MR. C. F. WHITE DEAD.

Passes Away Tuesday Afternoon at Washington Hospital.

The curtain has fallen over the terrible tragedy that occurred in Harper's Palm Garden Sunday night, and both participants have passed into the beyond.

Mr. A. B. Kittrell, as has already been stated, died here at 5 o'clock Tuesday morning, and a little past 4 o'clock that afternoon the wires brought the information from the hospital at Washington that Mr. C. F. White was also dead. His mother, sister and one brother had gone to Washington on the morning train and were with him when the end came. The remains were brought to Greenville on the evening train.

Charles F. White was 42 years of age and eldest son of Capt. and Mrs. C. A. White. Besides the parents he is survived by three brothers, Messrs. S. T. J. B. and R. C. White, and one sister, Mrs. J. L. Fleming.

The funeral took place at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, interment being in Cherry Hill cemetery. Services was conducted at the grave by Rev. M. T. Plyler.

The pall bearers were Messrs. R. C. Flanagan, J. C. Tyson, H. W. Whedbee, J. L. Starkey, A. H. Taft, F. M. Wooten, R. L. Carr and T. R. Moore.

Murdered by "Night Riders."

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 20.—Colonel R. Z. Taylor and Captain Quenton Rankin, Trenton, are the latest victims of night rider outrages. Rankin was hanged and into his swaying body a number of shots were fired, the shots causing death. Taylor is missing. Governor Patterson has offered \$10,000 reward, and has abandoned his political campaign. Two companies of militia are on the way to the scene of the crime—Reel Foot Lake, in the extreme northwestern part of the State, and two other companies are under arms at Memphis. Governor Patterson reached Union City, 20 miles from the scene, about midnight and in response to his telegraphic orders, a company of 100 militiamen met him at the station. Armed posses are searching the swamps and woods in the vicinity of the lake but no trace of Taylor or the night riders was found. The two victims were taken from Ward's hotel, at Walnut Log, carried into the woods, and while one was hanged and shot, the other was made away with in some unknown manner.

Woman 60 Years Old Revives.

Ellis, Kan. Oct. 20.—The timely intervention of a physician who was not satisfied with the appearance of the body today prevented the burial alive of Mrs. Thomas Chapman, sixty years old, who was supposed to have died suddenly of heart disease on Saturday. The body was prepared for burial but was not embalmed. The funeral was to have taken place at 2:30 o'clock. A few minutes before the coffin was sealed, a physician requested permission to see the body. An examination confirmed his suspicions that the woman's body was made rigid by suspended animation. The woman was removed from the coffin, placed in bed and revived. While her heart is weak, it is believed that Mrs. Chapman will recover.

BENEFITS OF BUILDING AND LOAN

[Extract from the address of Hon. O. B. Eaton at the State Convention of the North Carolina Building and Loan League at Winston-Salem.]

"We welcome you because we recognize that the source, origin and purpose of your organization is to improve the moral, physical and financial conditions of our people. Whatever contributes to home building makes men wiser and better; raises the standard of domestic life and lifts them to a higher and better civilization.

Sancho Panzo said: "Blessings on the man who first invented sleep," but I say: "Blessings on the man who first originated the Building and Loan idea." Home is the basis of society and good government. It elevates a man and changes his whole nature to own a home. It improves his moral, physical and financial condition by making him a better father, a better husband and a better citizen."

A CITY HALL.

Town Will Erect Nice Building Sometime Soon.

Mr. D. C. James showed us plans which he drew of the municipal building which the aldermen proposed erecting on the lot belonging to the town on Fifth street, next to the market. The plans show that the building will be a handsome and creditable one. It will occupy the entire space between the market house and the Hooker building occupied by the Greenville Wholesale Co., and will join the walls of both of these buildings.

The proposed city hall will have white pressed brick front and be two stories in height. One side of the ground floor will be devoted to quarters for the fire engine and hose wagons, and the other side arranged in offices for the city clerk and superintendent of the water and light plants and storage room for electrical supplies. A stairway will go up from the center of the front to the second story in which will be the mayor's office and court room, offices for the water and light commission, and a large hall for the firemen and other meetings.

Work will begin on the building in a short while.

Lying About Child Labor.

