DRUNKEN FATHER MURDERS SON.

JONAS WARREN SHOTS HIS SON, OLLIE.

Coroner Holds Inquest and Jury Holds Slayer Guilty of the Crime—And He is Committed to Jail.

About supper time Friday evening Jonas Warren, a white man living near Farmville, shot and killed his 13 year old son, Ollie Warren.

Dr. Charles Laughinghouse, county coroner, went out today to hold an inquest, and the verdict of the jury was "That Ollie Warren came to his death from a gun shot wound in the hands of Jonas Warren."

At the inquest Mrs. Elizabeth Warren, wife of Jonas Warren, testified that her husband had been drinking for three weeks and went home drunk Friday. During the afternoon he played with the children and seemed in a good humor, but continued drinking. At supper he told her to make him a toddy and while she was doing so he began accusing her of wrong things. He jumped up and cursed her and said he was going to kill her. He took a gun from the rack and started out the front door where she followed him when he snapped the gun at her. He gave the gun to Ollie and told the boy to bring him some more shells. Jonas had two shells in his pocket. As they all were going in the house Jonas said he was going to shoot Ollie and did so.

Several witnesses were examined at the inquest the testimony going to show that the murder was a very brutal one. Upon the verdict of the jury Warren was brought to Greenville and committed to jail.

ATTEMPTED ASSAULT ON LADY.

Negro Attacks Mrs. Zeno Moore Near Whitakers But Fails in His Purpose.

A negro brute, employed on the farm of Zeno Moore, attempted a criminal assault upon Mrs. Moore Tuesday evening, September 29th, at her home, near Whitakers. The negro concealed himself under the doorsteps of the porch of the house, and when Mrs. Moore was alone attacked, but failed to accomplish his fiendish purpose as Mrs. Moore called loudly for assistance. The negro became frightened and ran.

A posse of the neighbors of the vicinity caught the brute, after a diligent search and taught him a lesson, which he will remember until the end of his life.

The assault was one of the most brutal attempted in this section of the country in years. Although the negro was not lynched, his chastisement was not of a mild order by any means, and will be a lasting example to such brutes—Tarboro' Southerner.

Takes More Room For Them.

All along the business section of Evans street where the concrete sidewalks are being made, planks are placed from the curb stone to the store fronts for people to pass in and out without stepping on the concrete until it is dry. Pedestrians use the middle of the street in going from store to store or elsewhere. A group of ladies were passing along the street Friday evening when one of them wanted to know why the plank walk in front of the dispensary door was so much wider than in front of other stores. It was explained to her that patrons of a dispensary usually required more space to walk in than other people.

Tobacco Sales for September.

C. W. Harvey, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade, reports that the sales of leaf tobacco on the Greenville markets for the month of September were 4,094,421 pounds at an average price of \$9.28.

The total sales for both August and September were 5,646,888 pounds.

EASTERN TRAINING SCHOOL.

Work on States New Educational Plant Progressing Rapidly.

State Superintendent J. Y. Joyner has just returned from Greenville. In company with members of the building committee he has been inspecting the work on the Eastern Carolina Training school buildings.

"The work there is progressing very rapidly," said the superintendent. "Everything is perfectly satisfactory and the school promises to be one of the best-equipped and most beautiful of the educational institutions of the State, and in the South, for that matter. In two of the buildings the brick work is complete and two others are now up to the second story.

"The grounds contain 40 or 50 acres. The grading of this land has been completed. One of the most eminent landscape architects in this country planned the grounds and located the buildings.

"The location is indeed ideal. No more beautiful grounds can be found anywhere when they are completed. The grounds contain a beautiful forest of native growth, including majestic oaks, holly, birch and nearly every forest growth of eastern Carolina. There is an unusual combination of hill and valley, plain and stream.

"The people of Greenville and of Pitt county, are investing \$100,000 in this plant. The trustees have been unusually fortunate in the time of building, and in my opinion they are going to get for the State and for the people, larger value for the money expended than has been obtained on a public contract in many years.

"The architects, Messrs. Hook, of Charlotte, and Simpson, of New Bern, are giving the work close attention and inspection and seem to be taking great pride in it. The contractors are citizens of Greenville and seem also to be taking local pride in the building.

"Governor Jarvis, chairman of the executive committee, is taking a warm personal, as well as public interest, in the prosecution of the work, and is giving a great deal of time for it. When completed the State will have a plant to be proud of, and the school will be second to none of its class in the South."—Raleigh Times.

Items of Happenings Over the State Gathered from Our Exchanges

A cotton gin at Carey, in Wake county, was burned Thursday night, and the fire is believed to be the work of "night riders." The value of the gin was \$1,200 and the owner had no insurance. With the gin 45 bales of cotton, 2,500 bushels of seed and two mules were destroyed, all without insurance.

By the explosion of a powder storage house at Spencer many buildings were wrecked, two men were killed and several others were badly injured.

Cotton Crop Report.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2—The cotton report issued today by the Department of Agriculture shows that the average condition of the cotton crop on September 25 was 69.7 per cent. of a normal, against 76.1 on August 25 last; 67.7 on September 25, 1907; 71.6 on September 25, 1906; and 69.6 the average of the past ten years on September 25.

Important for Every Voter to Register Under the Grandfather Clause.

Every illiterate white man in North Carolina, who has not heretofore registered under the grandfather clause of our suffrage amendment, must register next month or be denied the privilege of ever voting.

According to the terms of that amendment to our State constitution the time for registering under the grandfather clause will expire on the first day of next December. After that date every man, both white and black, who has not heretofore registered cannot register unless he can read and write any section of the constitution in the English language. This should be forcibly impressed on every man who has not registered and every effort should be made to persuade such men to register this month, for it will be their last chance.

By the way, this allusion to our suffrage amendment reminds us of the confident predictions made in the campaign of 1900 by every Republican and Populist speaker and paper that the amendment, if adopted, would be declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of the United States. Every cross road Republican politician was a constitutional expounder and with great confidence declared the proposed amendment to be unconstitutional, and that it would disfranchise illiterate whites as well as illiterate blacks. So positive were they in this assertion that many white men believed them and voted against the amendment. — Chatham Record.

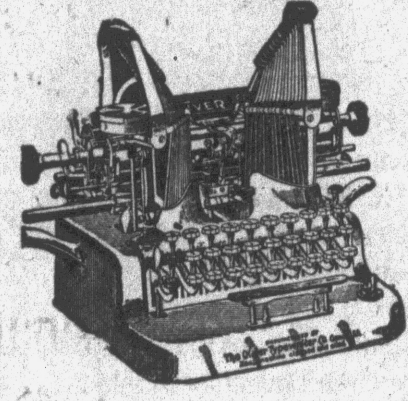

Notice of amounts due will be given by postal card or other means, but all bills must be paid by the consumer at the office of the Water and Light Commission, as making collections outside of the office is strictly forbidden.

This can be done by an earnest and active interest in the work by all of us. I believe that it is only necessary to call your attention to the importance of attendance upon these meetings, in that you may have your determination at once fixed to do your part in the future. An enthusiastic beginning will insure better results than have ever been had heretofore.
