CAMPAIGN OPENING AT AYDEN.

DEMOCRATS HAVE BIG DAY THERE ON SATURDAY.

County Candidates and Hons. J. W. Bailey and B. F. Aycock Make Speeches—Large Crowd Present.

The Democratic campaign in Pitt county had a stirring opening at Ayden on Saturday. The county candidates were there to make their initial speeches of the campaign, and with them were Hon. J. W. Bailey, one of the electors-at-large and Hon. B. F. Aycock, candidate for corporation commissioner. The Centre Brick tobacco warehouse was arranged for the speaking with seats for the audience and a stand decorated with flags, and a large crowd assembled to hear the speakers. Many ladies lent their presence to the audience and the Ayden band furnished splendid music.

County Chairman, F. C. Harding introduced the county candidates, each of whom spoke briefly so as to give more time to the State officers who were to follow.

After an introduction by ex-Senator J. L. Fleming, Mr. Bailey spoke with emphasis upon national issues. He is a brilliant speaker and he vividly portrayed the attitude of Taft and the Republican party toward trusts and monopolies.

Ex-Representative J. J. Laughinghouse introduced Mr. Aycock, who in a telling manner discussed leading State issues. His arraignment of Republican misrule and extravagance was strong and convincing.

The large audience showed much interest in the speeches and there was great enthusiasm. It is evident that the campaign in the county is going to be a very active one and it may be looked for that Pitt will give a large Democratic majority.

Planning to Build a City Hall and Quarters for Fire Department.

At the meeting of the board of aldermen, last Thursday night, all the members were present. There was not a great amount of business to transact and the session was not a long time.

R. J. Cobb appeared before the board relative to having water pipes run to the plant of the Cabinet Veneer Company so as to provide fire protection to the plant. The matter was referred to the water and light committee of the board, they to take it up with water and light commission and have authority to act.

Raleigh and Greensboro will both have big times next week. Raleigh will pull off the State fair, and Greensboro will have a combination of home-coming, centennial, good roads and peace conferences.

The Republican national committee is talking about cutting off the heads of Chairman Hitchcock and Treasurer Sheldon, who do not seem to be running the campaign and getting money fast enough to suit the president and his dummy.

Roosevelt is itching to take the stump and may yet do so. He is already making a spectacle of himself and belittling the office of president, and if he does take the stump he may expect to catch it harder than ever. Many of his own party are disgusted at his course.

Hon. John Sharp Williams, who for several terms has been Democratic leader in congress and is now senator-elect from Mississippi, came to North Carolina Saturday and made a great speech to an immense crowd in New Bern that afternoon. We may have a wrong idea on the subject, but it seems to us that neither the president of the nation nor the governor of our State should take part in a political campaign. The one is supposed to represent all the people of the nation and the other all the people of his State irrespective of party affiliations. When a man is elected president or governor he should cease to be a partisan, but should endeavor to represent the entire populace over which he has been chosen to act as chief executive. If our idea is correct is it a lowering of the dignity of the office and a prostitution of the same for the occupant of either to use the prestige his office gives him in an endeavor to influence public sentiment in favor of one or the other side of a political issue? —Wilmington Star.

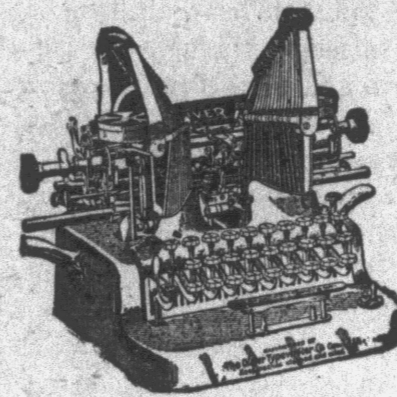

I have often said here and elsewhere that we have the livest teachers association that exists anywhere, and I feel that its usefulness and power ought to be increased as the years come and go. This can be done by an earnest and active interest in the work by all of us. I believe that it is only necessary to call your attention to the importance of attendance upon these meetings, in that you may have your determination at once fixed to do your part in the future. An enthusiastic beginning will insure better results than have ever been had heretofore.