Secretary J. B. Grimes is indignant over charges relative to the working of child labor in North Carolina and the South, and made before a Christian congregation in Freeport, Ill. He has nailed the statement as utterly false, and will bring home the charges to their originator. The charges were contained in a paper read before a sociological study department of the First Baptist church, of Freeport, Ill., and offered to the Freeport Journal for publication. The paragraph follows:

"The cotton industry of the South is based on child labor. Many young children work in Southern cotton mills from 6 p. m., to 6 a. m., without a single minute for food or rest. Ten per cent of the children who go to work before twelve years of age, contract consumption and it is estimated that the average wage of 8,000 children working in the cotton mills of North Carolina is but 25 cents per day."

The editor of the Freeport Journal declined to publish the address and wrote the North Carolina secretary of State for the facts.

Four Men Cooked to Death.

Kenosha, Wis., Oct. 20.—Chief Engineer John Patterson, and three assistants, were cooked to death on board the steam barge Maggie Marshall from Manistee, in mid-lake off Kenosha, last night, when a steam pipe in the engine room burst. Escaping steam killed the men at their posts. Three members of the crew reached Kenosha after swimming a mile against a north wind.

VALUE OF GOOD ROADS.

What They Mean to the Well-Being of the People.

In addition to what may be termed the commercial aspect of good roads, they have a highly important social aspect as well. They bring the farmer into closer touch with the world at large. He and his family are not forced to remain at home for days at a time because the condition of the roads makes traveling unpleasant, if not difficult. Good roads insure efficient and prompt rural mail deliveries, placing the newspaper on the table of the farmer early on the day of its publication enabling him to transact much of his business by mail and to take advantage of early information as to fluctuation in the prices of his farm products. Good roads mean that the farmer and the members of his family can enjoy to a degree the society of their neighbors and friends in the town and country. They mean that his children can be more regular in school attendance and can receive to a greater degree the advantages of education.

They mean the bringing closer together of the town and country, with advantages on both sides, for as the farmer is benefited by being brought into closer touch with the town, so all the business interests of the town prosper as the result of the facility with which the farmers can do their shopping. Good roads also benefit the inhabitants of towns and cities by affording facilities for pleasant country drives. They invite the business man to the establishment of country and suburban homes, such as he can enjoy only when he is assured that the condition of the roads will be such as to enable him to reach his place of business promptly in all kinds of weather.—President Finley, the So. Ry.

Passenger Train on East Carolina Ry.

Mr. Henry Clark Bridgers, president of the East Carolina Railway, having the interest and development along the line of the East Carolina Railway in view, has decided to put on a passenger service on November 1st, 1908, which will be operated from the Hookerton end in connection with the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad via Tarboro, for travel North, via Norfolk, Baltimore, etc.

This will enable the citizens of Hookerton, Farmville, and other stations to make close connection with the morning train on the Coast Line at Tarboro for Norfolk and Baltimore, and returning, they will have a train leaving Tarboro at 12.20 p. m. or upon the arrival of A. C. L. No. 49 train from Norfolk.

The passenger train from Tarboro to Hookerton will be operated in connection with the Norfolk and Southern at Farmville, making the quickest time to Raleigh, and making good connections for Greenville, Washington and Wilson.

Mrs. Greason sent to the drug store early yesterday morning for a dose of calomel for the child and through an unaccountable blunder the drug clerk sent morphine instead of calomel, which the mother gave to her child as the calomel which she had ordered. The first dose was given at 9:30 yesterday morning, soon after which it was discovered that something was wrong. Dr. J. B. Powers, the family physician, was called and rendered heroic treatment, but all in vain, for at 9:30 last night the little one was dead.

Mr. John S. Harris Dead.

We learn with regret of the death of Mr. John S. Harris, which occurred at his home in Falkland township on Tuesday, after a long illness. Mr. Harris was about 55 years of age, and is survived by one daughter and four sons. He was truly a good man, and one of Pitt county's very best citizens. Among his neighbors he was known as a man of exceeding kindness and generosity, and was never known to turn a deaf ear to an appeal for charity or help. He was one who loved uprightness, and his own life was marked with the highest honor and integrity. His death is indeed a loss to the county.

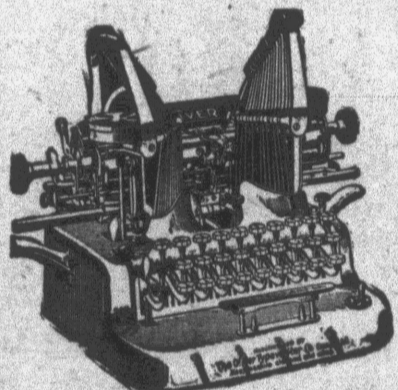
