OPPORTUNITY FOR INVESTMENT

In Valuable Norfolk Suburban Property.

Among the out of town callers at the office of The Reflector Friday, was Mr. E. K. Zirkle, one of Norfolk's enterprising real estate men, who is doing much to advance the progress of Norfolk's great development.

Mr. Zirkle, who is secretary and general manager for the Glenwood Park corporation, is here in the interest of his company, and has sold a great number of lots to prominent business men in Greenville.

Glenwood Park is located at Sewell's Point, Norfolk, and comprises that beautiful section of property almost immediately adjoining the terminals of the Virginia (Tidewater) railway, (that wonderful railroad we read so much about and being owned and built, it is said, by Henry H. Rogers of the Standard Oil fame) extending from the great lakes of the North, down to the sea at Sewell's Point, where the largest coal piers and grain elevators in the world are being built.

Over two millions of dollars have already been spent on the terminals in preparing the foundation for the piers and in grading for the yards and shops and various buildings necessary for such a great enterprise, and it is said that the work when completed will cost upwards of ten million dollars and will give employment to possibly 1,000 or more skilled workmen.

There must necessarily be a demand for homes near such a great development, and to meet this demand the Glenwood Park corporation is offering lots for sale in a beautiful resident section, fronting on the Jamestown boulevard, and will install city improvements, such as nicely graded curbed streets, shade trees, granolithic sidewalks, electric lights and telephones, and residences to cost \$2,000 or more, each.

It is a matter of history that wherever terminals of a great railway are located the property around it quickly builds up in homes and business houses.

Lambert's Point, Norfolk, where the terminals of the Norfolk & Western railway are located, is an example of this, for when the N. & W. railway decided to locate at Lambert's Point there was only one or two farm houses there, while today it boasts of a population of 12,000 people and points with pride to its beautiful homes and schools and churches.

The same changes, and even greater, will take place at Sewell's Point where the Virginia railway terminals are located, and what now is vacant property will soon be built up into a thriving city.

Glenwood park is located in what will be the very center of the new city, and lots that can now be purchased at \$350 and \$400 on easy payments, will soon be worth double that amount and be in great demand.

Several Greenville men have been up to look over the investment, and they recommend it very highly.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL.

Executive Committee Gratified at Progress of the Work.

The executive committee of the Board of Trustees of the Eastern Carolina Teachers' Training School met in Greenville Friday and accompanied by Mr. C. C. Hooks, one of the architects, made a thorough examination of the work done on the buildings and found that everything was in good shape and the work progressing satisfactorily.

The committee passed a resolution calling a full meeting of the Board of Trustees to meet in Greenville at 10 o'clock, Wednesday, the 30th day of December, 1908, to inspect the buildings, to hear a report of the executive committee and prepare the board's report to the legislature, and to transact any other business that may come before it concerning the school. The committee also passed a resolution inviting the State Board of Education to meet with the board of trustees on the 30th.

The work on the building is progressing finely and these buildings are developing hand somely. The committee is taking a great interest in the work and are proud of the buildings, and they wish the State Board of Education, which holds the title to the property, to inspect the work that has been done and take part in the deliberations and plan for the future.

CHRISTMAS DANCE.

To be Held in Perkins Opera House Friday Night, Dec. 25.

Victor Real's Italian orchestra of New York, will give a musical concert in Perkins opera house just before the dance, beginning at nine o'clock, and the german opens at 10 o'clock.

GAMBLING SYSTEMS.
The Chances Are Always Vastly Against the Player.

Just a word about systems of gambling followed by various players. Their name is legion—some plausible, some ridiculous, some based on elaborate calculations, some giving wonderful results on paper, and all falling woefully at the tables.

"After fifteen years of experience at Monte Carlo," writes a newspaper correspondent, "costing a sum I should be ashamed to name, after a thorough investigation of more than 400 different systems and progressions, after having employed a mathematician, I can say with certainty that it is absolutely impossible for any system to win at Monte Carlo. Sir Hiram Maxim is wrong when he says the chances are ten to one against the player. I say they are a hundred to one against the player."

This is rather an overstatement, for a few players do win, by luck, not by system, or by a system based on luck—as when a man backs the number of his hotel room or a woman backs her age. Perhaps 2 or 3 per cent of the players win occasionally, and the rest lose, not only because of the bank's percentage and the restraining maximum, but because this is a struggle between a man and a machine—a man with nerves and emotions, a machine with no nerves and no emotions. Let the system be ever so perfect, the gambler with strength of will to follow it has not yet been born. If he had such strength of will, he would not be a gambler.—Cleveland Moffett in Success Magazine.

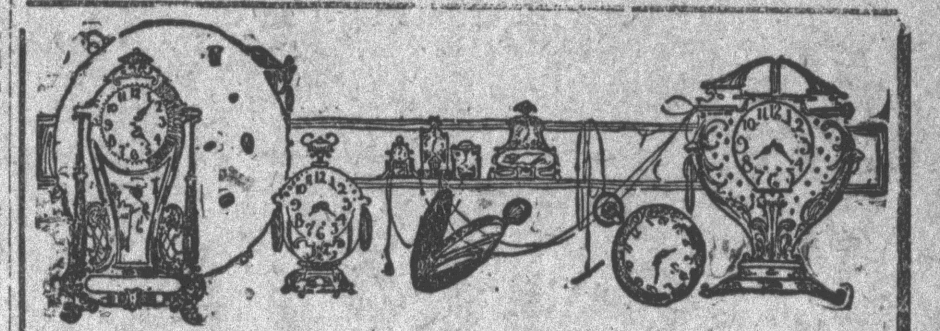
