. By waste land is meant land practically useless to the farmer,—land that is looked upon as worth little or nothing. In almost all cases it could be and should be made a source of revenue.

To-day that land is useless, practically valueless. Seeded to pine, forty years from now, when some son yet to be born, may be twenty years of age, it may be covered with timber and worth approximately from two hundred to two hundred and fifty dollars an acre. This estimate of value is based on the returns from pines forty years old and harvested now; while, if the recent tremendous increase in timber prices continue through four more decades, the returns from seeds planted at this time will be something enormously greater.

There are scientific ways of starting a pine wood and there are easy ways. Both begin along the same course, the gathering of the seed. It takes two years for a white pine seed to grow. They must be gathered from the trees just before the cones open in their second year. In New England this is from the end of August to the middle of September. The small cones, about a half-inch in length, that are now on the trees will be the ripe this fall.

Much more can be told about this subject than this amateur planter knows. The Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture at Washington is only too glad to give you all kinds of information. If you buy, ten dollars will buy three or four pounds of seed. Three pounds will plant twenty acres. Twenty acres, forty years from now, may well be worth four thousand dollars. Think of it! Isn't it worth while to do it for your old age or for those who may come after you? And isn't it better yet to get your small boy to do it?

Forty years seems a long time to wait to get the return from any effort,—forty days seems too long for some people,—but nothing worth accomplishing is ever accomplished in a moment, and he who builds for to-morrow, a far-off to-morrow, is he who really builds.

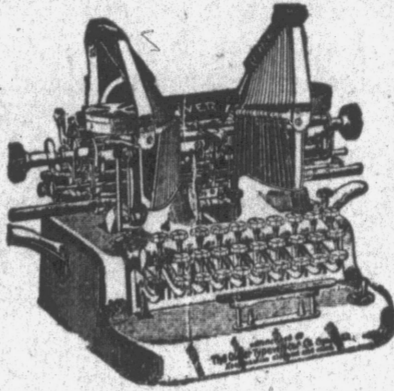

WATER RATES TO CONSUMERS.

The minimum monthly rate to any consumer shall be \$1.00 for three thousand gallons (or less) of water.

For any amount over three thousand gallons, up to and including ten thousand gallons, a charge of 31 1-4c per thousand will be made.

Charges for an amount exceeding ten thousand gallons are as follows:

DISCOUNT.

All of the above rates are subject to a 10 per cent. discount if paid on or before the 5th of the month succeeding the month in which service is rendered.

BILLS.

Bills are payable at the office of the Water and Light Commission in the Masonic Temple. Notice of amounts due will be given by postal card or other means, but all bills must be paid by the consumer at the office of the Water and Light Commission, as making collections outside of the office is strictly forbidden.

Failure to receive notice by the consumer will not be accepted as an excuse for failure to pay bill when due.

Discounts will not be allowed after the 5th.

Both electric and water service will be shut off from delinquent premises without notice, after the 15th. of each month.

REINSTATEMENT.

A charge of \$1.00 will be made to reinstate electric service and also water service when same has been cut off on account of failure to pay bills.

All of the above rates and rules will be strictly enforced.

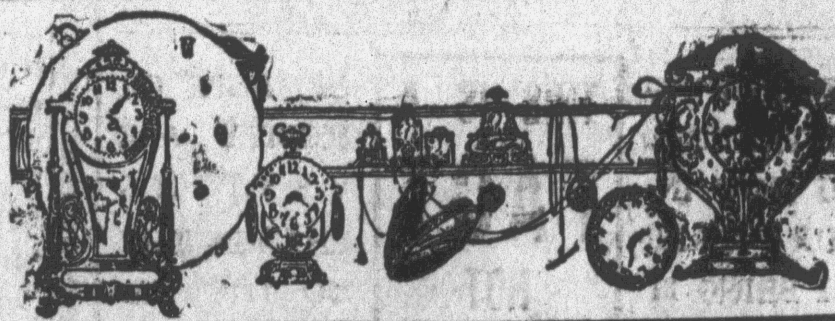

An enthusiastic beginning will insure better results than have ever been had heretofore.
